General Supt. Mehan Today Gives City Hall, Post Office, and All BEAUTIFUL Buildings on the Reserve Marching Orders to Make Way for Advancing Army of Laborers

## G. T. P. INN TO BE MOVED AT ONCE

City Hall and Post Office Must be Vacated in Fifteen Days to Enable Inn to be Moved to New Site. Grounds of New Hotel to be Cleared Along With Depot Site-Engineers Now at Work-Contract for Grading Only Awaits Signature—Rush Work Reported Now Up River

"I am prepared to tell you this morning that I have instructions to go ahead with the excavations for the terminals, also the filling for the dry dock. I have served notice on all parties having buildings on our lands between First avenue and the waterfront to have the buildings removed within the next thirty days to permit us to go ahead with this work.

"We are also starting in at once preparing to remove the G. T. P. Inn building from its present site by Centre street to a site next to the old Kelly-Carruthers

"There is no doubt that the new hotel scheme will be carried on at the same time as the other works starting. Engineers are at present busy upon the details regarding excavations to be don on the site, etc.

# MORSE CREEK MAKES GOOD

Special Test of Fire Protection Pressure Made Yesterday with Excellent Results-New Pumping Station Protects City.

Four lines of two and a half inch hose, through which were driven under fullest pressure streams of water rising to 100 and 150 feet high, showed yesterday afternoon that the new fire protection system established by the Morse Creek pumping station is fully capable of protecting the whole business section. The test was made by Fire Chief Macdonald and the City Engineer. Not a drop of the city's supply of drinking water was used, the whole fire protection supply being drawn from Morse Creek. The pressure at the pumping station never fell a pound all the time the test was in progress, and City Engineer Davis is confident that not only four but six strong streams of water can be maintained from Morse Creek plant unaugmented by the mountain A general meeting of the Prince pressure. ### WILL LARGELY INCREASE OUR WHITE POPULATION.

From whatever source comes an effort calculated to be of public benefit and to better existing conditions it is to be welcomed; the partisan spirit entirely eliminated and the old adage "Never look a gift horse in the mouth" strictly adhered to. It is with this non-partisan sentiment we congratulate Hon. J. D. Hazen, minister of marine and fisheries, on the well directed efforts he appears to be making to better conditions in regard to the fisheries. That he carries out his promises, as he probably will, means much to the people of Northern British Columbia generally and to those of Prince Rupert and its vicinity in particular.

There never was such a bountiful fish harvest in Prince Rupert waters as at the present time, but we would have many more white fishermen engaged as fishermen if there was a ready market for their product. Of course this will regulate itself later; the operation of the Seal Cove plant and the Doughty plant on Porpoise Island will be aids in furnishing better market little's NEWS Agency facilities for white fish, and with this part of the industry Minister Hazen does not appear to have dealt. In a general revision of the whole industry, however, he will probably find certain betterments to make in regard to this.

Salmon is the only fish so far that has called for government regulations, and more particularly in regard to its conservation and reproduction as a sea food. The Minister finds that all these regulations and directly in favor of the cannery 1836 man and discriminate most unjustly against the fisherman. He declares that the latter are in no better condition than serfs, as they are entirely at the mercy of the cannery men, the latter taking just what fish they then require irrespective of the fisherman's catch. This, he declares, shall be abolished. Also, no licenses are to be granted men in mercantile pursuits to be farmed out to others for large sums. These are reforms in the right direction and may carry many other betterments in their train.

Sir George Doughty's first talk in this country about the fishing industry on this coast, when he was here nearly two years ago, was very much quoted at the time and perhaps has had some influence upon the Minister in his desire to build up the fishing industry generally. Sir George then said that the building up of the fishing industry would mean the engagement of a large number of citizens as fishermen and among them and their sons would be found the needed nucleus for the manning of the proposed Canadian navy. The political party which presented Minister Hazen with his portfolio has placed the Canadian navy Zealand, India, China, Japan and on the topmost shelf of a very dark closet for fear Bourassa shall find it and muss it up, so it is not likely Minister Hazen will have the temerity to disturb the gathering dust upon it no matter how much he may have been influenced by the sage, statesmanlike remarks of Sir George.

But what interests us is that not only the words but the active enterprise of the English baronet must tend to largely increase the white population of Prince Rupert, which is to 1 our direct benefit in a like manner to the measures proposed by Minister Hazen to prevent the cannery men from discriminating, as they do now, in favor of Jap fishermen. Wilfrid Doughty stated yesterday, just as he was leaving for Vancouver, that his company intended bringing some families of fishermen from the east coast of England here, and also some of the Newfoundland fishermen. This means the starting of an immigration of workers to this centre and must be of immense public benefit. Let us therefore accord thanks impartially to Minister Hazen and to Sir George.


