## Franco-British Sea Patrols Active

### Capture of German Ships Taken By Allies In Atlantic In Addition To Two Scuttled

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 25.—British and French patrol ships are reported to have captured three German vessels in the South Atlantic and another has been scuttled to avoid capture. Sources told of the shipping connections told of the captures. The boats captured were the Borkum, Ellbek and Le-Tenerie was scuttled. In addition to one German steamship, the Adolf Wemmann, which was scuttled off the South African coast to avoid capture, her passengers numbering a crew of 127 all being rescued. The Wemmann had slipped off Labito Bay, Portuguese Africa, November 18.

### WAR BILL IS LARGE

Outlay For Conflict Is Enormous, States Minister of Finance In Address

OTTAWA, Nov. 25: (CP)—Canada's war commitments up to March 31 next are placed at \$315,000,000 by the Minister of Finance, Hon. J. L. Ralston, who spoke last night. Contracts are about to be let for construction of anti-submarine and mine-sweeping craft in Canadian yards, the minister stated. Plans were also being prepared for construction of larger craft later. Orders had been placed for \$25,000,000 of war supplies, \$9,000,000 in the United Kingdom and \$10,000,000 in the United States. This was in addition to \$25,000,000 for new railway equipment. The department had been so busy getting organized, said Col. Ralston, that it had been impossible to keep the public fully informed. This was to be rectified, he promised.

### WAGE WAR ON MINES

Government Calls Upon Scientists and Fishermen For Assistance

LONDON, Nov. 25: (CP)—Great Britain has turned to the scientists and fishermen in the fight to cope with German warfare which naval authorities term as a very grave menace. Officials say they have been unsuccessful in bringing German magnetic mines to the surface for inspection and hence are severely handicapped. Meantime experts are trying to find a counter-weapon. Naval authorities are convinced that one will be found. A splinter fleet of wooden ships may solve the German mine menace, it is believed by the British Admiralty. Wooden fishing smacks have been being right through the mine fields without being harmed, it is reported. Fishermen are intensifying their efforts to sweep the sea lanes clear of nefarious machines. Mines sank another British vessel, the steamer Mangalore, yesterday. The 8000-ton vessel was riding at anchor close to shore and its sinking was witnessed by large crowds of spectators. The crew of twenty-seven all escaped safely. Twenty-six lives were lost in the 3100-ton Dutch tanker Sliedrecht which was torpedoed November 16, it was disclosed yesterday.

### DAMAGE IS ADMITTED

Cruiser Belfast Was In Trouble After All

LONDON, Nov. 25.—The British Admiralty officially admits the damaging of the crack cruiser Belfast by a submarine or mine in the heavily fortified Firth of Forth naval base. Twenty members of the Belfast's crew were injured. The damaging of the Belfast by a submarine which slipped into the Firth of Forth had been previously reported but the report was not accorded confirmation. Repairs have already commenced.

### Trade Between Canada-India

War is Causing it to Increase—Manufactured Products Required

OTTAWA, Nov. 25: (CP)—The war is resulting in an increase in trade between Canada and India. Motorvehicles, newsprint, machinery, etc. are required by India.

### ITALY ON BLOCKADE

Suggests to Britain and France Not To Interfere With Her Trade

ROME, Nov. 25.—Count Ciano, Italian foreign minister, called the French ambassador and the British charge d'affaires into conference to discuss the Allied blockade of German imports and exports. No official statement was made but Ciano is said to have reminded his callers that Italy was interested in seeing that its commerce was not interfered with. Germany was one of Italy's important customers and Italy did not wish that trade disrupted.

### INTRIGUE IS SEEN

More Reports About Two British Agents Accused of Being Involved in Munich Beer Cellar Bombing

LONDON, Nov. 25: (CP)—Authorities said that two Britons seized by the German Gestapo on the German-Netherlands frontier November 9 were endeavouring to find out if a German Peace offer was bonafide. These sources said that Captain Richard Stevens and Sigismund Best were acting with the knowledge of the British government when they were kidnapped. The Germans say they are held for complicity in the attempt on Chancellor Adolf Hitler's life in the Munich beer cellar bombing. Reports regarding the whole affair are very conflicting and confusing. It is difficult to sift the facts from the propagandas.

