Allies Are Winning War At Sea

RUSSIANS PENETRATE 35 MILES

Army Evidently Under Orders To Cut Country In Two—Now One-Fifth of Distance

KIRKNES, Norway, Dec. 6.—On the twenty-second anniversary of the declaration of Finnish independence, the Soviet army today reported that it was almost one-fifth of the way across Finland, apparently under orders to cut the country in two. The army is said to have penetrated 35 miles, reaching Koulaarvi on the seventh day of the war, leaving 150 miles to be covered before Finland is bisected.

Refugees From Helsingfors In Swede Capital

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 6.—Two shiploads of refugees from Helsingfors arrived in Stockholm yesterday. Among them were 500 Swedes and 43 Americans including families of the United States embassy staff from the Finnish capital.

NEW GOV'T DEMANDED

Britain Ready To Talk Peace With Trustworthy Regime in Reich, Declares Halifax

LONDON, Dec. 6.—Viscount Halifax, British foreign secretary, speaking in the House of Lords on war aims, stated that, once Germany established a government which could be trusted, Great Britain would be ready and willing to discuss terms of peace. But until such a government was established, the Allies would not lay down their arms, the Foreign Secretary declared. He blamed Germany for the Russian invasion of Finland.

Germans Lose Large Vessel

CAPTOWN, Dec. 6. (CP)—British warships have scored again in South African waters by capturing the 7,834-ton German combined passenger and freight liner Usukuma in the South Atlantic. It is officially stated. The Usukuma is the third ship the Germans have lost in the same region in ten days. The vessel was scuttled. Officers and crew of the Usukuma were interned.

BOTHNIA BLOCKED

Mines Stretched Completely Across Entrance of Strategic Body of Water

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 6.—The Gulf of Bothnia, lying between Sweden and Finland, has been completely blocked by mines. Sweden has stretched mines from the west to the Aaland Islands. There are Finnish mines from the east coast toward the Aaland Islands, thus making a complete net across the mouth of the great body of water. This mining of the entrance of the Gulf of Bothnia is another Swedish measure of emergency protection as have been the mobilization of the army to a strength of 150,000 and the bolstering of defences to the north and on the Island of Gotland in the Baltic Sea.

MOVEMENT OF WHEAT

Local Elevator Now About One-Quarter Full—May be Some Time Before Exports Are Made

Since the movement of grain to the local elevator commenced this fall, some 150 carloads, or three hundred thousand bushels, have been delivered. About seven hundred carloads will be required to fill the house up. Some three hundred carloads are at present on the railway line west of Edmonton bound for Prince Rupert. It will be some time, it is expected, before ships will be coming here to load wheat for export.

Dutch Shipping Being Hard Hit

More and More Netherlands Ships Held up Because of Allied Blockade and German Mines

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 6.—The serious way in which Dutch shipping is being affected by the Allied blockade of German exports and imports and the German mine laying activities is becoming increasingly evident. More and more Dutch ships are finding it necessary to tie up.

California Food Prices Dropping

Returning To Normal After Having Mounted At Start of War

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 6.—Food prices here are gradually returning to normal levels after having advanced sharply following outbreak of the European war.

