No Compulsory Military Duty In Canada As Yet; Volunteers Being Asked

OTTAWA, August 26: (CP)—Defence Minister Ian Mackenzie announced last night that volunteers will be called from the non-permanent militia at once to bolster up the permanent force in such special military duties as manning coastal defences and guarding "certain vulnerable points."
The minister's statement made it clear that "no officer or man shall be under compulsion to report for duties considered necessary for national security at this time."
Canada's air force units were ordered yesterday to be in readiness to move to stations they will occupy in case of war.

POLAND ACCEPTS BUT GERMANY TURNS DOWN ROOSEVELT PROPOSAL

United States Chief Executive, However, Makes Another Appeal to Hitler—Still Hopes For Ultimate European Peace

WASHINGTON, D.C., August 26: (CP)—President Ignace Moscicki of Poland late last night accepted the conciliatory suggestion of President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States and agreed to refrain from hostilities provided that Germany also agreed to do so. Despite rebuff of a previous peace overture, President Roosevelt last night addressed a second appeal to Chancellor Adolf Hitler to settle the Danzig issue by negotiation rather than by war.

German Bomber Brought Down?

PARIS, Aug. 26: (CP)—A Haras News Agency dispatch from Warsaw early today said that Polish anti-aircraft batteries at Odynia shot down a German bomber late last night.

ARMS CALL TO FRANCE

Daladier, Though Appealing For Peaceful Settlement, Assures Poland Of Her Stand

PARIS, August 26:—Premier Edouard Daladier, addressing the French nation and the world yesterday afternoon, called France to arms and repeated assurances to Poland that France would be behind that nation in any resistance of aggression. The French nation was ready to make any sacrifice in the interests of peace and liberty. Daladier also made an eleventh hour appeal for settlement of problems by negotiations and pointed out that the very lives of 33,000,000 Poles were involved in the present crisis.

Berlin Insists That Polish Issue Is Being Peacefully Met; Feuhrer Calling Halt

TURNING POINT SAID TO HAVE COME EARLY THIS MORNING—EARLIER PREPARATIONS BY REICH FOR INVASION SAID TO HAVE BEEN RESCINDED

"REALLY BIG DECISIONS" BEING ARRIVED AT IN BERLIN, ROME, PARIS AND LONDON SAYS OFFICIAL GERMAN GOVERNMENT SPOKESMAN

BERLIN, August 26: (CP)—All contrary indications notwithstanding, it was reliably stated in Berlin today that Chancellor Adolf Hitler was now definitely moving for a peaceful settlement of the Polish issue. The turning point, a spokesman contended, had come at 2 o'clock this morning. At that time, the informant said, an order to begin operations along the Polish border at Danzig was rescinded. The informant stuck to his viewpoint that war had been averted even when he was showing later developments including Germany's prohibition of private aviation, the stoppage of boat service to Danzig, cancellation of a large number of trains and designation of Upper Silesia as an "area of military operations." All these measures, the informant said, had been decided upon earlier and were now being executed as it always took time for an order from the top to come through to those who must give it effect. High Army quarters, the informant said, had strongly advised Hitler to show the same willingness to negotiate that Polish President Moscicki had shown in his reply to President Roosevelt. The result, the informant said, was British Ambassador Sir Neville Henderson's mission to London today. Paris and Rome were also advised of Hitler's latest offer, the informant said. This assertion was borne out by information divulged by a government spokesman this morning to the effect that "really big decisions" are being arrived at in Berlin, Rome, Paris and London. At 2 o'clock this morning telephone and telegraph communications with foreign countries were resumed after an interruption of seven hours.

All Germans Ordered Home

LONDON, August 26: (CP)—The German embassy in London yesterday instructed all Germans in Great Britain to leave as soon as possible for home.

WATCH OF RHINE ON

PARIS, August 26:—A million French soldiers now stand posted on the Maginot Line while, immediately across the Rhine River a like number of Germans stand by the Siegfried Line.

