

King Visits British Columbia Today

ACCLAIMED IN VANCOUVER



KING GEORGE AND QUEEN ELIZABETH

Great Welcome Accorded Their Majesties Today As They Reach Pacific Coast

Receptions at Revelstoke and Kamloops Preceded Arrival at Vancouver This Morning—Official Greetings of Province at Victoria Tomorrow

All British Columbia welcomes the King and Queen during a five-day visit to the province commencing today. Scores of communities, like Prince Rupert, are missed by the route but many persons from such places have travelled to points passed by Their Majesties, even if only to see the royal train go by.

The royal train crossed into British Columbia Sunday afternoon, taking aboard at Field in the Rocky Mountains Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of national defence, British Columbia's federal cabinet minister. Later in the afternoon the train made an informal stop at the divisional point of Revelstoke for twenty minutes. A formal stop of fifteen minutes was made at Kamloops Sunday night and then on to Vancouver which was reached at 10 o'clock this morning. Despite the brief stops, there were elaborate celebrations at Revelstoke and Kamloops.

Arrival at Vancouver

The arrival at Vancouver was signalled by a 21-gun salute. At the station platform, Prime Minister W. L. Mackenzie King presented Mayor J. Lyle Telford, M.D., M.L.A. and Mrs. Telford of Vancouver to Their Majesties.

A guard of honor posted at the station received His Majesty with a Royal Salute and was inspected by the King. A procession to the City Hall followed.

Seven holders of the Victoria Cross and a veteran "tar" were among those presented to the King and Queen when Their Majesties visited the City Hall this morning. On a specially constructed platform at the north entrance to the hall, the King was presented with a handsome volume, covered in red morocco and containing an illuminated address and seven photographic views of Vancouver. The address was presented by Mayor J. Lyle Telford, M.D., M.L.A.

On arrival at the hall Their Majesties were received by Mayor Telford and Sergeant-at-Arms Alex McKay who carried the gold civic mace, presented by the Lord Mayor of London to Vancouver in 1936. His Majesty "recognized" the mace, which preceded him into the hall, by touching it with his fingers. Massed choirs of 1000 voices were stationed on the north side of the grounds with a 75-piece band. When

KING IS HONORED

Although five hundred miles removed from the Royal Route, Prince Rupert is, nevertheless, taking advantage of a civic holiday today to mark the visit of the King and Queen to this province. The celebration, designed largely for the instruction and entertainment of the children, has been arranged by a committee headed by Rev. Roy Burnford.

The proceedings commenced this morning with a procession from Canadian Legion headquarters via Third Avenue, Sixth Street and Second Avenue, to the Court House grounds where there was a flag raising ceremony. Veterans of the Great War and other organizations joined in the morning parade.

This afternoon there was another procession, led by the Prince Rupert Boys' Band from Third Avenue and Fourth Street to Acropolis Hill where a program of children's sports and two softball games for boys and girls are being played.

Tonight the culminating feature will be a big bonfire at the Acropolis Hill at 9:30.

Formal Welcome

The formal welcome to the province will be conducted on Tuesday at Victoria by Lieutenant Governor E. W. Hamber and Premier T. D. Pattullo. More than two hundred prominent citizens will be presented to Their Majesties including Members of the Legislative Assembly and their wives.

Leaving Vancouver at 5 o'clock this afternoon aboard the Princess Marguerite, the King and Queen are due in Victoria at 9 o'clock tonight. After a stay of two nights and one day at the provincial capital, they will leave Victoria at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning aboard the Prince Robert and disembark at 2:15 where they will rejoin the royal train.

Destroyers and Royal Canadian Air Force planes will escort the royal ships each way.

MOVEMENT OF CO-OP

George Dolsen Interesting Speaker At C. L. D. L. Hall

Democratic control is the key to the great success of the world co-operative movement, George Dolsen, secretary of the North Island Trollers' Co-operative Association, pointed out at a lecture given in the Canadian Laor Defence League Hall last night.

Further, limited or no interest on shares enabled co-operatives to carry on efficient business principles. Sale at cash and market prices held the business on a solid foundation and allowed saving a maximum because it left means to expansion of the enterprise. Surplus returns were refunded to members. This helped to popularize the co-operative idea. Membership was held open. This assisted unlimited expansion and was the basic difference between co-operative and private companies.

Education was essential because it made the members solid adherents and eliminated the possibility of becoming a one-man concern. Federation or unity built the movement to greater strength. Finally, neutrality in political and religious matters eliminated unnecessary strife within the movement since economy was the basic point.

