CURIOUS SITUATION

It is a curious situation where fighting is going on between Russia and Japan and also a species of fighting between Japan and Great Britain and yet Russia and Britain have still not decided to throw in their lot together against a common enemy. That is one of the odd things about these undeclared wars.

Another curious situation is for Britain to be sending Japan war supplies at a time when British supremacy in Asia is being threatened by Japan.

Another anomaly is for United States to be sending huge quantities of war materials to Japan when Japan is threatening to drive all foreigners including United States out of Asia.

In Europe we have Britain and France declaring that if Germany takes Danzig, they will be at war with her while Germany berates Britain and France and declares she is going to take Danzig.

Evidently Japan and Germany are co-operating to try to frighten Britain and France into giving them what they want without recourse to war.

So delicate is the situation that anything may happen at any time. It needs only one overt act to start a war which it will be very difficult to stop without the loss of possibly millions of lives including many women and children.

DOGS FOR POLICE

The suggestion of Hubert Ward that police dogs be used to track down persons who are lost in the woods seems to be a very good one. This would be particularly true in the case of a child being lost in the woods when quick action would be necessary to prevent tragedy. When Prince Rupert becomes a permanent air base with planes always available one might be pressed into the service on occasion to go to the rescue in a case such as the Butedale tragedy to carry dog and trainer to the scene and possibly effect a rescue while other people are thinking about it.

THAT THUNDER STORM

The thunder storm this morning reminds us that one of the advantages of living in Prince Rupert is that we have so few thunder storms. The one this morning was one of the worst we have ever had and there was not much to it, only a few flashes of lightning and a few claps of thunder followed by a shower of rain. We seem to get these little interludes about every second year. It reminds us that we are a part of the wicked world and tends to awaken us from our slumbers.

THINKS SOMETHING MAY HAPPEN

Editor, Daily News:

I am glad to note that the Technocrats agree with me in one respect. They predict a complete smash by 1942. I, with others, believe a smash is inevitable unless something is done at once.

