They help to form public opinion much the same as men and they are neither better nor worse than persons of the opposite sex.

In the development of democracy we find many evils, . partly as a result of people wanting something they have never had before, not knowing what it was like. Until they were disillusioned by the Russian experiment, many people wanted Socialism. Now they find that the one country that tried it got side-tracked on the way. The dictatorship of the proletariat did not allow enough for human nature. Once the small group of socialist leaders got the reins of government they liked it so well they hung on to it. So we find the growth of a socialist aristrocracy which is no more like what Karl Marx planned than chalk is like cheese.



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

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
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
