

BRITAIN NOT OBLIGATED

LONDON, March 14: (CP)- Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that there were no circumstances in Czechoslovakia compelling Great Britain to implement the guarantee of Czech frontiers as imposed at Munich. Chamberlain said that any guarantee was "against unprovoked aggression against Czech frontiers and no such aggression had taken place."

PRAGUE, March 14: (CP)—The hand of Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany has again fallen heavily on Czechoslovakia. Today, at his behest, the Parliament of Slovakia declared its complete independence of the Czechs. At the same time troops of the Reich marched into Czechoclovakia on the pretext of protecting Germans from illtreatment and occupied a border




