German Air Raider Brought Down

Twenty-Three Nazi Ships Have Fallen Off British Coast

Aerial Combat Was Watched By People Lining Shore Off Coast of Northumberland Today

LONDON, November 29: (CP)—A German raider was shot down off the northeast coast of Great Britain by British fighting planes today.

Aerial activity was also reported in three Scottish areas, over the Firth of Forth, a southeast Scottish town and over another town.

SUB FLEET BROKEN UP

Claim Made That 43 of Fleet of 60 Has Been Destroyed Since War Began

LONDON, Nov. 29: (CP)—British sources estimate that forty-three German submarines have been destroyed by the Allies during the three weeks since the war began.

The Nazi submarine fleet is being effectively wrecked.

REPORT IS FALSEHOOD

British Admiralty Denies That Heavy Cruiser is Sunk By Germans

LONDON, Nov. 29: (CP)—The British Admiralty branded as a "falsehood" the German claim that a heavy cruiser of the London class had been attacked by a German submarine off the Shetland Islands and sunk by torpedoes.

The London cruiser class consists of the London, Shropshire, Sussex and Devonshire. Their personnel each numbers 650 officers and men.

A German communique had stated that the cruiser had been sunk by the same 31-year-old submarine commander who was responsible for sinking of H.M.S. Royal Oak at Scapa Flow.

BLACKOUTS IN EUROPE

Canadian Asks If Man Can Survive Conditions For Five Years Of War

SOUTHAMPTON, Nov. 29: (CP)—It may seem a little thing of no importance—but to me it expresses the whole of this new grim life in Europe—a shadowy figure who suddenly flashes a blue light in one's face and says "Paper, Lady?" It's a newsie selling his papers in the dark.

Or under the red glow of a "shelter" lamp a legless veteran of the last war—with a box of jumping toys—little dancing dogs—and a faintly illuminated sign, "sole means of support." In the darkness half a dozen people stand about just as they did three months or three years ago at Piccadilly Circus watching the same thing under the brilliantly-lighted signs of peace.

Laughter in the dark. Something brushes your shoulder. Ah, there, young soldiers with their girls. A laugh, a few words, a light giggle—and they are swallowed up again.

On the corner a brawl—quickly dispersed in the dark by two policemen. You know and feel it there rather than see it—somewhere in the obscurity before you is a darker patch—a few excited words—a snarl—with the sound of scuffling—and suddenly it melts away like mist. When you reach the spot it is deserted.

What is this going to do to Europe? Cities which have been lighted now for nearly 100 years—plunged into the darkness of the middle ages. I read somewhere that the crime in the great European cities, in London, Vienna, Paris and Berlin, dropped to a small fraction once the streets were illuminated and the night driven back.

The ship loomed up—its port-holes blocked out, too—depression settled over me in the thought that we had only begun—it may go on for years. Can man live in the dark for five years? How he must welcome the rise of the sun these mornings? Think of that, you who live in Canada and forget to greet the sunrise because of its familiarity.

A shadow rose in front of me—a flashlight gleamed. A hearty voice which could only mean one thing—a blue-coated Bobby—said "well young lady, where's your pass?" You can't come onto these 'ere docks without one. It had a friendly confident grin and there was a big toothy grin above the light which dispelled my melancholy. I produced the pass and he nodded.

"That's right," he said, and taking a squint upwards, he said slyly: "Pretty moon, tonight, aren't she—you shouldn't be all on your own like that now, should you, lady?"

FINAL BULLETINS

NAVAL BATTLE REPORTED

OSLO—The Norwegian Admiralty reports a battle off the west coast of Norway just outside of territorial waters between warships and bombers ended without any hits being seen from shore.

RUSSIA HAS SYMPATHY

BERLIN—Nazi sympathizers with Russia in the dispute with Finland but officially Germany is neutral and disinterested, informed sources said.

FRENCH SCOUTS ADVANCE

PARIS—French scouts were unofficially reported today to have advanced two miles into German territory on the Western Front before meeting with resistance of any kind.