Nations Of Europe Continue Feverish Preparations With Hitler's Next Move Awaited

BERLIN, August 25: (CP)—Germany, like the other nations of Europe, continued feverish preparations for war today although it was still insistently denied that, despite irritation of Polish incidents, many of which were reported here, that German troops had not at any point crossed the frontier into Poland. Rumors to this effect were described in an official German communique last night as being "wholly groundless."

Premier King of Canada Joins In Plea For Peace

CANADIAN PRIME MINISTER SENDS MESSAGES DIRECT TODAY TO MUSSOLINI, HITLER AND MOSCICKI

OTTAWA, August 26: (CP)—A message has been sent by Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King to Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy, Chancellor Adolf Hitler of Germany and President Ignace Moscicki of Poland urging them to use their great power and authority to avoid war. The message was sent through the consuls in Canada of Italy, Germany and Poland. The message said: "The people of Canada are of one mind in believing there is no international problem which cannot be settled by conference and negotiation. They equally believe that force is not a substitute for reason."
Mr. King added: "The people of Canada are prepared to join what authority and power they may possess to that of other nations of the British Commonwealth in seeking a just and equitable settlement of the great problems with which the nations are faced."
The messages were sent after a meeting of the cabinet council yesterday but were not released until today when those to whom they were addressed would have received them.

Local Militia Unit Called Out Today To Volunteer For Defence Duty, Parade 2 p.m.

The war fever struck Prince Rupert directly this morning when it became known that members of the local militia unit, the 102nd Battery, Royal Canadian Artillery, had been called out to volunteer for home defence duty. The local order came several hours after Canadian Press dispatches received by the Daily News had announced that such action was to be taken in connection with Canadian militia units.

Meantime, Lieut. Col. S. D. Johnston, commanding officer of the local unit, ordered his men to parade at 2 o'clock this afternoon to receive instructions for future duty which would be on a voluntary basis. As the local unit consists of 135 men, the muster order effects the employees of a number of local business and industrial establishments. Col. Johnston would reveal no details of what the nature of his unit's activities would be nor of any arrangements that had been made. He admitted, however, that there would be definite duties for all to do. It would appear that these duties would, for the time being at least, be of local character and purely as a precautionary measure.

NO WAR!

Peaceful Settlement Under Way, Says Associated Press Informant

BERLIN, August 26: (CP)—One of the best informants of Associated Press insisted today that compromise in the German-Polish crisis is under way and declared with optimism that "danger of a world war is definitely averted."

NO DECISION
LONDON—The Cabinet adjourned tonight after sitting two-and-a-half hours without reaching any decision on the acceptability of Hitler's peace proposals. Another meeting will be held at 9:30 a.m. tomorrow. Throughout the day, despite indications of negotiations, there was a tendency in British quarters to restrain optimism and military preparations went ahead rapidly.

EDITORIALS

HITLER'S PROPOSALS

We cannot see how it would be possible for Britain, France and Poland to agree, under stress of threats from Hitler, to the terms which he demands. They know well that Germany has not carried out her pledges so far and that she has no respect for treaties. They are only scraps of paper to be torn up as it suits the Germans. They also must know that if they yield now they may as well throw up the sponge and give Hitler a suzerainty over the British Empire including Canada. Evidently Hitler feels confident that, with a great show of arms, he can terrorize the rest of the world. If he can do that now he will be in a very much better position to do it later.

We have not studied the original of "Mein Kampf" but we remember that Norway and Sweden are included in the Hitler plans to become part of the Reich. Also a number of other countries including Italy and Great Britain, eventually.

We are strongly of the opinion that the only time to stop the mad dog of Europe is now before he gets so strong that nothing can stop him. If the European nations give way now it will be construed that they are afraid to fight and Hitler will wipe up everything in sight without regard to treaties.

We realize that anything we say does not affect the decisions. If we felt that an honest deal could be made with Hitler we would think it should be made now but we do not feel that his word is worth anything. The only thing he understands is force. Possibly, by the time this is read, a decision will have been reached. It will be a momentous decision, one that may affect the destinies of the whole world. We trust that it be a wise one.

