### SIR GEORGE DOUGHTY NOT COMING HERE UNTIL JULY

WORK ON PORPOISE ISLAND PLANT NOT TO BEGIN THIS YEAR—WHAT MANAGER WILFRID DOUGHTY SAYS OF SKIDEGATE OPERATIONS.

Wilfrid Doughty, manager of the new fish industry company incorporated as the British Columbian Fisheries Co., Ltd., left this morning on the Prince Rupert for Vancouver, and will probably be away for about a month. One of the objects of his visit is to obtain specifications and let contracts for the enlargement of the plant which the company has purchased from the Simon Leiser Company at Skidegate, where Mr. Doughty spent the last two weeks. The Skidegate is but one of the company's proposed fishing stations, and in regard to it Mr. Doughty spent the last two weeks to have the oil branch of the business there in operation in a few days and the salmon cannery

would be ready to make something of a pack before the end of the present salmon run. The white fish packing plant to be erected he hoped to see completed in the early summer, probably in June. As to the new cannery and packing plant to be established on Porpoise Island, adjoining the Prince Rupert townsite, the company was not contemplating doing any work there this year, but these plans might be changed upon the arrival of his father, Sir George Doughty, president of the company. He would reach Prince Rupert some time in July, and probably would be accompanied by one or two of the London directors of the company.

