

### SIR WILFRID AND SIR JOHN.

In having across from him on the floor of Parliament Sir Wilfrid Laurier as leader of the opposition, Premier Borden is handicapped as no prime minister at Ottawa has been before unless we find a parallel in Hon. Alexander Mackenzie's experience when Sir John Macdonald led the opposition previous to ------1878. Then, as now, says the Toronto Star, an adroit and experienced ex-prime minister led the forces of attack. Then, as now, the opposition leader knew more about government and the departmental details than those who sat on the treasury benches. But even in that case Sir John was under a cloud, owing to the Pacific scandal which, for a time, hampered him, as nothing hampers Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

The present leader of the opposition is where he is not because of a scandal, but because his administration attempted to put into effect a foreign trade bargain for which the country was at the moment too prosperous to feel the need. The administration anticipated the country's marketing necessities. It came to grief because of too great a prevision. It was dealing in futures, while the electors-many of them-wanted presents, and got

From 1878 until his death Sir John did not face such ability and authority in an opposition as Mr. Borden now does. Neither Mr. Blake nor Mr. Laurier had the prestige of fifteen years in office during the period of the country's greatest prosperity. Nor was Sir Wilfrid faced by an influential opposition. The Conservatives after 1896 were long disorganized and weakened by 1836 feuds. Sir Charles Tupper was a great parliamentarian, but he had been abroad for years, and he could never quite patch up a strife which had he returned sooner might have been prevented. Then came Mr. Borden, almost as new in politics as he was new in leadership.

Today nearly all the experienced administrators in Parliament are in opposition, and are led by the man who alone has ranked as yet with Sir John Macdonald in prestige. That Mr. Borden's way will be a rocky one for a while may be expected.

### HOW COLONEL SAM HUGHES LOVES CANADA.

Colonel Sam Hughes wants to take one hundred thousand of our Canadian boys from the nursery about the time they are able to lisp their alphabet, arm them to the teeth with as many rapid fire weapons as their childish strength will carry, put them through a set of goose steps before they are in long pants, have them shooting at an imaginary enemy by the time they are 15 and ready for slaughter before they are old enough to vote, says the Edmonton Capital.

Then, with all these boys brought up from the cradle to Prince Rupert Branchbelieve that war was the great aim and end of man; that to maim and slay some foreign people, preferably a weaker or defenseless people, was chivalrous, noble and grand, the mine would be well and truly laid, the militant and belligerent spirit properly fostered and every preparation complete for the desolation of one hundred thousand Canadian homes.


