NOT BIG AS IT LOOKS

The British losses are not as big as they look. Half of the victims of German lawlessness have been neutral ships that have been sunk by mines or submarines.

Practically every British ship that can float is out hunting mines or submarines or engaged in other wa work. Some of them are not very valuable while others have considerable value. These are strung across the channels leading from Germany to the ocean. Naturall some of them are sure to be lost. But in the meantim Great Britain is building new shins to replace the losses mittee and Canada is also about to begin building.

In view of the situation, the British and French have Association done wonderfully well. It is always easier to attack thar to defend. Undoubtedly the aim of the British is to lose as few lives as possible, depending on the blockade to wir the war. In that she is succeeding so far.

DEFENDING ROUMANIA

Recently Germany made demands upon Roumanis in connection with the supply of oil and other commodi-prices were down 1/3c to 1/4c with ties. This caused trouble in the Roumanian cabinet. The May at 85%c. government resigned and a new cabinet was formed, still more favorable to the cause of the British and French. To back up this new government the British provided then with forty new planes which were flown to Roumania by Roumanian airmen. That should help to strengthen the friendshin between the British and Roumanians and help the Roumanians to defend themselves if attacked.

Britain is hardly in a position to defend Roumanians in the air but if they have good airmen, the planes will strengthen their position very greatly and will make the decimating of that country a formidable job, as the British and French undoubtedly would press forward on the western front if there was an attack by Germany on any other country. British planes have proved superior to the German so far but whether the same planes handled by Roumanians would keep up the record would have to be FOR SALE Bedroom suite, conproved.

INTERNATIONAL FINANCING