Inspector Barber Gives Valuable Advice in Speaking Before Gyro Club

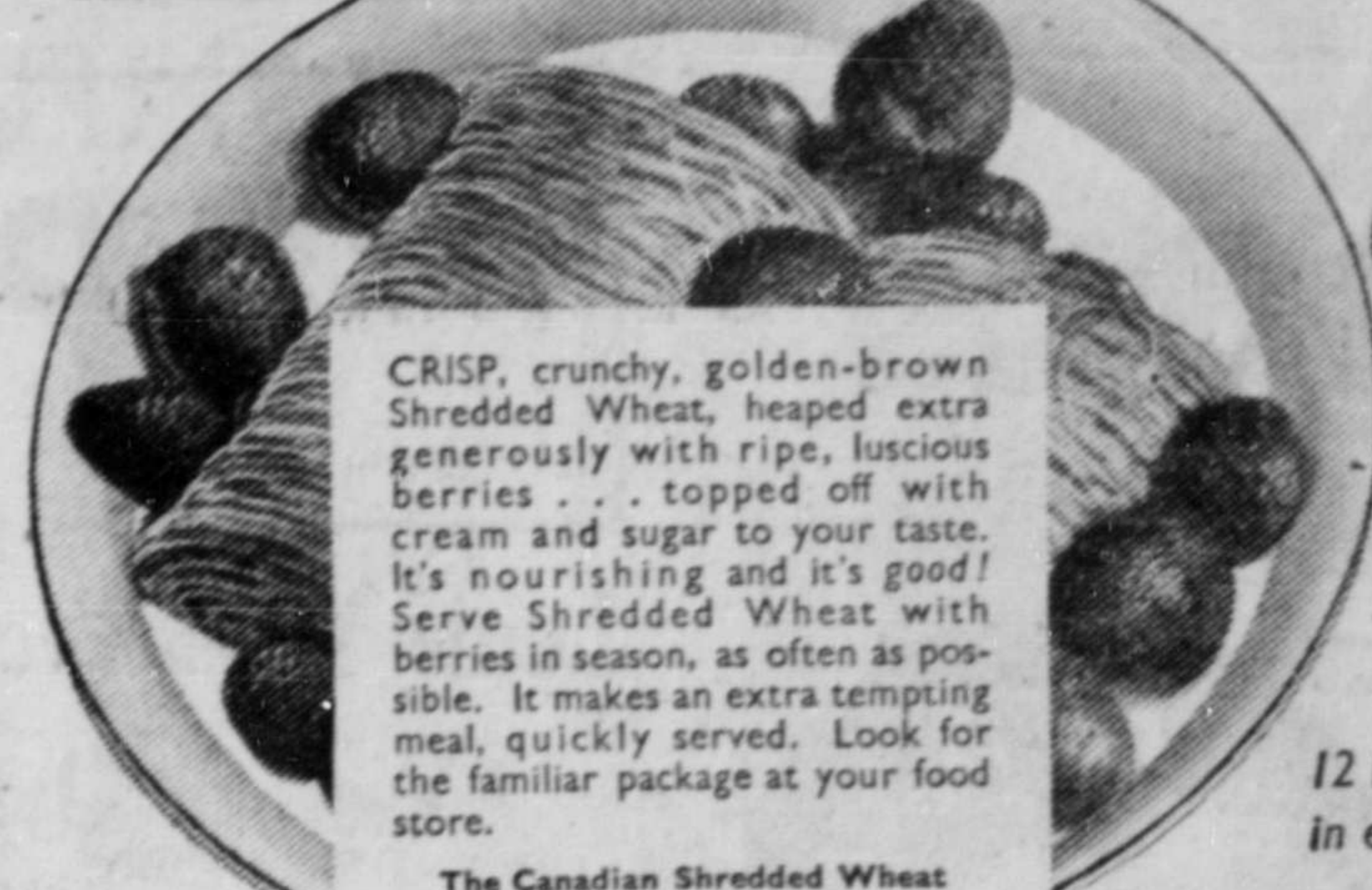

Louis Wins Technical Knockout Victory Over Tony Galento In Fourth Round At Yankee Stadium

NEW YORK, June 29: (CP)—Joe Louis retained his world's heavyweight boxing championship by scoring a fourth round technical knockout over Tony Galento at Yankee Stadium last night. Galento put up a game fight but was outgeneralled and outfought by Louis who cut him to ribbons. Louis was knocked down in first and third rounds and Galento was down in the second round.

It was after two minutes and twenty-nine seconds of the fourth round of the scheduled fifteen-rounder that Referee Arthur Donovan halted the contest.

The pudgy Orange, New Jersey, challenger opened up with a wild, swinging attack, the force of which had Louis hanging on with his knees seeming to buckle early in the first round when he dropped momentarily. However, he was immediately in possession of himself and commenced to tie Galento up, administering hard rights and lefts. Galento roughed it up and forced the fighting in the first round but was so wild that it had little effect upon the champion.

In the second Louis now assumed full command and played hard on Galento's mid-section, head and chin. Louis was now on the offensive and Galento on the defensive. The challenger commenced to stagger and hang on but was still on his feet as this round ended. Galento went down for the count of three.

Continuing wild and still absorbing punishment, Galento sent Louis to the canvas for a no count in the third but the outcome was then certain. The champion was the complete master of the blindly rushing challenger.

In the fourth Louis exploded his two-fisted dynamite in full fury and blasted Tony to his knees in helpless submission, his face a bloody mass of pulp. It was then that Referee Donovan called it off.

Louis weighed 200 3/4 pounds and Galento 233 3/4. It was Louis' seventh defence of

CANADA AT WAR

(Continued From Page One)

year, March 31, 1914, was only \$363,000,000.

The magnitude of Canada's war effort is illustrated by the fact that more than one-quarter of the Dominion's male population between the ages of 18 and 45 served in the Canadian, British and Allied forces during the conflict. The total was 682,888.

Enlistments in the Canadian Expeditionary Force numbered 619,636. Some 36,252 Canadians served in the British forces, of whom 18,272 went to the Royal Flying Corps, while an estimated 5,000 saw service in the forces of the allied or the associated powers.

Canada sent 424,589 men overseas, of whom 346,531 fought in France and Belgium. Statistics disclose that approximately 80,000 served in the United Kingdom only while a further 195,047 were enlisted but did not leave Canada. The majority of the latter were men called up under the Military Service Act of 1917, few of whom saw service in a theatre of actual war.

Canada's Service

The Canadian effort was not confined to the Western Front as the area of operations in France and Belgium was termed. Four infantry divisions, a brigade of cavalry, railway, forestry and other army, transportation and lines of communication units were concentrated on that front. A total of 1,800 served in the Near East, however, chiefly with hospital units and railway troops at Salonika, the Dardanelles (Lemnos), in Egypt and Palestine. A small detachment of about 40 officers and non-commissioned officers fought in the "Hush-Hush Army" of General L. C. Dunster-ville in Persia, the Caucasus Mountains and even in Russian Turkestan.

one to the Murmansk Coast and the other to Archangel—saw Canadian infantry, artillery and machine personnel serving in that theatre while Canada's Siberian Expeditionary Force to Vladivostok comprised two infantry battalions, a battery of artillery and subsidiary units. About 588 served in North Russia and 4,140 in Siberia.