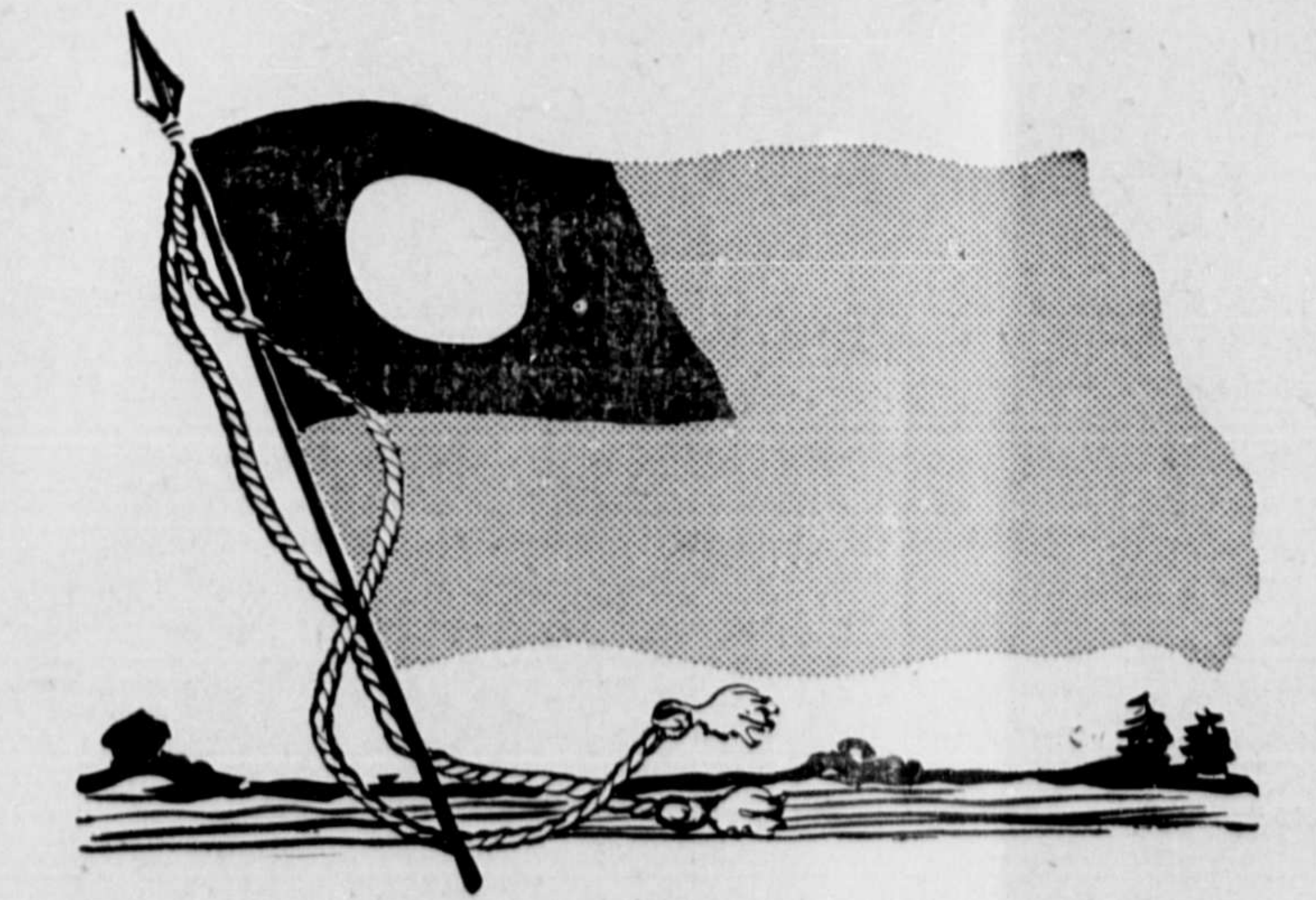

The line is to eventually form a link in another transcontinental system.

### LARGE HOTEL AT NEWTOWN

Railway Company Erecting Three Storey Hostelery Near the Present End of Steel—Will Be One of Number Along the Line.

People who came in on the last Prince Rupert, who in Victoria had seen the plans for the new railway hotel at Newtown, the station before Van Arsdol is reached, say that the plans of the elevation, give a somewhat showy but substantial building of three storeys, with wide piazzas on the first and second floors, wide eaves and many dormer windows—in short, a very handsome building. It is a type of the hotels the company will build at a number of points along the line between here and Fort George, the construction of which will rapidly follow the arrival of the track layers at the several points.

## WARRANTS FOR EIGHTEEN PROMINENT MEN

Charged With Forming a Combination in Restraint of Trade by Monopolizing All Transportation Facilities of Skagway Wharf

(Special to Daily News.)  
Juneau, Feb. 16.—Telegraphic warrants were issued yesterday for the arrest of eighteen business men prominent in the affairs of Alaska and the Pacific coast on four indictments returned by the federal grand jury that has been investigating alleged violations of the Sherman anti-trust law in connection with the control of wharf facilities at Skagway. The following are among the indicted:

- C. E. Houston, head of Pacific Coast Coal Company.
- A. L. Berdoe, formerly vice president and general manager of the White Pass & Yukon Railroad Company.

- J. H. Young, president of the Alaska Steamship Company.
- John P. Bunch, traffic manager of the Alaska Steamship Company.
- E. C. Ward, superintendent of The Pacific Coast Steamship Company.
- F. B. Wurzbacher, C. E. Johnson, E. E. Billingshurst, W. H. Nansen, Ira Bronson, J. W. Smith, F. J. Cushing, W. B. King, V. L. Hahn and G. H. Higbee.

It is charged in the indictment that the North Pacific Wharves and Trading Company, the Pacific Arctic Railway & Navigation Company, the Pacific Coast Coal Company, the Pacific Coast Steamship Company, the Alaska Steamship Company and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company have formed a combination in restraint of trade and in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law to monopolize all transportation facilities at Skagway, the ocean terminus of the White Pass & Yukon Railroad and the principal seaport of Southeastern Alaska.

A presidential campaign is opening across the border, and at the very beginning of it one of the leading candidates found it advisable and good politics to dispense with the services of his leading trumpeter because of the injury he was alleged to be doing to his leader's campaign. The papers have been full of the controversy between Woodrow Wilson, governor of New Jersey and presidential candidate, and his chief supporter, Colonel George Harvey, editor of Harpers' Weekly. Colonel Harvey was whooping up Wilson to beat the band, and flattering himself that Harpers' Weekly was earning a crown of glory in doing so. But he overdid it; his veneer was too thick, and it cracked. Wilson's friends called his attention to these cracks and the thickness of the veneer, declaring it up to nauseating. So Wilson wrote to Colonel George Harvey a very kind letter thanking the editor for his able services and requesting him not to do it again. The Colonel tearfully expostulated and pleaded, but the candidate whispered "Nay, nay, Pauline."

