CANADA'S POSITION

The interpretation of the Constitution of Canada by Prime Minister Mackenzie King is that, when the Empire is at war, Canada is at war but that it is for Parliament to decide the extent to which she shall participate. A writer in "The Canadian Unionist," Toronto, contends that, while this is true, Canada could easily declare her right to take the initiative by passing an act of Parliament claiming the right as a sovereign state owing allegiance to King George to decide whether the country is at war or not.

Evidently, this is a time when the very life of the Empire is threatened so we do not think it a suitable time to make such a declaration. It might be looked upon as a weakening of empire ties which would be most undesirable at a time like this when unity is most desirable. The writer of the article referred to admits that the result would be the same. Canada would, if war were declared, at once swing in with the rest of the Empire and help to defend it, but he thinks Canadians should have the right to say what they desire.

WHERE IT RAINS

Anywhere on the coast of British Columbia there is plenty of rain except occasionally at the southern tip of Vancouver Island where the rainfall goes well below thirty inches in a season. In Prince Rupert last year it was over seventy and about the same at Vancouver.

At the foot of the Himalaya Mountains when an expedition fought its way through the timber barrier to get to China its members sat for 24 hours when 30 inches of rain fell. As much as 150 inches of rain in a month was recorded and 610 inches in a year. That's where it rains.

THROUGH EDMONTON TO ALASKA

After years prospecting, agitating and planning in which first Hon. Dr. S. F. Tolmie, Conservative leader, and later Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Liberal leader, took the spotlight, the Alaska Highway plan seemed likely to prove successful. Then comes F. S. Wright of Edmonton and formerly of Prince Rupert, editor of the Northwest Miner, and urges a route through Edmonton, giving British Columbia the go-by. The Ketchikan Chronicle commenting on this says:

"Right here it is well to not lose sight of the fact that Edmonton, the prairie provinces and the mid-west states have very little if any trade or travel in connection with the territories of Alaska and Yukon and the province of British Columbia; that Alaska and Yukon always have had and always will have the vast bulk of their business with the large cities of the Pacific coast.

To connect the northland with a region which has nothing in common with this region is going far afield—and is an eleventh hour movement not conducive to sustained interest of those who have fostered and kept the main project alive.

Here is something for the people of Alaska, Yukon and British Columbia and all interested in the success of the main project to guard carefully, lest the whole undertaking becomes entangled and suffer defeat."