### NEW GOV'T IS NEUTRAL

Roumania Will Try To Keep Herself Out of Entanglement In War

BUCHAREST, Roumania, Nov. 25.—The new cabinet of Roumania was sworn in tonight. It pledges itself to a neutral course in international affairs and will work for unification, reconstruction and coordination. The new Prime Minister says the government will come directly under King Carol. It will organize the military and industrial forces of the nation to the highest level as a matter of protection.

### Want Decrease In Beer Price

Parlor Operators In British Columbia Urge Government To Make Cut

VICTORIA, Nov. 25: (CP)—Beer parlor operators of British Columbia are urging the British Columbia government to reduce the wholesale prices. Following the new federal war taxes on liquor, the wholesale price of beer was raised from \$22.50 to \$25 per barrel but the retail price remained unchanged. This condition cannot continue, the beer parlor operators declare.

### DEUTSCHLAND NOT TAKEN

Berlin Denies Capture of Pocket Battleship by Allies

BERLIN, Nov. 25.—It is officially reported that the German pocket battleship Deutschland, which has been at large on the high seas for some weeks, is still in German hands. It had been reported in London that the ship had been captured by Allied war vessels in the Atlantic Ocean. The British admiralty did not confirm the report.

### WAR TURNS FROM SKY

Allies Continue to Bring Down Many German Planes—All Nazis Can Boast of is Three

PARIS, Nov. 25: (CP)—The Allies report continuing triumphs in aerial combat on the Western Front as the war turns downwards. The French say their aviators shot down eleven German aircraft in the past three days. Royal Air Force headquarters say the British destroyed nine German planes in two days. In Berlin the German High Command claimed that German planes had brought down three Allied aircraft and the German fliers returned unharmed from "frequent air fights" with the enemy. The aerial combat activity, after having been quite intensive on the western front during the week, is reported in a French communique to have subsided. The communique said that an enemy infantry raid east of the Moselle River had been unsuccessful. There was local artillery action and "we took a few prisoners." The allies claim that the Germans have lost some 100 planes since the war commenced, eighty-five having fallen in Allied territory so their destruction could be officially confirmed. In Berlin an official German statement declares that Allied reports of air victories have been greatly exaggerated. Since the war started, according to the Germans, they have lost only twenty planes including those destroyed in accidents. On the other hand, fifty-two British planes have been shot down, the Germans claim.

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### EMPRESSES WITHDRAW

New Trans-Pacific Shipping Arrangements Have To Be Made To Handle Oriental Cargo

SEATTLE, Nov. 25: (CP)—The Seattle Port Commission has telegraphed a request to the United States Maritime Commission for American refrigerator ships to replace two Canadian Pacific liners which have been withdrawn from the Oriental trade. Eastern Washington shippers were informed by Col. C. W. Bickford of Seattle, port manager, of the cancelling of shipments on the steamers Empresses of Japan and Russia. They said they were notified that the ships had been transferred to "other services."

### Irish Republican Army Again Busy

Bombings Last Night in London and Birmingham Are Attributed to it

LONDON, Nov. 25: (CP)—A new outbreak of bombing terrorism is blamed upon the Irish Republican Army. There were bombings last night in London and Birmingham in telephone booths and mail boxes.

### New York Stock Mart Has Break

Lack of Buying Interest Caused Slump In Prices Yesterday

NEW YORK, Nov. 25.—The New York stock market had one of its widest breaks since the war began on Friday. Lack of buying interest was evident. The breaks were as much as four points. The turnover totalled 820,000 shares. The industrial average at closing was 148.47, down 1.87; rails, 32.93, down 1.87; utilities, 25.41.

## Blistering Machine Gun Fire and Withering Artillery Cut Up Encircling Movement East of Moselle River

PARIS, November 25: (CP)—Blistering machine gun fire and withering artillery cut up an attempted encircling movement by the Germans on French outposts on the Western Front today ten miles east of the Moselle River. The Nazi forces were driven back with heavy casualties in dead, wounded and prisoners. It was the first land engagement of any consequence for several days. There was also patrol and light artillery action near Saarbruechen. Later in the day rain and snow conditions returned after several clear, cold days and the possibility of a major German drive appears to have been once more eliminated for the time being at least. There were light troop movements in the Aix-la-Chapelle area.

### Bulletins

DONT LIKE BLOCKADE  
COPENHAGEN—Denmark yesterday joined other neutrals in their protest to Great Britain at the plan to interfere with neutral shipping in order to intensify blockade of both exports and imports of Germany. The other nations protesting are Japan, Italy, Sweden, Holland and Belgium. Japan is the only nation so far to threaten neutrals. The attitude in London to these protests, it is reported here is that they should be addressed to Germany as having made the move necessary by Great Britain.

