Premier Daladier Is Unyielding

Chamberlain To Make Statement This Week On "Peace Offensive"

Roosevelt and Mussolini Disdainful of Championing Fuehrer's Terms—Intense Diplomatic Activity Being Carried On

ADOLF STILL WHINING
BERLIN, October 10: (CP)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler declared today that Germany was determined to fight the war to the bitter end if necessary and again he laid the responsibility for continuing the struggle on the Reich's adversaries. Opening the Nazi winter relief campaign, Der Fuehrer said he had expressed the country's readiness for peace but, if this was declined by the western Allies, the fight would go on. Winter relief work must attain results never before achieved to show the world that rumors of disunion in the Reich were unfounded. "Germany must once and for all convince the world it must be allowed to live undisturbed within its own living space. Further military classes are being called out by the Reich.

LONDON, October 10.—Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain, in his weekly report to Parliament Thursday on war progress, is expected to make some statement regarding Chancellor Adolf Hitler's peace overtures. There will be some form of basic answer, it is expected, outlining conditions prerequisite to a peace conference.

Prime Minister will at least give the official British reaction. Britain is expected to require German withdrawal from territory recently occupied, reparations for damage done to such occupied territory and concrete assurance of action as well as in word. It is predicted in some quarters that Chamberlain may send Hitler's peace overtures direct, back to the Fuehrer for further clarification on the basis of three definite requirements: First, Great Britain will entertain "take it or leave it" proposition. Second, every point raised by Great Britain and France must be on the agenda of any peace conference. Third, full recognition of Poland's integrity and independence. Speaking briefly to Parliament yesterday in answer to questions as to war aims, Prime Minister Chamberlain said that Great Britain and France were in complete accord on particular points in regard to keeping the war to "obliterate Nazi aggression." He repeated the frequently made expression that there must be an end to Hitlerism and that Europe must be freed from aggression. He also repeated the previous demand for retirement of Germany from Poland and Czechoslovakia. It is believed unlikely that Prime Minister Chamberlain will be in a position to make a full announcement of British war aims this week. The British war cabinet met yesterday. Consultations are being held with the Dominions and France over Hitler's statement. There have also been consultations with the provisional Polish government. The Polish foreign minister visited London today from Paris. Rt. Hon. Arthur Greenwood, leader of the Labor party, addressing labor members and candidates in conference Sunday, speaking of the Fuehrer's statement, said Britons were determined to combat Nazi leadership in Europe. There were no real peace terms in Hitler's peace offer. He spoke as a victor by justifying his aggressive conquest of Poland and making preemptory demands. It must be made clear that peace could not come that way. Any real disarmament, Greenwood declared, would meet with sincere response in every British heart. Peace would come forever when freedom reigned.

Not Moving Princesses
LONDON, Oct. 10.—It was emphatically denied at Buckingham Palace yesterday that there was any intention of sending Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret Rose to Canada for safety.

BLOCKING BULGARIA
Alliance of Roumania, JugoSlavia and Hungary Heads Off its Territorial Aims
SOFIA, Bulgaria, Oct. 10.—Bulgaria's territorial demands upon Roumania have received at least a temporary setback as a result of a newly reached friendship pact between Roumania, JugoSlavia and Hungary. The three nations have agreed to reduce troops along their frontiers. could only be accompanied by degradation. The British press is unanimous in regard to the inacceptability of Hitler's peace proposals. They are so "nebulous and indefinite" they cannot be replied to, one editorial declared. Former Premier David Lloyd George is still urging that serious consideration be given to Hitler's peace proposals. He will deliver a message Thursday to the Council for Action for Peace of which he is chairman. According to information received in official quarters in London, France and the British Dominions consider the Hitler peace offer as "unsatisfactory." Nevertheless, there are those who still believe that, if the question of peace were taken up by a major neutral power, the British government might give a receptive ear. In Paris it was announced yesterday that Premier Edouard Daladier (Continued on Page Four)

War News

DUTCH SHIP SENT DOWN
WEYMOUTH, England—A Holland-American freighter, bound from New York to Holland, was sunk Sunday while approaching this port for contraband inspection in connection with the British blockade. The vessel was under escort of British destroyers. The sinking followed an explosion and the master believes it was due to a torpedo or striking a mine. The crew of forty-eight was rescued.