BRITISH FREIGHTER SINKS

LONDON—A 1,000-ton British freighter Rubislaw was reported to have struck a mine off the southeast coast of England yesterday. The vessel went down in two minutes and thirteen of her crew are believed to have perished.

HEAVY AIR RAIDS

CHUNGKING—Mass air raids by ninety Japanese bombing planes brought death and destruction to various cities in Kwangsi and Chansi provinces of Central China yesterday.

NOT CHANGING POLICE

NELSON—Nelson city council voted yesterday against turning over city policing to the provincial force.

LEGISLATURE DELAYED

VICTORIA—The Legislature, which it was thought might prorogue today, will not finish its business until tomorrow, it is now expected. There was a two-hour debate yesterday on a proposed amendment to the conciliation and arbitration act which was rejected 35 to 9.

\$300,000 FLOOD DAMAGE

VANCOUVER—Damage of \$300,000 is estimated to have been done to Vancouver Island logging operations by recent floods.

BROWDER HOWLED DOWN

NEW HAVEN—Earl Browder, Communist leader, endeavored to address Yale students yesterday. He got no further than declaring there would be no peace until power was taken out of the hands of capitalists when he was howled down.

BUENOS AIRES

BUENOS AIRES—A four million barter deal between Germany and Argentina, whereby wheat and wool would have been exchanged for railway equipment, has collapsed.

OPENS NEW POST OFFICE

OTTAWA—Premier King opened the new central Post Office here yesterday with a golden key. He bought the first stamp and mailed the first letter to Sir William Mulock, a former Postmaster General.

LONG STRIKE OVER

DETROIT—The longest and most costly labor dispute in the history of the United States automobile industry—a 54-day deadlock between the Chrysler Corporation and the Congress on Industrial Organization branch of the United Automobile Workers of America—ended today with an agreement on terms of a new working contract.

OFFER TO MEDIATE

WASHINGTON—State Secretary Hull made known today that the United States government was ready to extend its good offices for a settlement of the Russian-Finnish dispute.

MOVEMENT OF WHEAT

Prices Bound Upwards In Winnipeg In View of Exports

WINNIPEG, Nov. 29: (CP)—Win-

ipeg wheat futures advanced sharply yesterday as the flow of Canadian grain towards the European war zones started to flow in considerable volume. Seven million bushels of export sales were reported for the day. Futures were up 1/8c to 2/8c with November closing at 73 1/2c and December at 72 3/4c.

RUSSIA SENDS FINLAND ULTIMATUM AND MASSES HER FORCES AT BORDER

New European War Appears to be on Verge of Breaking Out—Eighteen Hours Given By Soviet to Smaller Neighbor to Withdraw Defences

FINLAND WITHDRAWING MOSCOW, November 29: (CP)—Hope of a peaceful settlement of the Finnish-Russian dispute increased today with receipt of reports that Finnish troops had been ordered withdrawn from the Russian border.

MOSCOW, November 29.—The Red war machine is ready for instant action following Russia's denunciation yesterday of the non-aggression pact with her little neighbor, Finland, whose land she covets for naval and military bases in the Baltic area to protect herself from possible German encroachment.

AIR BASE ATTACKED

Royal Air Force Long Range Patrol Visits Borkum Island and All Planes Return Safely

LONDON, Nov. 29: (CP)—A long range patrol of the Royal Air Force launched a direct attack Tuesday on the Nazi seaplane base of Borkum Island with the object of wrecking German planes which have been sowing mines in waters contiguous to the British Isles.

The German high command stated that the attack had been successfully driven off before bombs were dropped.

It was the third British raid on German bases since November 18.

NAZIS ARE EXULTANT

More Dire Threats Made Against Great Britain—"Just a Sample"

BERLIN, Nov. 29.—Exultant over the toll the Nazis have taken of Allied and neutral shipping as a result of indiscriminate mine laying around the British Isles, a German spokesman declares "the past week is only a sample of what is in store. Germany will fight with all its resources and every means at its command until Great Britain has been brought to her knees as no nation has ever been brought before. Germany will carry on until no nation will dare to use a British port."

