MONEY IS DISCUSSED

Danderyou, Social Credit member for Calgary East, proposed the issuance of new money to pay off the national debt but this was ruled out of order. Mr. Dunning condemned the suggestion which would constitute dangerous inflation.

Fascist Sway On Prairies

Warning is Sounded by C.C.F. Members in Saskatchewan Legislature

REGINA, March 4.—T. Johnston, C.C.F. member for Touchwood, and Joseph Burton, C.C.F. member for Humboldt, warned the Saskatchewan Legislature against Fascist sway on the prairies. They referred to a Fascist parade which had taken place at Raymond near Yorkton at the time of the European crisis.

New Brunswick Finances Good

Crew Rescued And Salvage Of Sealer Is Being Attempted

HALIFAX, March 4: (CP)—Despite heavy gale and high seas, the steamships Newfoundland and Imogene have been successful in rescuing 132 members of the crew of the sealer Ranger as she rolled in mountainous waves off the southeast Newfoundland coast. East Coast Radio reports. The Newfoundland and Imogene were still standing by the waterlogged sealer in the hope of towing her into shelter under the nearest land.

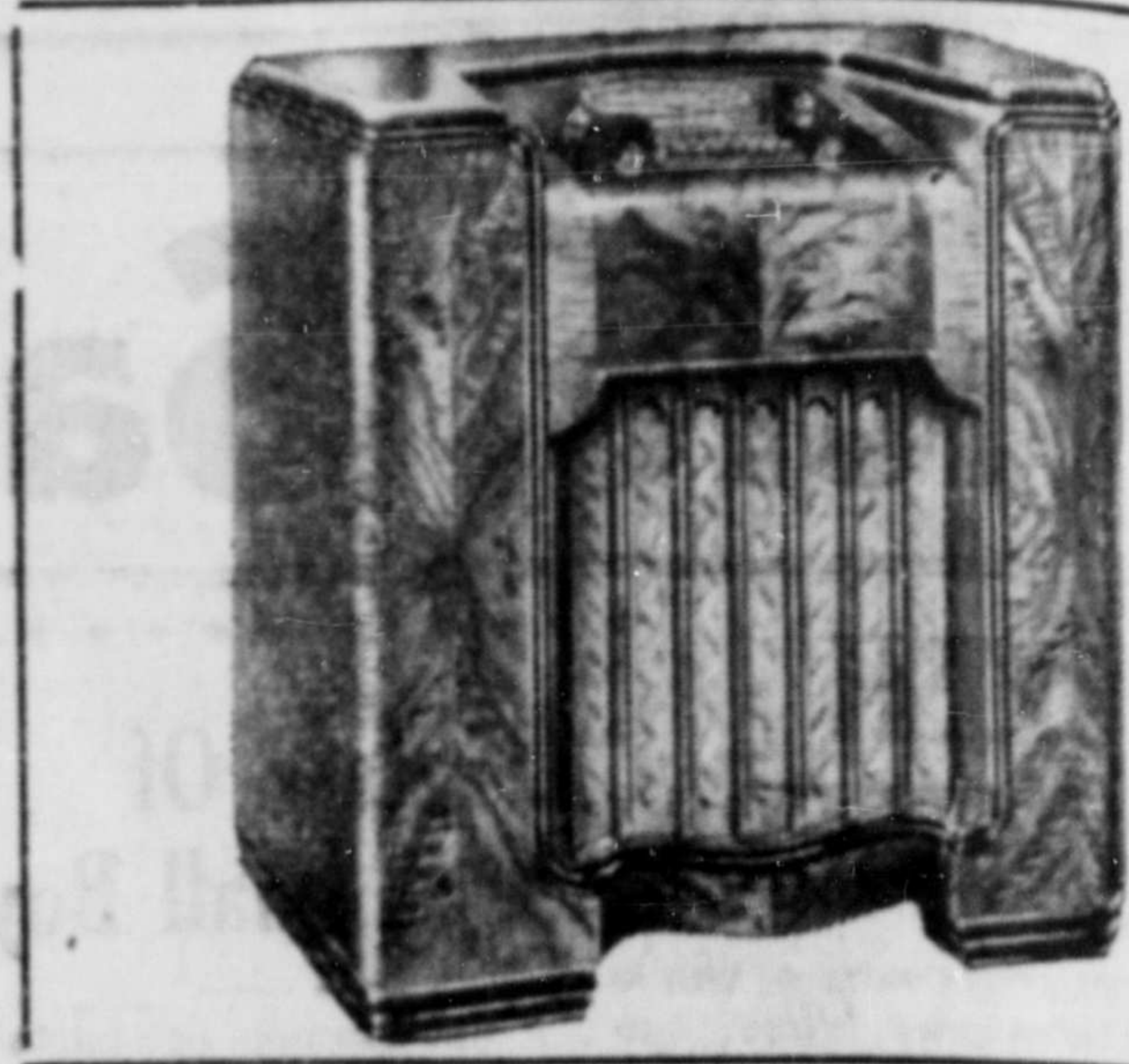

MOVING TOWARD SOCIALISM

In the Old Country it is customary for the radical parties to advocate reforms and the Conservative party to pass legislation changing the advocated policies into laws. In Canada there is a political party pledged to socialism and another party, the present party in power, is passing legislation which is an important step toward socialism.

After announcing that the government would no longer continue the fixed price for wheat to prairie farmers, the minister of agriculture stated that a new policy would be adopted guaranteeing the farmers a price equal to the cost of production or thereabouts, whether they have any crop or not. This covers not only the field of crop insurance but also the price of the crop and, so far as can be ascertained, it is to be non-contributory.

Of course, all other basic industries in the country will want the same thing and their claims will be quite justified. In Prince Rupert we shall expect the price of halibut will be insured by the state and possibly the catch. On the same basis, as the proposed wheat crop insurance, we could ask that every boat be guaranteed an average catch with compensation for every trip that proves a loss.

Already a million people are being kept by the state and they now look to it as a right instead of a gift. Money is being loaned by the state for housing and two per cent money is being offered municipalities for special purposes. The government is controlling the credit of the country through the central bank. Through the provincial governments group marketing has become an accepted policy of both old political parties and farmers are not even allowed to sell their own crops except in the manner prescribed by the marketing board. All these are socialistic measures passed and put into operation by parties that do not advocate socialism. Many more socialistic measures are in operation but the greatest of all is the wheat policy, not yet complete but in process of incubation. It is worth watching because it is the one outstanding problem of the present day and age, the beginning of a new socialistic policy.