CHINA BECOMING STRONGER

China continues to carry out the policy laid down at commencement of the war with Japan. She is gradually and steadily developing an army now numbering close to two and a half million men. One third of these are operating under orders from Chang Kai Shek in the partially occupied country behind the Japanese lines. Another third is holding the ground against the Japanese on the western front and the final third is being trained for the big drive when the Japanese are to be forced to evacuate and return to their own country or be cut off by the enemy. The Japanese now occupy seaports and large cities but the country generally is still in the hands of the Chinese.

Dr. P. C. Chang says the war may last another year or it may last three years. It is a similar kind of war to that of the allies against Germany during the first three years and which ended in the total collapse of the German fighting machine. The war has unified China as it never was before and the centre of the country is now located in the western provinces. A new nation is being built, a modern nation with modern training, education and fighting forces. A quarter of a million refugees from the east have already been settled in the western provinces and granaries built in which to store their produce. They are cultivating virgin land.

Most of the activities of Japan have of late been directed against outside nations and not against the Chinese. This has had very little effect on the situation. Evidently China is still determined to win and if she can carry on as she is doing today she probably will win. All depends upon the ability to hold to her present policy.

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HIS PRICE FOR PEACE IS STATED

Return of Danzig and Road Across Polish Corridor Immediate Demands of Hitler—Removal of Versailles Grievances

LONDON, Aug. 26.—Late last night the terms became known of the new peace proposal in the Danzig issue which was presented yesterday by Chancellor Adolf Hitler to the ambassadors of Great Britain, France, Italy and other nations. Sir Neville Henderson, the British ambassador, flew last night to London carrying the plan for submission to his superior, Foreign Secretary Halifax, who took it up immediately with the government. In Berlin it was felt that war might be postponed if not averted. The feeling here was not so confident.

Hitler, asking serious consideration and an immediate reply pending receipt of which he would postpone making an official declaration to his people and the delivery of an ultimatum to Poland, demands immediate return of Danzig to the Reich and would accord Poland port privileges in Danzig in return for a 15-mile road across the Polish Corridor to connect Germany proper with East Prussia. Hitler offers to enter into negotiations for a permanent settlement of the Polish corridor question and to conclude a 10-year non-aggression pact with Poland. Hitler also seeks control of other parts of Poland where population is preponderantly German.

Failure of Poland to agree to the return of Danzig to Germany will result, Hitler said, in declaring Danzig a part of the Reich and giving to Poland of a time limit to agree to the return, on expiry of which occupation would be made. Hitler, in his proposal to Great Britain, further stated that he was prepared to enter into a twenty-five year non-aggression pact with Great Britain providing there was agreement upon the removal of the last of the grievances of the treaty of Versailles including the ultimate return to Germany of war lost colonies. On these terms, Hitler also offers to enter into a general disarmament pact and an agreement for general economic co-operation in Europe.

Nazi officials declared that Poland had completely lost control of her military forces as evidenced by a number of irresponsible attacks which had been made on German airplanes and by other incidents. If she did not at once conclude an agreement with Germany, the nation will have committed suicide.

Waterfront Whiffs

Huge Fish, Strange to Local Waters Though Resembling Salmon, Is Seen —Halibut Landings Pick Up Considerably

A huge and graceful fish, resembling closely the salmon type but far larger and an undoubted stranger in British Columbia coast waters, was recently seen in Whale Channel, Campania Sound, off Princess Royal Island, south of Prince Rupert. The persons who sighted this fish make no strange sea serpent or Ogopogo claims regarding it.