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EDITORIALS

PEACE OR WAR

The moral rearmament people are about to put on another moral rearmament campaign in which seems to be two opposing ideas. In one sentence we are told that moral rearmament teaches us to sacrifice for our country. In the next we are told that the immediate aim is a hundred million people mobilized in the battle for peace.

We mildly suggest that the present method of mobilizing for peace is to endeavour to subdue the enemies of peace. It seems to us that the people generally who talk about moral rearmament are the people who think fighting is wicked. We do not think fighting is wicked. We believe it to be the noblest thing in life when the cause is just. The man who won't fight to defend the right is not much of a man. Usually women make better fighters than men. What we have to do now is to support our men, the first contingent of whom has arrived in Europe. We must support them by sending food and war supplies. We may also support them by prayers for their welfare, by letters of cheer and assurance that others will follow as needed. We can support them by doing our part right here and now at home.

There is a feeling among many that we are not fighting the German people but only Hitler. Speaking in the House of Commons at London yesterday Lord Milne made it quite clear that the German people were out to destroy the British Empire and France if they could possibly do so. In order to do this they were prepared to break all the laws of humanity, to sacrifice neutral non-combatants including women and children to satisfy their overwhelming ambition.

Hitlerism has been adopted as the moral code, yes, even the religion, of the German people and it is silly to assume that the Germans are full of love and sweet sentiments toward the British people. Germany is today the enemy of all right-thinking people and the forces of evil influencing her must be destroyed.

SENSE OF HUMOR

The Tommies in the army seem to differ from the average Englishman in Canada in that he has a powerful sense of humor and carries it into the trenches and even into battle. This is a God-given sense which is helpful in any walk of life. It is a great antidote to the blues Charles Dickens recognized its value and gave it to many of his characters to use in times of stress.

The Scottish people consider it so valuable that the city of Aberdeen makes a specialty of manufacturing jokes about Scottish people and especially about Aberdonians. James Lee of this city tells one of the latest from Aberdeen. It seems there was an air raid over that city but the people who were in the restaurants or at the theatre refused to heed it until the meal was finished or the show was over.

WEAKER THAN AT BEGINNING

Hitler is weaker than at the beginning of the war, according to Sir Samuel Hoare. When the war commenced the German plan was to stake everything on a big drive either on land or in the air. Neither of these had taken place. Now she is resorting to horrible illegal practices to try to win. The British are stronger today than at the beginning of the war.