NAZI PLANE DOWN
LONDON—British Royal Air Force and German warplanes were in combat over the North Sea Sunday. The only casualty was a large German flying boat which was brought down, the crew being picked up off the sea by a British surface vessel. Three British planes and two German fighters were in the fight. A German military plane crashed off the Danish coast yesterday after contact with British warships in the North Sea.

MOVES OUT OF BALTIC
LONDON—With Soviet Russia consolidating her diplomatic advances on the Baltic States, Germany was today moving to evacuate her nationals by the thousands from Latvia, Estonia and Lithuania in view of the increasing Soviet domination. There were indications that Germany was by no means pleased with the manner in which she was being peacefully blocked by the Soviet—first in the Eastern Europe and now in the Baltic both of which had been originally envisioned by Hitler as coming in his eventual sphere of influence.

BIG DRIVE COMING?
PARIS—A strong German artillery and infantry attack on the western front today indicated that the Nazi forces might be preparing for a major offensive. There was artillery activity along a much larger area with violent hand to hand fighting. There was incessant and new violence on the part of the Germans, a French communique admitted. Strong artillery fire has been covering Nazi infantry thrusts and there has been bloody hand to hand fighting.

IROQUOIS NEARING PORT
NEW YORK—A flotilla of United States destroyers and coast-guard vessels is now conveying the liner Iroquois, against which there was a mysterious threat of sinking. The Iroquois is nearing New York with over five hundred Americans on board returning from Europe.

SUBMARINE SEEN AGAIN
NEW YORK—There were new reports at Washington, D.C. today of a foreign submarine being sighted off the coast of Florida. A small type of undersea craft, it is believed to be the same one as was reported Saturday. The submarine is reported to be accompanied by two tankers.

REPORT OF ARMISTICE
BERLIN—Thousands of people in this city were deceived by an armistice report which gained widespread acceptance. One report said that the British government had resigned and the King abdicated. At 12:30 the local wireless station broadcast a denial, telling the people the report was entirely untrue and that it was the work of the lying British propaganda machine in carrying out its swindling campaign of lies and intrigue.

TRAIN HIT CAR; NINE ARE DEAD

Tragedy On Level Crossing Just West Of Toronto This Morning

TORONTO, October 10: (CP)—Seven school children and two women were killed when a Canadian Pacific Railway train struck an automobile immediately west of here. The dead are Mrs. Gordon Brown; her daughter, Marion; Miss Mildred Taylor, Marion Tibando, Lucy Tibando, Andrew Tibando, Gladys Davis, Verna Davis and Joyce Boyie. Mrs. Brown was driving the children to school.

IS SELF DEFENCE

Thus One Senator Describes Proposed United States Neutrality Legislation

WASHINGTON, D. C., October 10: (CP)—President Roosevelt's forces in the United States Senate today defeated a motion to separate shipping provisions of the neutrality bill from the arms embargo repeal issue. Senator Charles Tobey would have sent the question back to the foreign relations committee for a change along these lines. Senator Warren Austin, Republican of Vermont, described the United States administration neutrality bill as an "act of self defence because it is designed to aid Great Britain and France." "We must do everything possible to hasten an Allies victory," Austin, who is assistant Senate minority leader, said. "We don't ask whether this bill is neutral. We need only know it is an act of self-defence."

BELGIUM IN CONFERENCE

Good Progress Being Made in Meeting With Great Britain

LONDON, Oct. 10.—A trade conference between Great Britain and Belgium is making good progress. It is officially announced. Reports from German quarters that negotiations have broken down are stated to be completely untrue. The Belgium delegation has merely returned to Brussels to confer with the government and will return in a few days.

MESSAGE TO NAVY

King Visits Fleet at Northern Base and Then Sends His Greetings

LONDON, Oct. 10: (CP)—"Your task may be long and arduous but I have every confidence in your success. Your spirit and determination is bound to result in a successful conclusion." So declared a message from King George VI to the commander-in-chief of the fleet following a two-day visit at the week-end to the navy at a northern base. "I am glad to have had the opportunity to visit a portion of the fleet," declared His Majesty. The King also visited a coastal airfield of the Royal Air Force where he decorated airmen who took part in the successful raid of Kiel Canal shortly after the war began.

