"Military operations in Poland The crux of the issue was repeal have closed and activity now conone German statement last night. An Army communique reported that the eastern front had been cleaned up with the exception of four resistance centres in Poland. Warsaw, however, was still holding out heroically, continuing the defence to the death despite overwhelming and nopeless odds. The city is still under, almost continuous aerial and artillery bombardment but resolutely refuses to surrender. The former capital is virtually destroyed now and the remaining inhabitants are near starvation. Yesterday the Royal Palace was completely destroyed and other great and historic buildings have been razed by the attack of the invaders. With Warsaw remaining in Polish hands, the only fighting reported outside the capital was in the Baltic and in the southeast near Llow. It was stated yesterday that seven Nazi planes had been brought down but this was not confirmed. The Russian army has advanced through Poland toward the Hun-
