DEATH OF POPE PIUS

The death of Pope Pius XI removes one of the outstanding world figures of the present time. His passing mas an event that had been expected so it came as no surprise to those who were in close touch with European af. Town 1 Tanes.

The late Pope, although over eighty years of age, took charbon t. Manchester 1. a keen interest in world affairs right up to the time of his death. He had at his finger ends the very latest information on all world movements, subersive or for the betterment of the people. Naturally, he took a very keen leterest in world polities and especially in European affairs. Rivery new siduation was viewed from the point of view of its relation to universal betterment and to the point of the view of the betterment of the Catholic Church of which he was head. He considered, and many share his view, that "If it was for the church, it was for the good of humanity."

Being head of the Catholic Church is one of the most difficult positions in the world because there are Catholies in every country in the world and often the views of the people of these countries are greatly at variance with each other. In Canada alone, practically half the population is nominally, at any rate, Roman Catholic; the exact number, accombing to the last census being 4,265,368. At that time the total population of Canada was given at 10. 376.78%. For the past seventy years the proportion of Catholics to the rest of the population has been about the same. Away back in 1871 the number of Catholies was given as 1,449 NESs against a total population in the same near of 3,485,761.

In view of these figures it is plain to see that the persomality of the Pope means a great deal to Canada. influence is tremendous in this country as in practically every country in the world. It is plain, then, that the prayers of Catholics and Protestants might well be directed to siding the Spered College (College of Cardinals) its efforts during the coming weeks to secure the best posaffile successor to the man who has just passed away.





Mr. Justice Humphrey Mellish of Nova Scotia Supreme Court ordered Veregin's release finding his removal from jail before expiration of his sentence amounted to a pardon which wiped out the crime.

Bolstered by an opinion of the Supreme Court of Canada that authorities had acted within the Northwest Broadcast and Service law in deportation plans, a second attempt to deport Veregin was made four months later.
