The interpretation of the Constitution of Canada by Prime Minister Mackenzie King is that, when the Empire is at war, Canada is at war but that it is for Parliament to decide the extent to which she shall participate. A writer in "The Canadian Unionist," Toronto, contends that, while this is true, Canada could easily declare her right to take the initiative by passing an act of Parliament claiming the right as a sovereign state owing allegiance. to King George to decide whether the country is at war or not.

Evidently, this is a time when the very life of the Empire is threatened so we do not think it a suitable time to make such a declaration. It might be looked upon as a weakening of empire ties which would be most undesirable at a time like this when unity is most desirable. The writer of the article referred to admits that the result would be the same. Canada would, if war were declared. at once swing in with the rest of the Empire and help to defend it, but he thinks Canadians should have the right to say what they desire.

WHERE IT RAINS