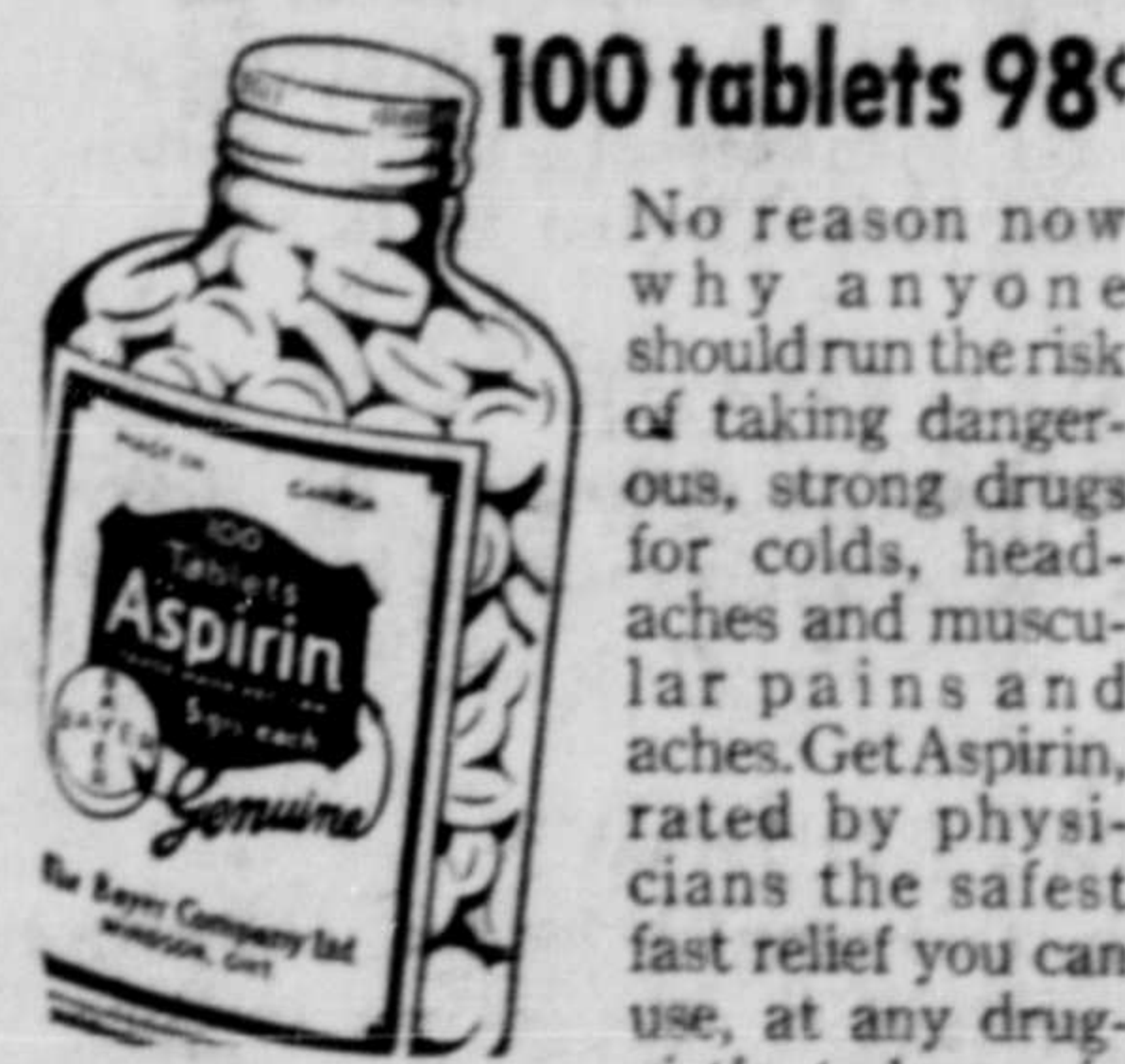

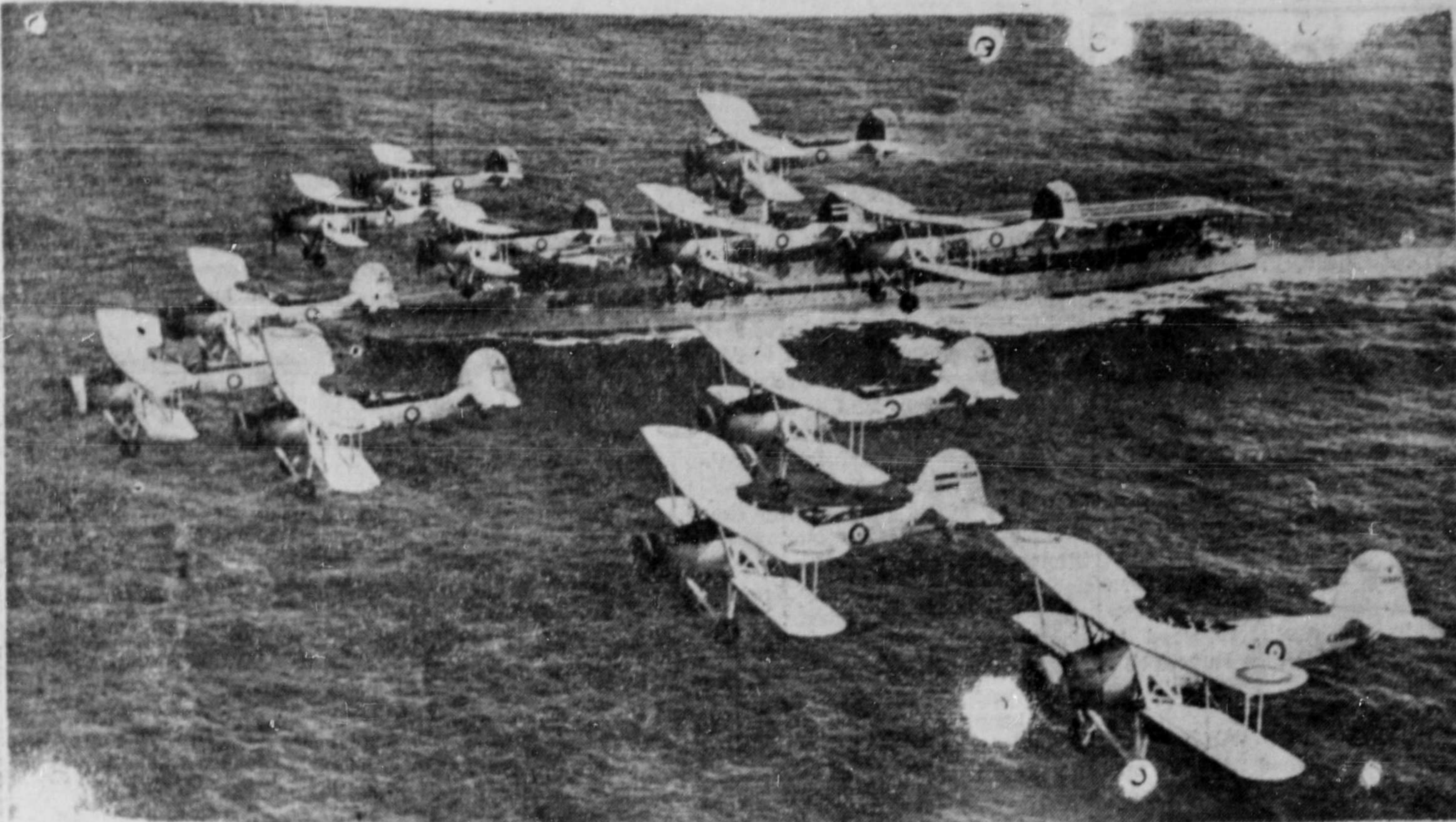

MINE CAMP IS OPENED

Resumption of Operations on Babine—Silver King With Seventeen Employed

SMITHERS, Nov. 29.—There is some revival of mining activity in the Babine Mountains just now. About three weeks ago Frank Messner arrived in town with some outside capital for development of the Babine Silver King property and with several representatives of those newly interested. They proceeded immediately to the hills and have been transporting lumber and other material there with which to build a camp and carrying on their development work. At the present time there are seventeen men engaged in the work that is going on. A camp has been established just below timber line and a short distance from the workings and it is intended to go steadily ahead with work on this property.

A large bunk house was completed last week and the management decided on a "house-warming" to celebrate the occasion. A general invitation was extended to all those who wished to make the journey from Smithers to participate in the hospitality of the miners. Several truck loads of young people left Smithers early on Saturday evening and, when they had driven as far as they could go with motor trucks, they were met with sleighs and horses and drawn the remaining three miles to the camp. They were welcomed at the camp by several volleys of rifle shots and their hosts overlooked no efforts in providing entertainments for their guests. The new building was decorated with Japanese lanterns and dancing was carried on throughout the evening.

Native Tribal History Recalled In Death Of Kitsumkalum Chief; Forbears Dwelt On Kaien Island

Early on the morning of November 18 Chief Samuel Kennedy of the Kalum Indians passed away at the Kitse-las Reserve. His passing marked the loss of one of the few remaining Native links with the time when white men were few on the Skeena River. Eighty years old at the time of his passing the Chief, whose native name was Skoom Guis, had seen the decadence of many of the old customs of his people and the disturbances brought to the native folk by the impact of white civilization.