The Dominion's war-time army was a cross section of the world in general. Following are the countries of birth of those who served:

Canada, 318,728; England, 156,967; Scotland, 47,427; Ireland, 19,327; Wales, 4,719; Newfoundland, 3,296; Australia, 1,203; British India, 1,142; South Africa, 444; New Zealand, 412; British Guiana, 125; Tasmania, 33; the United States, 35,599; American republics, 344.

The total of foreign-born Canadian soldiers was 64,000 in round numbers. They included 414 Asiatics of whom 178 were Japanese,

Former P.G.E. Manager Dies

Thomas Kilpatrick Passes Away in Vancouver at Age of Eighty-Four

VANCOUVER, June 29: (CP)—Thomas Kilpatrick, former general manager of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway, is dead here at the age of eighty-four years. He had been a resident of British Columbia for fifty-four years.

Some Enemy Born

The enemy countries were Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey and Bulgaria. Yet 2,382 men who served in the Canadian forces were born in those countries. They were distributed as follows: Austria-Hungary, 1,969; Germany, 245; Turkey, 104 and Bulgaria, 64.

About 4,000 men did not give their place of birth on attestation.

The Great War involved 27 nations counting the British Empire with its Dominions and colonies as one of them. Of the 23 known as the Allied and Associated Powers 11 were active participants. These were the British Empire, France, Russia, Serbia, Belgium, Montenegro, Japan, Portugal, Italy, Roumania and the United States. The other non-active allies were Greece, Panama, Cuba, Siam, Liberia, China, Brazil, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Haiti, Honduras and the tiny republic of San Marino.

From The Waterfront

Skeena and Naas Salmon Fishing Holding Up—Local Outfit Back From Island Air Base Construction—Plane Here With Oil Officials

According to information at the Dominion Fisheries office this morning, the sockeye run on the Skeena and Naas Rivers has been holding up during the week at about the same level as on opening day when boat averages for the millnetters were reported at twenty fish to the boat.

In the course of a special Alaska cruise, C. P. R. steamer Princes Charlotte, Capt. William Palmer arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from the north and sailed at 12:30 noon in continuation of the southward voyage. The vessel, which did not call here northbound, had on board 174 passengers of whom one disembarked at this port. The Charlotte, on this cruise, is making a number of calls which are not normally scheduled including points of interest along the coast. Among these were Ruyard Bay, Walker Cove and Behm Narrows in Alaska waters. Southbound she will make a fifty miles cruise up Knight Inlet.

After having been used for the past three months at Allford Bay by the Northern Construction Co. in connection with the establishment of the new air base there for the Royal Canadian Air Force, equipment of the Armour Salvage Co. is now being brought back to port from the Queen Charlotte Islands. The power tug Pachena, Capt. Rez. Green, left Tuesday night for the Islands and is due back this afternoon with a derrick scow. The Bonilla, Capt. Henry Hanson, left yesterday morning and is expected back tomorrow with two scows.

Overhauling and painting of the power cruiser Wanderer, recently brought here from Anvox by the Armour Salvage Co. which has purchased the vessel, is proceeding. The Wanderer is 33 feet long and is equipped with a 20 h.p. Peerless engine.

A Canadian Airways seaplane piloted by C. G. Ballentine with A. Del Rizzo as air engineer and passengers in the persons of H. J. Taylor, George Westover and H. Betail, officials of the Imperial Oil Co. from Vancouver who are making a business tour along the coast, landed here at 5:30 last evening from the West Coast of Vancouver Island via Bella Bella. Poor flying conditions held the plane down this morning but, with weather clearing, it got into the air again at 1 o'clock this afternoon. At the end of last week Pilot Ballentine was at Butedale in connection with the search on Princess Royal Island for the missing provincial police officer, Constable Clifford Prescott. After a few flights over the country, the seaplane was withdrawn from the search as it seemed apparent that there would be no smoke signals which would be the only thing to attract a plane.

C.N.R. steamer Prince Charles, Capt. George Coles, coming in from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands, is due in port at 5 o'clock this afternoon. The vessel was originally due this morning but has been delayed by a storm during the night.

Matthew Wesley, native fisherman, was fined \$10 by Stipendiary Magistrate Andrew Thompson yesterday afternoon for allowing his gillnet boat to drift above the fishing boundary on the Skeena River.

During the month of May fish landings at the Boston Fish Pier amounted to the large total of 19,253,000 pounds according to figures received here.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, is due in port at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning from Vancouver and will sail a couple of hours later for Skagway and other Alaska points.