It was on a fine, sunny afternoon that the great fish came close alongside the Forest Branch cruiser Alpine Fir to be plainly seen for some time by Ranger Carman Gibson and Engineer Ole Urseth as well as by Harry Scott, well known coast hand logger, who was also in the neighborhood with his boat Leila. The fish is described as being about forty feet long and possibly six feet in width. It was swimming about six feet below the surface of the water in leisurely fashion and unafraid so it could be quite easily seen. It was of a silvery, grey color and even had markings resembling those of a salmon. It was a graceful fish with none of the freakish characteristics so often attributed to so-called sea serpents. Its movements were entirely those of a normal fish. Its enormous size was the unusual feature. Trollers thereabouts are also reported to have seen it. The generally accepted theory appears to be that it may

have been some kind of a tropical fish which had come this far north in pursuit of tuna which have been reported in considerable numbers this year in waters off the Northern British Columbia coast.

After a couple of very light weeks, halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert revived during the past week with vessels from the Area No. 3 grounds bringing in catches totalling 504,700 pounds of which 245,200 pounds was from fifteen Canadian boats and 259,500 pounds from eleven American bottoms. The grand total of landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1939 season up to and including yesterday was 12,490,400 pounds consisting of 5,792,100 pounds from Canadian and 6,698,300 pounds from American vessels. Prices during the week showed a tendency to weaken. For Canadian fish the high price of the week was 10c and 6c paid the R.W. and Thrasher for catches of 14,500 and 2,000 pounds respectively while the low Canadian price was 7c and 5c which the Dovre B. received for 27,000 pounds. For American fish the high price of the week 10.7c and 7c which the Arcade was paid for 14,500 pounds and the low 8c and 6c which the Visitor received for 7,000 pounds.

Bringing in his power boat Leila for repairs to a bent shaft, the result of having struck a rock, Harry Scott arrived in port on Wednesday from Squally Channel on the West Coast of Princess Royal Island where he is now engaged in hand logging. Harry was accompanied by his good pooch, Spud. Repairs having been completed from the Fishermen's Co-operative cradle, departure was made this morning on the return down the coast.

Running more than twelve hours late on account of heavy cannery freights, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 2 p.m. today from the south, sailing later this afternoon on her return to Vancouver and way points.