Now, our local member and late mayor must have some political friends, and no doubt they have been thinking it advisable to give Mr. Manson a hint of the way in which his solemn trombone here is trying to beat the band, and their opinion what direful effects this must have upon Mr. Manson's political future, just as the political friends of Governor Wilson warned him of the pernicious and misguided trumpeting of Colonel Harvey. Of course not everybody sees the trombone—a fact for which Mr. Manson may be thankful—and we refrain from publishing more than a tiny sample of the thick and sticky stuff. It is alleged to be what a visitor to Victoria says who had occasion to watch Mr. Manson. That was a rank flat note for the trombone to strike in its pean of adulation; the natural assumption that the member needs watching being apparent. ## UNIQUE BASE FOR A TOWER

Germany Erects One Six Hundred Feet for Wireless from Which to Communicate Direct with New York City.

Berlin, Feb. 14.—At Nauen, which is close to Berlin, a wireless telegraphy station has been established on a tower, which, with the exception of the Eiffel tower in Paris, is declared to be the highest in the world. This tower was originally 300 feet high, but in order to increase the range of the wireless station, it was decided to add another superstructure of 300 feet.

It is possible to communicate from the tower direct to New York. The tower, with its superstructure, is now often lost in the clouds. In appearance it is like a huge mast of iron trellis work springing vertically from the earth's surface toward the sky, from the uppermost extremity of which a nest of wire work stretches toward the ground.

The Nauen tower rests upon a single steel ball let into the earth upon which rests the entire weight of over 600 feet of iron work. Upon a structure of so great a height the wind is naturally very great, and it was therefore decided to allow it a certain amount of "give," and to this end its hollowed base rests upon a single ball, upon which the tower swings to the force of the wind.

### MONTE CARLO FOR BERMUDA

British Islands Turn Down with Scorn Proposition of Syndicate of American Capitalists to Erect Gambling Palace.

Hamilton, Bermuda, Feb. 14.—A proposal made by American capitalists to transform the British islands of Bermuda, 700 miles out in the Atlantic from New York, into an American Monte Carlo has been summarily rejected by Governor Sir Walter Kitchener, brother of Viscount Kitchener, and the Bermuda parliament. It is reported that the Oceana, sailing from New York for this port, will bring another American promoter to the islands with a proposition to establish a big race track here. This project may be received with more favor, but it, too, is likely to be rejected. The tourist traffic to the "Lily Isles" has more than tripled in the last three years, and it is the consensus of opinion among the visitors that the chief charm of the colony is the absence of modern peace destroyers such as railways, trolleys, automobiles and daily newspapers. It was for this reason that a company of Canadian capitalists were refused a franchise for building an electric line to connect the various sections of the islands.

It is said that tentative offers of a million dollars a year were made by the backers of the American Monte Carlo scheme. It was proposed to build a \$3,000,000 casino, the most beautiful "gambling hell" on earth, and thus save Americans who wanted to woo the goddess of chance a twelve day trip to the Prince of Monaco's realm.

### IS SENATOR AT LAST

Former Member for Shelburne Had Long Time to Wait.

Ottawa, Feb. 10.—The vacancy in the Senate, caused by the death of the late Hon. Thomas McKay, will be filled by the appointment of N. W. White, who was member of Parliament for Shelburne, N. S., from 1891 to 1896. This will be, in the eyes of Conservatives, another case of restitution. Mr. White was nominated to the Senate by Sir Charles Tupper, after the defeat of 1896, and was among those whose appointments were vetoed by Lord Aberdeen. It has been a long wait, but he will get into the red chamber at last.

### NEARBY FISH ENTERPRISES OF SIR GEORGE DOUGHTY

CANADIAN FINANCE REFERS TO ISSUANCE OF COMPANY'S PROSPECTUS AND WHAT RAILWAY WILL DO AT PORPOISE ISLAND.

There was recently issued the prospectus of the British Columbian Fisheries, Ltd., offering for subscription at par 125,000 cumulative 7 per cent. participating £1 preference shares, being part of an authorized capital of £250,000, the balance of £125,000 being in the form of £1 deferred shares. The preference shares will be entitled to equal participation with the deferred shares in any profits remaining after the statutory rate of 7 per cent. has been paid on the preference capital.