REFUGEE SETTLERS

If it is true that a large number of refugee settlers from Sudetenland are coming to Canada to take up land in the Peace River country, there should be little objection to providing of the land and welcoming the settlers as our share of the purchase of peace at Munich. Evidently war was averted at that time and these people paid the price. What could we do but let them come? They may be a decided asset to the country. At any rate they will not be Nazis.

German Steel Shows Profit

Increased Activities Have Resulted In Improved Earnings

BERLIN, March 4.—The annual report of the German Steel Trust shows that the profits of the company have increased very considerably during the year as a result of increased activity. Nine new blast furnaces have been added since the last report, bringing the total to 45.

Having left port at 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon for Hartley Bay enroute to her base at Ocean Falls after a trip to Prince Rupert, Port Simpson, Port Essington and other points in this vicinity, the United Church mission boat Thomas Crosby had a breakdown about ten miles out in the vicinity of Kitson Island as a result of which she had to return to port for repairs. The water circulation outlet became blocked up and the engine flooded. After drifting about for a time anchorage was obtained and temporary repairs were made. Then the vessel headed back to port, returning at 4:30 p.m. Repairs were effected yesterday and a new start southward was made this morning. Calls will be made at Hartley Bay, Kitmaat and other points enroute to Ocean Falls.

Charles Lord, fisheries inspector for the Rivers Inlet district, arrived in port from down coast Thursday night with the patrol boat Rividis, being here on official duties. He will be returning to Rivers Inlet Sunday morning.

James L. Lee, local manager of the Atlin Fisheries Co., returned to the city on the Princess Adelaide yesterday afternoon from a five weeks' trip south on company business. He spent most of the time at Vancouver but was also in Seattle and as far south as Astoria, Oregon.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 12 midnight last night from the south and sailed an hour later on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

People on the waterfront and in Westview have been interested in listening to the sea lions which have gathered in the harbor. It seemed as if they were having a big pow-wow in the neighborhood of Wearmouth's Island the night before last. To judge from the noise there must have been hundreds of them. Evidently they are feeding on herring.