Mr. Dolsen gave a very able account of the history of the co-operative movement from the time the Rochdale weavers first started on a small scale in 1844. Great interest was noted on the part of the fair-sized audience.

Had Harrowing Experience In South Sea Trip

PANGO PANGO, May 29.—Having been without food for twenty days with the exception of such small fish as they could catch from the sea, U. A. Woodbury and John Callformians, have arrived here in their small boat. On April 19 they left Hawaii in a Polynesian canoe. On account of obscure weather, they had missed Fanning Island. In all they were thirty-four days at sea. A third member of the party was so weak on landing that he could not travel here across the mountains from the point where the canoe landed.

BIND TIES OF EMPIRE

Presbyterian Pastor Urges Spreading of Gospel and Christian Principles

Empire ties can be strengthened by spreading the Gospel and Christian principles to the remote portions of the British Commonwealth. Rev. H. G. Funston told his congregation at morning service yesterday in First Presbyterian Church. Christianity could play an important part in providing better things for such people as the seething masses of India, who were seeking relief from present conditions. Speaking of tendencies towards communism, fascism and nazism, Mr. Funston asserted that the Empire could not benefit from the spread of anti-Christian doctrines.

Inspired by the visit of the King and Queen to British Columbia, Mr. Funston's subject was that of responsibility to the Empire. The light of Christianity could not survive if it was left to burn feebly alone in one community or section. Spread, however, it would become a great and strong fire. If Christianity was to prosper, it must have the aid of all peoples, asserted the pastor as he appealed for support of missionary work in the far removed fields.

NO DELAY IN SEAPLANE BASE PROJECT AT SEAL COVE IS ANTICIPATED

Should be Started by June or July at Latest—First Stage Will Be Large Excavation and Filling Job

OTTAWA, May 29: (Special to Daily News)—In announcing the program of defence work for the Pacific Coast some weeks ago, Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of national defence, stated that installation of a seaplane base for the Royal Canadian Air Force at Seal Cove, Prince Rupert, would start in June. Preparations are still being made with a view to getting the work started in June or, at the latest, in July.

Tenders are expected to be called by the department within the next few days and it is not expected a great deal of time will elapse between the calling of tenders and the actual commencement of the work.

The first stage of the Prince Rupert seaplane base project will be an extensive excavation and rock filling job on the site which will pretty well occupy this season and exhaust a large portion of the initial appropriation of upwards of \$300,000.

As has been previously intimated, the base, by the time it is completed, will probably cost \$1,000,000.

Local C.C.F. Is Getting Ready

Members of the local Co-operative Commonwealth Federation were in session last night to launch the federal election campaign in Skeena riding. President G. W. Rudderham was in the chair and there was a fair attendance of members. No date has yet been set for the party convention nor is there much indication as yet as to who the candidate will be.

Frederick Point Fortifications Work Is Being Started This Week; Road And Dock Are Being Built

The E. J. Ryan Contracting Co. and Northern Construction Co. and J. W. Stewart Ltd. will make a start this week on the fortification work on the Digby Island side of the entrance of Prince Rupert Harbor. The work at Barrett Point, now well under way, will continue at the same time, the expectation being that it will not be completed until early fall.

The first work being undertaken on the Digby Island side will be the putting in of a 4,000-foot roadway from Frederick Point, where the battery is to be located, to a small bay on this side where a wharf is to be built. The wharf, for permanent use in connection with the serving of the battery, will be 400 feet long and 22 feet wide. Dredging of the bottom in the vicinity of the wharf is also to be carried out to facilitate the approach of vessels. The road will be of timber mattress with gravel surface, some fourteen or fifteen feet wide in a 66-foot right-of-way which has been cut out by G. W. Nickerson and associates.

On completion of the wharf and road, which will take a month or so, excavation work for the Frederick Point battery will get actually under way.

There will soon be some 140 men in all employed on this fortification work.

There is no sign yet of any activity in the way of grain shipping through the local elevator. However, the expectation is that, if arrangements are made for the use of the federal subsidy which is being granted for shipping through this port, there will again be activity at the elevator.

C. N. R. steamer Prince John, on her arrival this week from Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands, will be withdrawn from service for overhaul in the local dry dock. The Prince Charles, which has been undergoing overhaul here, will take over the run with the sailing Friday night for Vancouver via the islands. Capt. George Coles and other members of the crew will transfer from the Prince John to the Prince Charles.

With a rather light list of passengers, Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, arrived in port at 9 o'clock last evening from the south and sailed at midnight for Stewart, Anxox and other northern points whence she is due back here tomorrow morning southbound.
