Sum of \$3,350,000 to be Expended on Roads in British Columbia This Summer, Minister of Public Works Announces

VICTORIA, June 29: (CP)-Hon. F. M. McPherson, minister of public works, today announced a public works by Hitler on April 28. The note is program totalling \$3,350,000 for British Columbia this summer. Not mentioning specific figures, the minister Reich. said that the program included \$922,000 for provincial roads. There would be \$680,000 for tourist highways and

\$380,000 on the Kingsgate-Radium highway, both of which would be, shared equally by the Dominion and JAPAN NOW province. On mining roads \$360,-000 would be spent with Ottawa paying \$240,000. The sum of \$305.-000 for completion of the Big Bend Highway would be paid entirely by Foreign Ships Leave Foochow and Britain's answer to Chancellor Hit-

Work in Prince Rupert district, the minister announced, would include completion of the road to Prudhomme Lake and, in conjunction with Skeena riding, efforts would be made to carry on to completion the Usk-Hazelton highway connecting Terrace to the outside world.