REGULATIONS EASED  
PARIS—Certain war regulations in southwest France and Corsica, which had been imposed for economic reasons, were lifted today.

GERMANY PROTESTS  
BERLIN—The German press lashed out today against Great Britain for reviving the use of Q-ships, armed merchantmen. It was claimed that a 7,000-ton British merchantman, disguised as a neutral, had been destroyed by a submarine which it had attacked. More intensified submarine warfare was threatened by Germany. In London the Admiralty said it had no information of the incident mentioned by Germany.

VICTIM OF OWN MINE  
COPENHAGEN—A 700-ton German patrol ship struck a mine in the north of the German mine fields and sank. It went down three minutes after an explosion.

SURROUND BRITISH ISLES  
BERLIN—"Germany will fire ten shells for every one fired by Great Britain," says a Nazi government spokesman who predicts that, within two months, the Reich will have the British Isles surrounded.

### Visitors From Air

German Aircraft Make Calls on Shetland Islands and Scotland Again Today

LONDON, November 25: (CP)—For the ninth time in four weeks, a German bomber flew over the Shetland Islands today. There was only one ship. No raid warning was given and no bombs were dropped. The visitor was driven off by British pursuit planes and anti-aircraft gunfire. In southwestern Scotland there was a 37-minute air raid alarm signal but no planes were sighted.

### Railways Ready To Handle Much Greater Traffic

VANCOUVER, Nov. 25: (CP)—Speaking here last night S. W. Fairweather, special representative of the Canadian National Railways, said that Canadian railways were now able to handle twice as much traffic as in 1917. Mr. Fairweather was speaking before the Vancouver Board of Trade.

### Highway Scouts On Way South

Williams and Logan Now In Cariboo District on Way To Vancouver

PRINCE GEORGE, Nov. 25: (CP)—Slim Williams and John Logan, Alaska Highway motorcycle scouts on their way to New York after traversing the Telegraph Creek to Hazelton route for the highway, yesterday headed through the Cariboo district for Vancouver and Victoria after a brief stay here.

### Contraband Control Under Discussion

Subject of Special Session of Belgian Cabinet

BRUSSELS, Nov. 25.—The Belgian cabinet was called into session last night to consider Allied contraband control measures which have been already made the subject of protest both by Belgium and Holland.

### WARM IN INTERIOR

Open weather continues unusually late in the central interior this fall. A weather report from Hazelton this morning said the temperature was 43 above with no snow on the ground as yet.

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## EDITORIALS

### NOT BIG AS IT LOOKS

The British losses are not as big as they look. Half of the victims of German lawlessness have been neutral ships that have been sunk by mines or submarines.

Practically every British ship that can float is out hunting mines or submarines or engaged in other war work. Some of them are not very valuable while others have considerable value. These are strung across the channels leading from Germany to the ocean. Naturally some of them are sure to be lost. But in the meantime Great Britain is building new ships to replace the losses and Canada is also about to begin building.

In view of the situation, the British and French have done wonderfully well. It is always easier to attack than to defend. Undoubtedly the aim of the British is to lose as few lives as possible, depending on the blockade to win the war. In that she is succeeding so far.

### DEFENDING ROUMANIA

Recently Germany made demands upon Roumania in connection with the supply of oil and other commodities. This caused trouble in the Roumanian cabinet. The government resigned and a new cabinet was formed, still more favorable to the cause of the British and French. To back up this new government the British provided them with forty new planes which were flown to Roumania by Roumanian airmen. That should help to strengthen the friendship between the British and Roumanians and help the Roumanians to defend themselves if attacked.

Britain is hardly in a position to defend Roumanians in the air but if they have good airmen, the planes will strengthen their position very greatly and will make the decimating of that country a formidable job, as the British and French undoubtedly would press forward on the western front if there was an attack by Germany on any other country. British planes have proved superior to the German so far but whether the same planes handled by Roumanians would keep up the record would have to be proved.

### INTERNATIONAL FINANCING

The intricacies of international financing and effect on the standing of big Canadian undertakings was interestingly discussed by Colonel J. W. Nicholls in an address to the Rotary Club this week, a report of which was published yesterday. There is a possibility that the reaction of the Canadian public would be the means of solving one of Canada's great national problems when the war is over.