The company has been formed for the purpose of acquiring certain freehold properties, together with fishing and canning licenses, in British Columbia, and to carry on at Queen Charlotte Islands and elsewhere the business of fishing, canning, curing, packing and the manufacture of flaked fish food, fertilizer, fish oil, etc. Licenses are, I am informed, held direct from the Dominion government, granting seining rights over an area of something in excess of 500 square miles of water, while the grounds covered by the herding licenses are stated to be amongst the most prolific on the Canadian Pacific coast.

The Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Pacific railways have consented to provide for the company, at cost, the freehold of a large part of Porpoise Island, which practically joins the mainland, and possesses an ample water frontage, and also to put in such railway tracks as may be needed. Porpoise Island is generally regarded as likely to become the chief fishing port of the Pacific.

The chairman of the new company will be Sir George Doughty, M. P., who, for some years past, has acted in a similar capacity to the Northeastern Steam Fishing Company of this country. He, together with W. V. Doughty of Grimsby, will undertake the management of the new undertaking for a period of twenty-one years, and his arrangement is regarded as very advantageous to the company.

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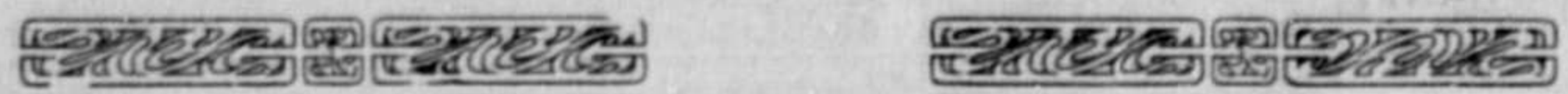

**HALDANE'S PEER IN GERMANY**

Imperial Chancellor of Germany, with Whom British War Minister Conducted the Negotiations for World-Wide Entente.

Berlin, Feb. 16.—The news of the statement made by Premier Asquith in the British House of Commons in reference to the recent visit of Viscount Haldane to this city was favorably commented upon by most of the morning newspapers. The British Minister of War is well known here and his recent reception was of the warmest kind. The Emperor and Empress gave a luncheon in

his honor at the imperial palace, among the notables invited to meet him being Dr. Von Bethmann-Hollweg, the imperial chancellor; Admiral Alfred von Tirpitz, minister of marine, and General Josiah von Heeringen, minister of war.

The Viscount and the German Chancellor exchanged several visits, and the German Foreign Office now seems to be well satisfied with the situation. These four parlors really began last December, when the British government asked the Berlin government whether Germany was willing to entertain a world-wide entente. The negotiations continued since that time and culminated in Lord Haldane's visit.

**WORTH LOOKING UP**

Plenty of Asbestos to Be Met with Near Rupert.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Bell Asbestos Mines was held at Ambler, Pa., U. S. A., resulting in the return of the present officials to serve for the year 1912. Previous to the meeting the board of directors declared a dividend from the result of the mines for the year 1911 of 100 per cent., and also an extra dividend of 25 per cent. The asbestos bearing rock mined by the Bell Asbestos Mines has always been very rich, some reclamations in 1911 having run as high as 14 tons of asbestos fibre to each 100 tons of rock passing through the mill. Mr. George R. Smith, whose supervision as mines manager has been so successful in the past, still continues to care for the material interests of the company.—Canadian Mining Journal.

**BETTER GO SLOW**

Boy Scouts Not Permitted to Use Electric Lights as Targets.

**TO ABOLISH YUKON COURT**

Mr. Justice Craig and Mr. Justice Dugas of the Yukon Court of Appeal May Be Superannuated.

Ottawa, Feb. 12.—It is understood that in the course of a short time the Yukon Court of Appeal will be abolished. This step will involve the superannuation of Judge Craig and Judge Dugas. Legislation passed by the late government establishing this court provided that if conditions should arise in the Yukon to warrant it, one or both of the judges who constitute the Court of Appeals would be superannuated. Existing conditions in the Yukon are said to be such as to warrant the retirement of both judges. The retirement can be effected by order in council, but once the court is abolished it cannot be re-established except by an act of Parliament.