Trunk Murderess Still At Large

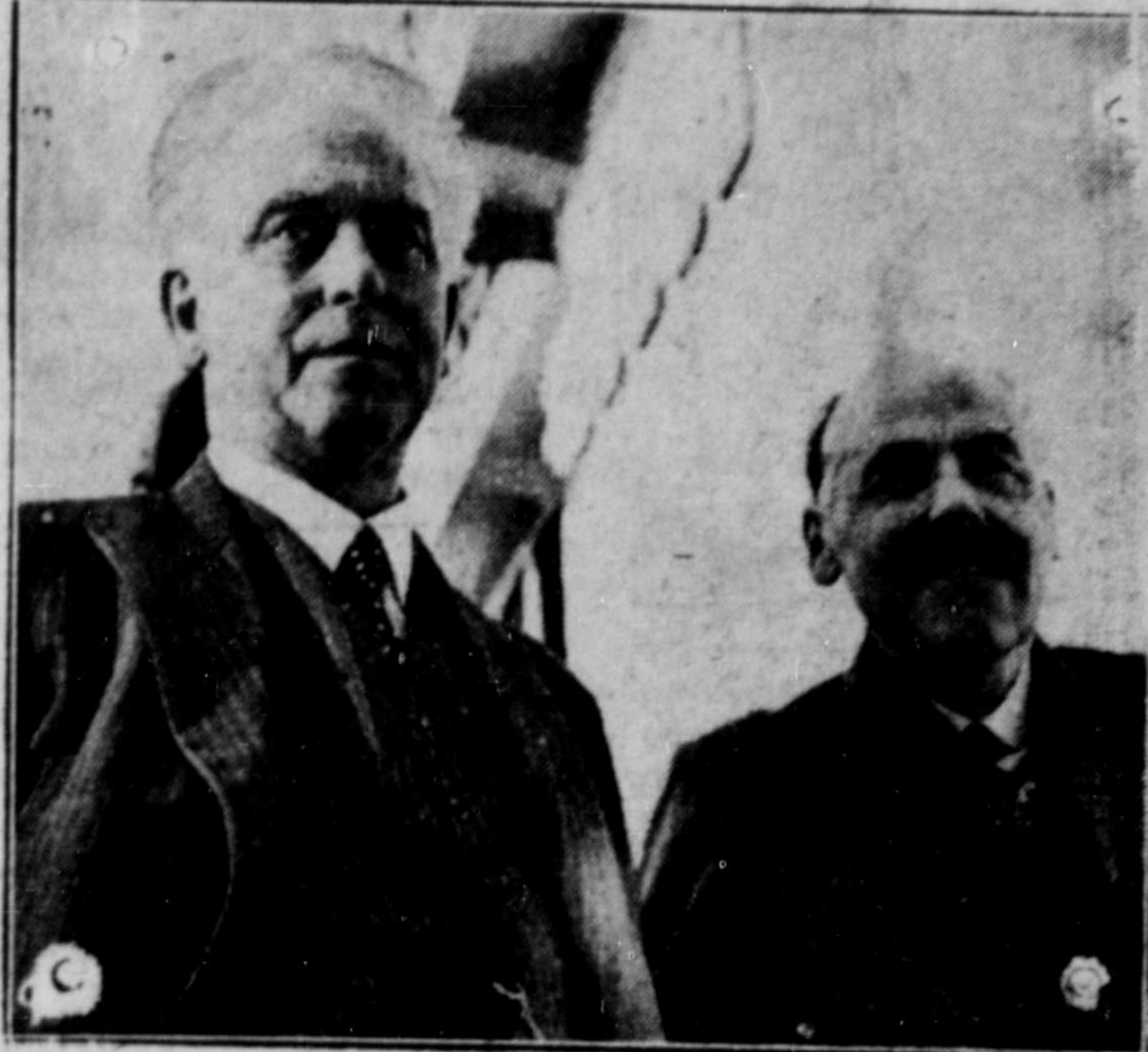
Winnie Ruth Judd, Missing For Second Time Within Few Weeks From Asylum, Feared Suicide

Drive Through Luxembourg?

LONDON, Dec. 6. (CP)—The Daily Mail today headlined reports that Germans were massing for an attempted drive into France through Luxembourg. There were similar reports in Rome. German divisions had been moved from the Dutch to the Luxembourg frontiers, it was reported.

NEW PLANES IN FINLAND FROM ITALY

Safe Delivery Made of Fifty Savoie Bombers To Be Used In Defence Against Russian Invasion

HELSINGFORS, Dec. 6.—Within two days fifty new fighting planes from Italy have arrived for the Finns to be used in the defence against the Russian invasion. On Monday twenty-five arrived and yesterday twenty-five more came. The Savoie bombers were accompanied by Italian pilots and instructors. How the planes were safely delivered here remains a mystery but, nevertheless, they are here.

BEAR LOOKS TO BALKANS

Roumania Urged to Sign Pact With Soviet Similar to Those with Baltic States

MOSCOW, Dec. 6. (CP)—Moscow turned her attention today from Finland to the Balkans. An article published in the "Communist International," mouthpiece of the international communist organization, urged Roumania to sign a mutual assistance pact immediately with Russia. It said the treaty should be similar to treaties Russia had signed with Latvia, Estonia and Lithuania through which she gained naval and military bases on the soil of the three Baltic states. What amounted to a practical demand was also made upon Roumania to break away from Romania and return to Russia.

War News

BIG WARSHIP OUT

PARIS—It has been revealed here for the first time that the 36,000-ton battleship Scharnhorst, one of Germany's most formidable war vessels, is ranging the high seas with the pocket-battleship Deutschland. These two vessels are capable of doing a great deal of damage before they are captured.