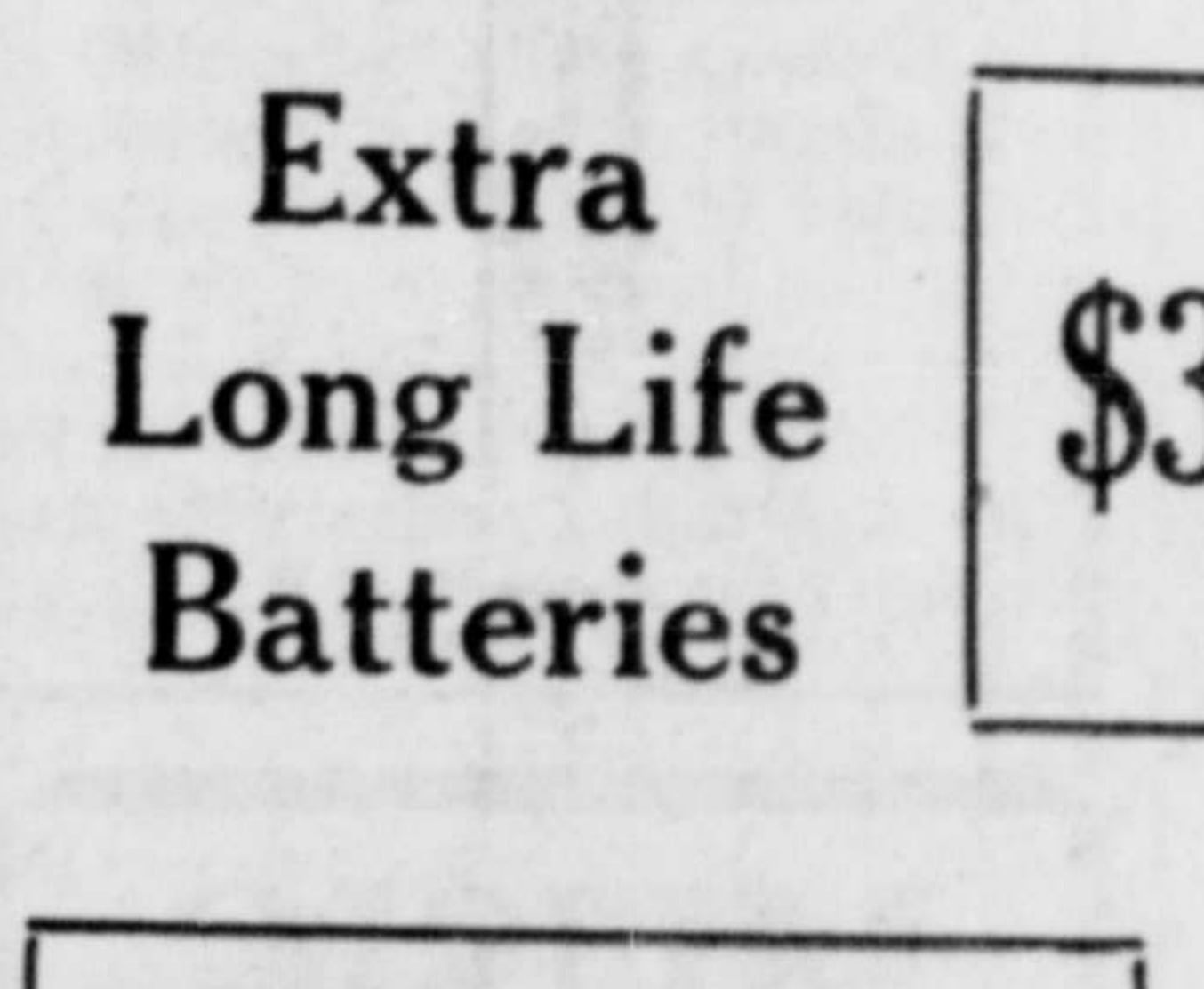

