EDITORIAL

RAILWAYS AND POLITICS

Hon. Dr. R. J. Manion, leader of the Conservative party in Canada, has been telling the people in the East that he stands strong for continuing the present railway set-up because he says that unification will not reduce costs of operation as set forth by President E. W. Beatty of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Dr. Mannion says the division in the Senate which gave twenty-five Conservative senators a victory for unitication was a Liberal trick to embarrass the Conservative party. He says that nineteen Liberal senators were shoved out by their leader, Senator Dandurand, in order to get rid of them. He also points out that seven Conservative senators voted against unification, Senator A. D. McRae

of Vancouver being one of those. We give this because a report of the speech was not sent to Prince Rupert at the time it was delivered and we think people here ought to know how the leader of the party stands in regard to so important a matter. We also see in the difference between the House of Commons leader of the narty and the Senate leader a very serious cleacage which will prove very embarrassing during the coming campaign and also may prove difficult should the party be returned to power.

THE COMING ELECTION

Speculation is already commencing in connection with the election which may possibly take place this year. The Ottawa correspondent of the Financial Post says the Liberals are dead sure of 130 seats in the next Parliament and the Conservatives say they are sure of 108 and hope that a swing in their favor might increase the number to 135. The C.C.F. are claiming 25 seats and then there are the other groups such as independents who may have a few adherents.

In the present House the Liberals have 181, Conservatives 17, Social Crediters 17, C.C.F. 7 and Miss Agnes McPhail who is thought may be looked upon as a C.C.F. member. The Liberals can lose fifty seats and still be able to carry on the business of the country for another term. It will be seen from this that the return to Conservative control is somewhat of a forlorn hope.

Quebec is the uncertain province at present. Dr. Manion was the choice of the Quebec Conservatives when a leader was being selected but whether that means anything or not is uncertain. In Ontario the Liberal leader is personally opposed to Prime Minister Mackenzie King but, if Mr. King should resign before the election, as is suggested, the Ontario leader may take a different stand. Obviously, it is too early to make any suggestion of any value in connection with an election that may not take place until October or November and possibly not this year but the situation is interesting and open to specula-

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
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