Chief of the Flying Eagle totem, his name Skoom Guis—"Early Daylight"—was a remembrance of the origins of his clan that several centuries ago migrated from Na-A. (Known now as Loring Alaska) and on a series of rafts made of canoes lashed together moved down the coast to re-establish themselves on Kaien Island across the steamship channel from Digby Island.

At Na-A they had lived side by side with the folk of the Wolf Totem. A dispute arose and the Eagle people moved south.

At Na-A their totems had been of

stone. The Large Flying Eagle had stood on the edge of a cliff. The Small Flying Eagle had been the symbol used in many ceremonies.

When they moved they found the Large Eagle too heavy to carry away. Lest it fall into the hands of unauthorized people the big carving was thrown from the cliff and lies in deep water at its base.

The Small Flying Eagle was carried south. Since then the custodianship of the ancient relic has rested with the ranking chief of each generation.

They stayed at Kaien Island for many generations. They became established and strong and, once more, disputes arose between themselves and other people and again they moved. This time they travelled north to find a home on the lower reaches of the Naas River. Here, for generations they lived in prosperity until, again, the pressure of another clan led them to seek quieter hunting grounds.

Young men scouting for new territory climbed the mountain range that flanks the south bank of the Naas. Across the divide they came to the headwaters of the Beaver River. They followed downstream and came to where the South Fork joined the stream. South along this valley they travelled, following the river upstream. Well towards the headwaters they turned east, crossed another range and came to the Kalum River where it pours through a canyon.

Here they found the people of another Eagle Totem. Here they were made welcome. They were invited to bring their people and assume supreme rulership of the area. So, after centuries of wandering, the people of the Flying Eagle found a permanent home at Kit-sum Aalam—"The Dwellers on the Edge of the Canyon."

Stage by stage in these wanderings the Small Flying Eagle moved with the people. It came to the canyon banks and since then has been jealously guarded by the chiefs. In each generation only two men have known where it reposed—the Chief, and the Chief's nephew, who, in due course would come to the chieftainship.

So it came to pass that years ago Skoom Guis undertook to keep safely the ancient emblem of his people's history and traditions. So, until his death soon after that Sunday morning started and the Chief entered into his last sleep, he has kept his trust.

Now it passes to his successor to his nephew, George Wright, who, in due course will take a "Name" that will signify his accession to "The Power" of his people.

Skoom Guis was born at Kalum on the Indian Reserve in the days when white men were few along the Skeena. Most of his life was spent beside its fast flowing waters. For a while, during his early manhood, he lived at Ketchikan, close by his

ancestral home of Na-a. He has told how, from a boat, he has looked down at low tide and seen the Big Stone Eagle resting on the bottom of the salt chuck.

Traditions Invoked

Now he has gone and his passing was marked with all due ceremony. Ancient traditions were invoked. His nephew, who will take his place, did his part. Skoom Guis had said to George Wright: "When anything happens I want you to stand over me." At the funeral feast this nephew was able to say: "I have done my first duty." George, in keeping with the ancient ritual of his people, had seen to all arrangements for the funeral.

Chiefs from up-river had gathered to pay their respects to their lost brother. From Kitwanga came OOH Oar'd, Chief Matthias Bright, and GIL-A-Wau, Chief Robert Harris.

He was borne to his last resting place by men of rank. Chief Matthias Bright, Joseph Hudson of the Wolf Totem, George Turner and Samuel Turner of the Grizzly Bear folk, Solomon Bevan of the Wolves, and John Sebastia who came from Maurietown. So in the pallbearers was carried out the tradition of the amity of the phratries living in close fellowship.

Formal precedence marked all steps of the proceedings.

The honor of opening the grave was given to Gordon Nelson of the Kalum People and Ben Seymour of the people of MDeek, the Grizzly Bear.