### Sleeveless Sweater

Red Cross Specifications Two No. 7 needles (if tight knitter, use No. 6).

Nine to ten ounces four-ply fingering wool (double knitting).

For back, cast on eighty stitches. Knit two plain, two purl for four inches. Knit plain until sweater measures twenty-three inches in all. Knit twenty-eight stitches and slip onto extra needle. Bind off next twenty-four stitches for neck and knit remaining twenty-eight stitches for ten ridges to form shoulder. Then at opening of neck knit six stitches, make one and knit to end of row. Increase as above every second ridge until there are forty stitches on the needles. This will form V for neck. Break wool and join to other shoulder and knit the same way as the other side. Then knit the eighty stitches plain until, with the ten ridges of shoulder, it measures nineteen inches. Then four inches of ribbing. This finishes the front. Sew up sides leaving eight inches for armholes. Finish armholes and neck with one row of loose single crochet.

Then pour over the last of the sauce. Cover with a pastry or biscuit crust and bake at 400 degrees for 20 to 30 minutes. Serves five to six.

## DELIVERY OF SWINE

Farmers of Central Interior Getting Stock Under National Bacon-Hog Policy

Fifty-five bacon type sows and three boars were ordered by farmers in Central British Columbia under the National Bacon Hog Policy sponsored by the Dominion and provincial Governments and the Canadian National Railways.

The majority of the pigs were placed in Prince George and Vanderhoof districts though sows will be distributed from McBride to Smithers. Under the policy boars are to be supplied free to districts ordering a certain number of sows. Prince George and Vanderhoof have qualified for this concession.

The sows will be distributed by way-freight starting from McBride.

This shipment of breeding stock together with the sows already in the district will enable producers to co-operate and ship by carload to the processing plants, thus relieving an aggravating situation where the district is producing more pigs than can be marketed locally and insufficient to ship out by carload lots.

## SPORT CHAT

# Waterfront Whiffs

## First Herring Haul of Season From Prince Rupert Harbor—Halibutters Preparing For Seattle Conference

The first haul of herring of the season from Prince Rupert Harbor was made last night when the Vancouver seineboat Good Partner, Capt. Nordhus, made a set and brought in twenty tons. The run is commencing to develop along more substantial lines and it is expected that the fishery will be getting into action without delay. There is an active demand for herring this winter for use in the reduction plants, as halibut bait and also for use in new product processing. Herring will be handled this winter at Tucks Inlet, Port Edward, Pacoff, Butedale and Namu reduction and processing plants.

Halibut boat owners and fishermen are busy these days considering representations to be made at the forthcoming conference in Seattle with the International Fisheries Commission. A. J. Whitmore of Ottawa and L. W. Patmore of Victoria will be here in about a week, it is expected, for a preliminary conference.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 4:30 this morning from the south and sailed at 8 a. m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

With a shipment of frozen fish from Ketchikan for transfer to the Canadian National Railways for delivery to the United States, Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Coast, Capt. A. J. Borklund, is due in port tonight or tomorrow morning from Alaska on her way to Seattle.

# ROAD VOTE ANNOUNCED

VICTORIA, Nov. 25: (CP)—The maintenance vote for roads, bridges, ferries, wharves for 1940-41 in British Columbia tabled in the Legislature last night, included \$15,000 for Prince Rupert riding and \$29,000 for Skeena.

Attorney General Gordon Wismer announced that he would submit a bill to pay magistrates and justices of the peace of outlying districts directly by the government, eliminating the present method by which they collect their fees from convictions.

During the presentation of finance department estimates, E. T. Kenney, M.L.A. for Skeena, urged some plan to save farmers and small business men being sold out for taxes. Hon. John Hart, minister of finance, said that every opportunity was being given them to work out their arrears.

In an effort to settle the dispute between Doukhobors and the Sun Life Assurance Co. and the National Trust Co. over mortgage foreclosure on land in the West Kootenay, it was announced by Premier Pattullo that the provincial government would acquire the land, settle with the companies and sell it back to the Doukhobors on an individual rather than a community basis. The bill introduced by the Premier empowers the government to acquire all West Kootenay lands involved in the foreclosure actions.

Premier T. D. Pattullo announced legislation whereby pedestrians walking on roads where there are no sidewalks will be required to walk on the left hand side facing vehicular traffic. They will be required to walk on sidewalks where such exist.