SITUATION IN BALTIC IS SERIOUS

Assumes Proportions of Crisis—Sweden Alarmed As Russia Masses Troops To Coerce Finland

FINNS EVACUATING HELSINGFORS, Finland, Oct. 10: (CP)—All civilians who can go are being urged to make immediate preparations to leave Helsingfors and Vipuri. This advice was conveyed in a broadcast by Minister of the Interior Kekkonen. He said that the message was purely precautionary but the sooner it was carried out the better. The warning was given as a Finnish mission was on the way to Moscow at the invitation of Russia to discuss unspecified economic and political problems. Russia has gained sweeping concessions from similar missions from the small Baltic states of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, October 10:—With the Soviet-Finnish situation reaching a critical stage as Finland resists Russian overtures for concessions under the guise of a non-aggression treaty similar to those accorded by Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania, Sweden last night commenced taking special military preparedness steps. The army is being increased by mobilization of 20,000 reservists to total 100,000 strength. The Reds were reported to be massing troops within twenty-five miles of the Finnish border, causing alarm of growing Soviet pressure to coerce Finland into accepting the demands for naval and air base concessions designed to increase Soviet domination of the Baltic. Sweden is alarmed over the suggestion that the Soviet desires to establish air bases on Finnish islands close to Sweden's eastern coast. Finland has agreed to accept the Russian invitation to confer at Moscow in regard to a non-aggression pact with Soviet Russia. The Finnish finance minister will head the Finnish delegation. Finland will demand, in any negotiations, to be treated as an equal in economic and political matters. There will be no concessions, the Finnish government has intimated, that will make the nation subservient to Russia. Norway and Denmark are also believed to be seriously concerned over Russia's intentions in connection with Finland which is regarded as one of the Scandinavian nations and will support Finland's stand against any incursion of its sovereign rights. Meanwhile Finland continues to mobilize her forces in the aim to preserve her neutrality.

STORY OF HARDSHIP

Six Month Battle With Sea Pirates and Hunger Told by Skipper of Chinese Junk

QUATSINO, Vancouver Island, Oct. 10: (CP)—Story of a six month battle with sea pirates and hunger is told by Capt. John Anderson, skipper of the Chinese junk Tai Ping, which finally found haven at this West Coast of Vancouver Island settlement at the week-end. From the deck of the Tai Ping, Capt. Anderson described how he, his wife and crew of four outwitted Chinese pirates after leaving Shanghai, then battled typhoons on the Pacific and for weeks lived on a bowl of rice daily as supplies dwindled. With water supply low, the rice was boiled in sea water latterly. They were over one hundred days at sea.

French Sink German Sub

PARIS, Oct. 10.—The French war department announced yesterday that a German submarine had been destroyed at sea by a French patrol boat. No particulars were given.

Preparing For Very Long War

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 10.—The United States Department of State reports that belligerent nations of Europe are arming themselves in an economic as well as a military way for a long war.

THIS IS NO CAMPAIGN OF CONQUEST FOR ALLIES, HE DECLARES—LATEST HITLERIAN OFFER ONLY RUSE AND VIOLENCE

PARIS, October 10: (CP)—Premier Edouard Daladier, in a radio speech to France tonight, accused Chancellor Adolf Hitler of repeatedly breaking his promises. He said the French would not lay down arms "until the world has certain peace." Neither France nor Great Britain has embarked upon a war of conquest," Premier Daladier said. "They accepted the war because Germany wanted to impose domination of Europe. The peace Germany now offers is one of ruse and violence. "There will, however, be real peace in the future. "Every six months Germany makes new territorial demands and then says she is satisfied," Daladier added. "Far from bringing about a reduction of armament, this system makes other nations increase their armament."

CANADA TO BE MADE IMPERIAL TRAINING CENTRE FOR AIRMEN

Advance School Will Be Set Up in Dominion for Pilots and other Aviation Men From All Parts of British Empire—To Make Force Overwhelmingly Superior

OTTAWA, October 10: (CP)—Announcing that Canada would be made the centre for training Empire fighting airmen, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King today revealed that, with the training scheme, was a plan for increased production in Canada of bombing and fighting planes. The finished aircraft will be flown across the Atlantic.

LONDON, October 10: (CP)—Sir Kingsley Wood, Secretary for Air, announced in the House of Commons today that Canada would be used as an advanced school for training of pilots and airmen of all parts of the Empire. The governments of Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand and Canada had agreed to set up preliminary training schools in their own countries. Graduates of these schools would be sent to Canada for advanced technical training. "The undertaking is one of great magnitude," Sir Kingsley declared. "Its development will result in a very great and rapid increase in the number of training schools which is already large and will achieve an increased output of first line pilots, observers and air gunners which, combined with our home effort, will ensure that greatly increased requirements in trained personnel will be fully met. The aim, in short, is to achieve by co-operative effort the air force's overwhelming strength."

