PADDLE FOUND

Apart from the finding on the shore of Butedale Lake of a rudely fashioned paddle, believed to have been hewn by the missing officer, and a freshly cut small log, there have been no new developments in the case of Provincial Constable Clifford Prescott of Butedale, who has been missing for nine days on the trail between Surf Inlet and Butedale, Princess Royal Island. The search is continuing although little hope is now held for his being found alive and possibly his fate will never be known. A brother, Claude Prescott, is coming from Vancouver to Butedale.

INDIAN FISHERMAN LOST

The empty boat of Herbert Green, Indian fisherman, was found drifting at the mouth of the Naas River overnight and was taken to Port Simpson. The provincial police boat P.M.L. 8 left this morning for the north to investigate.

23-INNING GAME

BOSTON-Almost duplicating a feat the same two clubs performed nineteen years ago, Brooklyn Dodgers and Boston Bees played through twenty-three innings to a two-all draw yesterday, the game being called on account of darkness. It was the third longest game in Big League history. The Bees and Dodgers in 1920 went twenty-six innings to a one-one tie for the longest recorded game.

CLIPPERS MOVING

FOYNES. Ireland-After having been held up at Shediac, New Brunswick, since Sunday by low clouds, fog and rain, flying conditions turned favorable and the Pan-American Airways Yankee Clipper was able to complete her first preview passenger and mail flight over the North Atlantic route from New York today. From here she will continue to England. The Yankee Clipper had left New York Saturday. Following the course which Christopher Columbus took two and a half months to cover, the Dixie Clipper left Port Washington, New York, at 11 o'clock Pacific Standard time this morning with 22 passengers on the first regular passenger transAtlantic flight following the southern route via the Azores.

SLASH SILVER AGAIN

WASHINGTON, D.C.-The United States Treasury Department slashed the price of foreign silver again today from 40c to 381/2c per ounce.

BRITISH ARMY WARNED

LONDON-The War Office has notified the 406,000 officers and men of the Territorial Army to be prepared for a possible emergency at the end of this summer, it is learned. The news came a day after the Admiralty made an annuoncement that the annual fleet movements would be held a month earlier than usual. There have been various reports from the continent that something was going to happen in August when the crews are in and when the German and Italian armies reach peak strength on maneeuvres.

"HOLE IN ONE" ON TONY

NEW YORK-With the world's heavyweight championship fight between Joe Louis and Tony Galento tonight, there is an ominous silence from the Louis camp. If the champion is tired of having Tony Galento call him a "bum" he probably will break par on "Two Ton Tony"-par being a knockout in the first round of their battle.

ROBBERY WITH VIOLENCE

VANCOUVER-A lone gunman slugged E. C. Appleby, jeweller, 81 years of age, in daylight yesterday and escaped from the store with jewellery valued at \$1,000. Appleby suffered fifteen cuts but they are not serious. Two others in the store were not injured.

FIRE AT RICHMOND

RICHMOND-Fire destroyed a lumber mill, butcher shop yesterday causing damage amounting to \$15,000.

SEATTLE-Al Hostak of Seattle regained recognition by the National Boxing Association last night as middleweight heavyweight champion of the world by scoring a technical knockout over Solly Kreiger of Brooklyn after forty-six seconds of fighting in the fourth of a scheduled fifteen rounder. 