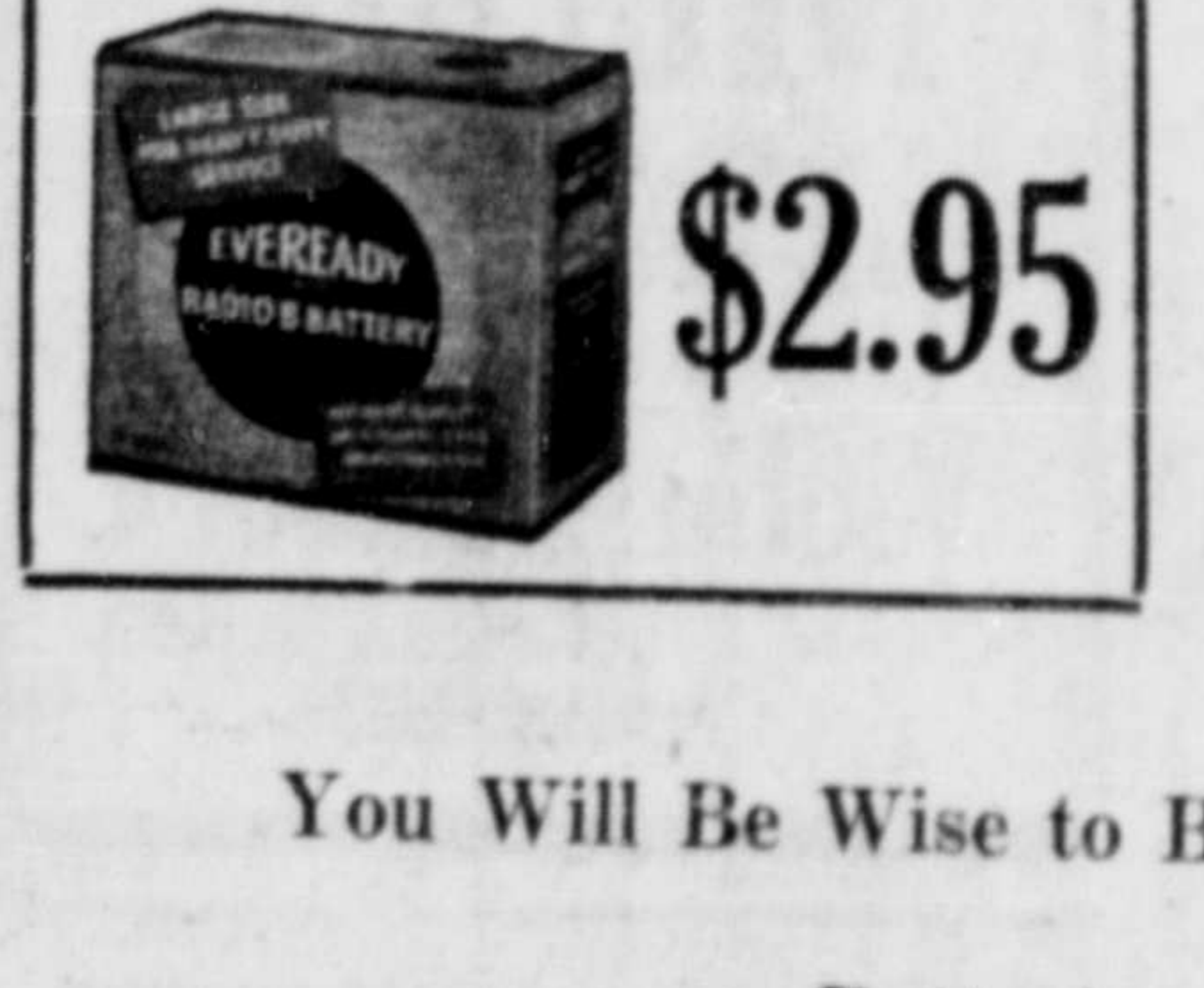

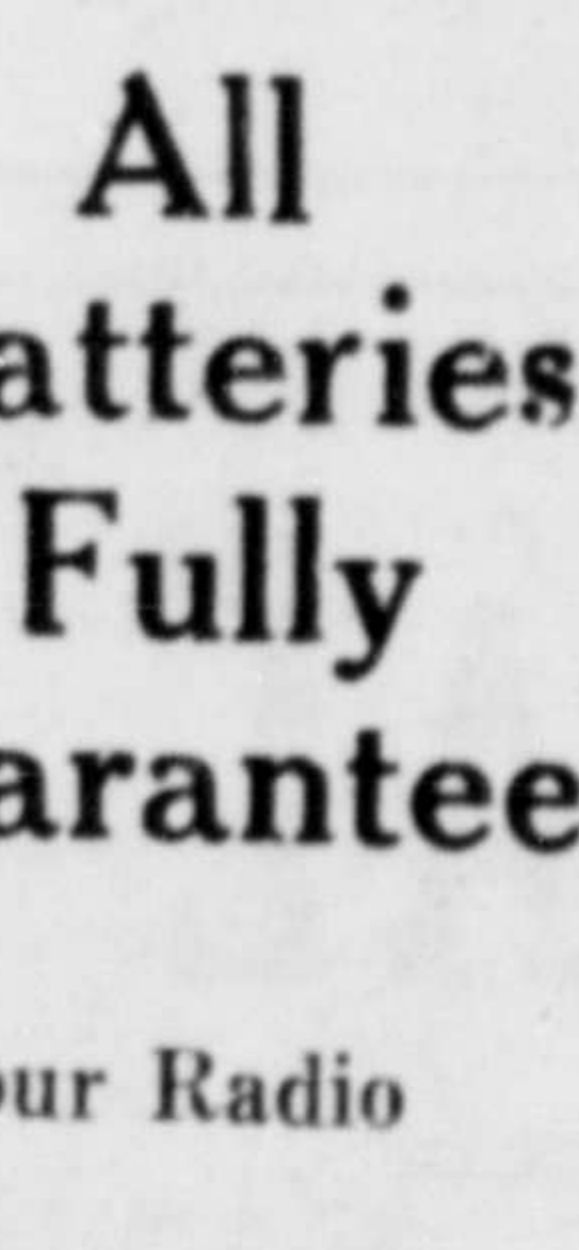