COMMUNISTS ARE TAKEN

French Authorities Are Continuing Their Round up of Red Deputies

PARIS, Oct. 10.—Thirty-five members of the French Chamber of Deputies have been arrested on charges of subversive activities in connection with efforts to illegally reconstitute the Communist party which has been disbanded. Twenty-one of the arrests were made in the provinces and fourteen in Paris. Several French communist leaders are still at liberty.

CHAMBERLAIN TO MAKE STATEMENT THIS WEEK

(Continued from Page One)

would make an important speech tonight. This was taken to indicate that the French Premier may, after all, make a direct reply to Chancellor Hitler's peace overtures.

In Paris

While the French press is disdainful and indignant over the Hitler proposals, there was little in Paris today to indicate that there would not be merciless prosecution of the war unless Hitler met with the previously made demands of Great Britain and France. The opinion was nevertheless held by some observers that some sort of an armistice or temporary truce appeared to be in the making. Diplomatic activity was undoubtedly being carried out on a tremendous scale although reports were "nebulous and contradictory."

France, it appears, however, has settled down for a long war, her announced determination to carry on to victory being, apparently, unshaken by Chancellor Adolf Hitler's last offer to end hostilities. No real peace offer has been made so there can be no reply seems to be the general opinion here.

Hitler Still Hopeful

Chancellor Adolf Hitler, who appears to be really anxious for peace and who is reported to have been advised by his military leaders that an armistice is urgently necessary, is said to be prepared to wait until October 15 for an answer from Great Britain and France. The German Fuehrer is believed to have hoped to entice some neutral power—preferably United States or Italy—to pursue his proposals for peace by pressing them upon Great Britain and France but, so far at least, neither President Roosevelt or Premier Mussolini show any inclination to take up the role of mediator, something that is undoubtedly disappointing to Hitler. Possibly he may resort to diplomatic channels to make further application of his peace terms in view of the British and French obvious dissatisfaction with the present form. Possibly Hitler may endeavour to force some of the smaller neutral countries, by threats, to help him have the war called off. The Oslo block of nations is now mentioned as an intermediary.

Meantime a colleague of Chancellor Hitler represents Der Fuehrer as being serenely confident that his appeal for peace will be heeded. He is reported to have said that he had made a clear proposal and hoped for a clear reply. However, he is in no hurry and did not expect an early reply, it is said. There

is no indication that Hitler has any willingness to evacuate Poland or Czechoslovakia.

Undoubtedly with the object of keeping up German morale, some of the Nazi newspapers were saying yesterday that Hitler's peace proposals had created a "deep and favorable impression" even in France.

That the coming week will be a fateful one is generally believed in Berlin. That Germany will take the offensive, with the first blow at England, if Hitler's peace plan is rejected is hinted. Large scale activities may follow in putting the pressure on Great Britain and France.

Some officials are disposed to take a less hopeful view of the situation, feeling that, while counter proposals may emanate from Great Britain and France, they will be unacceptable to Germany.

The definite check to Nazi ambitions in the Baltic by Soviet diplomatic advances following the snatching of control by Russia in the east is not an encouraging factor for the Reich. Hitler is being encircled in a manner which possibly he had not foreseen.

In Moscow the official newspaper Izvestia yesterday praised the German terms of peace. The conquest of Poland had been a "contribution to European peace," the newspaper said.

"A war to crush Hitlerism is an act of criminal folly" was one statement made in Moscow in regard to the apparent British and French reaction to Hitler's peace terms.

At Washington

At Washington, D.C. Secretary of State Cordell Hull stated last night that the United States had not been approached by Germany, Great Britain or France in regard to the possibility of assisting in bringing about peace in Europe. President Franklin D. Roosevelt is keeping in close touch with the United States ambassadors in London, Paris and Berlin with long distance telephone conversations almost nightly.

In Italy

While Premier Mussolini of Italy maintains complete silence, some Italian newspapers yesterday advocated that Great Britain and France accept Hitler's peace terms.

New Minister To Denmark Is Named

COPENHAGEN, Oct. 10.—Howard Smith has been appointed British minister to Denmark in succession to Sir Patrick Ramsay, retired.

In their end of the seventh the Reds evened up the count and in the eighth went ahead on a 4 to 2 count. The Yanks evened it up in the ninth. In the tenth the Yanks scored

three runs, mainly due to Red errors.