And when the aged chief had been given his last resting place the chiefs and the people gathered at the house of Chief Walter Wright. Here at the house of Neas-D-Hoc, ranking chief of the MDeek people the funeral feast was given by Mrs. George Turner, daughter of Neas-D-Hoc, and sister of George Wright.

The funeral had been conducted by another chief, Adjutant Mark McKay, ranking chief of the Kiteelas Eagle folk, who centuries ago came from the Haida lands, committed his brother to the ground.

And in the feast that followed the ancient symbolism and law of succession was marked by the giver. Mrs. Turner, sister of the chief-to-be, gave the feast and, in so doing marked the next stage of the people of the Flying Eagle. For a son of a sister of George will, in years that he ahead, when his turn comes, assume the rank of chief of this people and, in turn, become the guardian of the stone of antiquity—the small stone eagle that has its wings outspread for flight.

Flowers mark the grave of the chief who has passed. A mingling of ancient custom and that of the

NEWS OF THE MINES

Unicorn Property, Adjoining Big Missouri, Looks Good—Year Active in Stikine River District—Opening Up Coal Mine Near Smithers

John Hovland, well known pioneer mining man of the Portland Canal district, left Stewart last week on his return to Seattle after spending a couple of weeks looking over the Unicorn property, adjoining the Big Missouri of which he was one of the original locators and in which he is still heavily interested. The purpose of Mr. Hovland's visit was to review for himself the work during the past few years on the property which for years has attracted attention not only because of its own mineralization but due to the fact that it appears to be an extension of the Big Missouri deposits. During the past summer Louis Watkins, who is interested with Mr. Hovland in the property, extended the drift a further twenty-two feet north in such nice material and encountered an eastward blind vein of some seven to eight feet width carrying commercial values in gold. The object of this drift, now in 450 feet, has the double purpose of paralleling and permitting the cross-cutting of the Unit zone and the cutting at a vertical depth of about 150 feet the intersection of this zone with "A" vein, striking across it in an east-west direction and showing on the surface a width of about fifty feet with encouraging values. The Unity zone, which has a north-south strike, has been broken into from the drift at three points and in each discloses a width of some twenty-two feet with spotty gold values. It is the intention to keep on driving as much as possible of this drift this year.

a shipment of high grade gold ore from both the Gold Boulder and Gold Drop properties for shipment to the ore sampling plant at Prince Rupert. In all about twelve tons of ore was shipped from the property which is owned by Joe Moran and Albert Casey. The ore shipped has in both cases been extracted in the course of development.

Things have been looking well from a mining standpoint up the Stikine River in the Cassiar district during the past season. This is particularly so of the Boulder Creek country. The Boulder Creek mine has at least two years' work blocked out and should show a good profit eventually. Jack Wheaton did very well on Boulder Creek with hand mining and the nickel property of Jack Davis and Frank Bobner show real promise, having attracted the interest of the International Nickel Co. whose representative, paid a visit and took samples. Vern Shay, who put himself down in historical records of the country when a few years ago he and his wife found a fifty-three ounce nugget on the site where their mine is now located, are spending the winter in the United States. The past season was an unusually rainy one in the Cassiar district.

Thomas Campbell and Eric J. Jones are developing a coal property at Tatlow, between Smithers and Telkwa, from which they intend to place domestic and blacksmith coal on the market at an early date. First work is the erection of permanent camp buildings on the property including housing accommodation for a crew of eight or ten men, a power house and also bunker to handle at least two carloads of coal. The blacksmith coal is said to be of the very highest quality obtainable and the owners say that a market is waiting for a large supply.

As a part of the program of expediting the production of British Columbia war minerals, the Department of Mines has prepared a list of buyers in Great Britain and France of such minerals as molybdenum, manganese, antimony, cobalt, mercury and tungsten. It is pointed out that inquiries should not be directed to the buyers unless owners of property are prepared to guarantee tonnage and grades. Most war minerals are purchased by individual buyers on contract and specifications vary according to the production made by them.
