PARIS, November 18:-German planes dropped propaganda leaflets over France and Switzerland Friday. Trey contained bitter attacks again Great Britain. There were air raid alarms in thirteen! British cities yesterday.

For the second time in twentyfour hours air raid alarm signals were sounded in Lille, northern French city, today, some people hurrying to air raid shelters while others stayed above to look at visiting German planes should they appear. An hour later the "all clear" signal was given. No bombs were dropped.

STRONG SUSPICION

There seems to be a strong suspicion that the bombing at Munich recently was carried out at the instigation of the German army officers or others opposed to the Hitler regime. It is evident on the face of it, that many of the thoughtful Germans cannot be at all pleased at the Hitler policy. Thousands of people in that country would have liked the bombing to have been successful but it was not and it is possible that there will have to be loss of valuable lives before Hitlerism has been eradicated.

This is too old to tell in the news columns but it is in teresting. At Savona, British Columbia, every man joined the colors during the First World War and not one returned. All were killed. We wonder if these men, who died gloriously, were any worse off than the men who remained at home and lived to see a second world war begin