The Yanks used four pitchers, Oral Hildebrand, Steve Sundra, Johnny Murphy and Red Ruffing. Murphy was given credit for the victory and Walters was charged with the loss. Derringer pitched four hitless innings. Hildebrand was withdrawn not because he got in trouble but because he had a sore side.

Extra base hitters were Selkirk (two bagger), Keller (home run) and Dickey (home) for Yankees and Myers (three bagger), Simmons and Goodman (two baggers) for Cincinnati. Singles were hit by Keller and DiMaggio (two) for New York and McCormick (two), Derringer, Hershberger, Werber (two), Lombardi and Goodman for Cincinnati.

Letter Box

INTERESTING CRITIC

Editor, Daily News:

Your editorial of October 4 is quite consistent with your general policy and is I think worthy of comment. I refer to a consistent undemocratic, intolerant "yes man" style with much preaching without appropriate practice.

Though the word democracy has today become highly confusing as to what one means by it there is one underlying agreement that it does imply that an efficient government, in our highly complex society, demands that the individual express himself frankly from his own personal experiences. In no other way is it possible for those who are trying to co-ordinate society to acquire the necessary data to measure the varying social trends. It is true that these personal experiences rarely, if ever, indicate clearly real solutions for the general community problems but they do most clearly constitute the data which must be incorporated in any real solution. To do other than encourage free speech during critical times such as these is on all fours with "cooking" the results in a scientific experiment, pressing the ball in golf or hammering a board into place instead of sawing it off correctly. Experience shows that all of these weaken the structure and only too often bring the whole edifice down about one's ears.

It is also probably true that, without the inherent ignorance and intolerance of youth, no progress could be ever achieved in society but it is also true that these same traits in age spell nothing but reaction in its most vicious form. Then their effect is merely to accumulate stresses and strains until explosive forces so wreck the whole structure as to bring down the good with the bad, a criminal waste.

One must admit that "yes men" have their functions in that they support the powers that be in their endeavours to meet the situation in hand. It must never be forgotten, however, that, since today is always the daughter of yesterday, in so far as these powers today may be continuing those courses which have led to present world tragedies, they must still be in error. Also these errors can be corrected only by listening to these new and different voices which should characterize democracy.

In a democracy a newspaper has two functions. Among others one is to supply accurate information so that the individual may try to co-ordinate his narrow personal experiences and interests with the realities of the greater world problems. The other is to help, as it may, in the interpretation of this data by comment and explanation. This duty to interpret and comment upon data does not, however, in any way mean that the reader should be preached at, to induce him to neglect the interests of the community at large by blindly supporting those phases of the government's policy which he may feel constitute a part of the general genesis of the present disaster. Even if one were to admit that the individual's personal opinion—inclining newspaper editor's—was probably wrong in the vast majority of cases, still, if they are not voiced and expressed, they merely sizzle away awaiting a suitable moment to explode, as indicated above. Also these same ideas, when expressed, at least supply the government with essential data and at the same time the individual is given a chance to have his errors corrected.

Finally, the various polls, such as the Gallup Poll in the United States and Mass-Observation in England, have completely demonstrated that the newspapers today do not represent the real public opinion even when they are most confidently asserting that they are. The reason is that they make no serious effort to determine what people are really thinking.

I would, therefore, suggest that, since you preach unity and support of the present government, which has the destinies of the community in its hands, you might also encourage free speech, which is so essential to that government if it is to meet present realities and which speech, if muzzled, must merely accumulate explosive and disastrous forces.

In this connection it must never be lost sight of that there were two factors which materially contributed to the rise to power of Hitler in Germany. The one was that he stated with complete self-confidence that he was actually expressing the real desires and

Whifflets From The Waterfront

According to figures of the International Fisheries Commission a total of 21,355,908 pounds of halibut was landed from Area No. 3 at the various ports of the Pacific Coast between April 1 and September 30 this year as compared with 21,744,604 pounds during the same period last year. The United States fleet this year has landed 19,692,804 pounds from Area No. 3 as against 19,761,302 pounds last year. The Canadian fleet has brought in 2,173,104 pounds from Area No. 3 in comparison with 1,983,302 pounds. During the month of September this year landings from Area No. 3 totalled 4,599,411 pounds comprising 3,659,344 pounds of American and 940,067 pounds of Canadian fish.