FEAR UNITED STATES

TOYO—The United States is pictured in the Japanese press as potential foe of Japan, replacing Russia in that position.

FLEW OVER SCAPA

LONDON—A German plane flew over the Orkney Islands and Scapa Flow today. Air raid signals were sounded for half an hour. No bombs were dropped.

FINNS OVER LENINGRAD

MOSCOW—Two Finnish planes attempted to bomb Leningrad today. A Russian statement said that one was brought down and the other flew away.

FLYING OVER HOLLAND

BRUSSELS—Two unidentified foreign planes, flew over Holland today and drew fire of Dutch anti-aircraft guns.

"MONSTROUS ABOMINABLE"

NEW YORK—H. R. Knickerbocker, noted international correspondent, describes the Russian invasion of Finland as the "most monstrous and abominable crime of modern history." There is every evidence, Knickerbocker declares, that Russia also intends to continue the invasion of Sweden and Norway. "The Soviet wants that Swedish ore," declares Knickerbocker.

LENINGRAD DENIES

LENINGRAD—The Leningrad military district denies the capture by the Finns of 31 Russian tanks and fifteen airplanes in action. Such reports are complete inventions, it is declared. Russia has only lost two planes and two more may have fallen into Finnish territory. On the other hand, eleven Finnish ships have been shot down. Not a single tank has been lost, declare Soviet authorities.

BRITAIN SUPPLIES FINLAND

LONDON—Authoritative sources disclose that British firms are arranging to supply a score of fighting planes and a quantity of other war material to Finland.

RUSSIAN ARMY REVOLT

STOCKHOLM—The Helsingfors correspondent of the newspaper Social Demokraten said today that disorders have occurred in the Leningrad garrison due to the unexpected resistance to the Finnish troops.

BRITISH SHIP LOST

LONDON—The British steamer Huntsman is reported to have been lost at sea.

Quarter Of Million Hungary Expresses Its Sympathy For Finnish People

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 6.—King Gustav headed a Finnish relief Red Cross campaign with a subscription of \$2,500. A quarter of a million dollars has already been raised. BUDAPEST, Dec. 6.—The government of Hungary has expressed its sympathy in warm terms for Finland in its invasion by Russia.

Reassuring Picture By Winston Churchill In Report To Parliament

British Aerial and Naval Patrols Have Destroyed Five Submarines During Past Week—Britons Still Rule Waves

LONDON, December 6: (CP)—British aerial and naval patrols destroyed five German U-boats during the past week, Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty, told the British House of Commons today, giving a reassuring picture of sea warfare. The First Lord aimed that German submarines were now being destroyed faster than Germany could build them and train crews. Other features of Mr. Churchill's statement were that Great Britain has installed defensive armament in one thousand merchantmen and before long the total will reach two thousand. Only one ship in 750 has been sunk in convoy. Great Britain has several million tons of neutral shipping under charter and wants more. Hitler's magnetic mines have been hitting neutrals harder than Great Britain.

SMASHING VICTORIES BY FINNS

One Hundred Russian Tanks Destroyed and Two Thousand Red Soldiers Slain

HELSINGFORS, Dec. 6.—Late Tuesday night the Finnish high command, in an official communique, claimed further stunning victories against the Russian in the defence against Soviet invasion. One hundred and fifty tanks were reported to have been destroyed with heavy loss of life of Russian soldiers on the Kyrellan Peninsula. One estimate placed the number of Russians killed at two thousand. The engagement opened with an onslaught of Russian tanks followed by infantry. Some of the tanks fell into traps in the snow and were blown to pieces. Those that got through were demolished by anti-tank guns and their crews killed. In the north hundreds of Russians marching from Murmansk towards Petsamo were killed. Altogether, it appears to have been a great day for the little country of Finland against the enormous enemy. Today, the twenty-second anniversary of the Declaration of Finnish Independence from Russia, saw the Finns stubbornly and bravely resisting the encroachment of the Reds who claimed to have penetrated 35 of the 150 miles across the country to the north in the direction of Norway. The Finns claimed, however, that this was not of much importance since the country so far traversed by the enemy is largely uninhabited. The defenders promised that strong resistance would be now encountered.

Finns Given Money Back

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt, at a press conference, announced that Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau had placed in a separate suspense account debt instalment payment which Finland has deposited for due date December 15. Congress will be asked at next session to remit payments now totaling \$5,500,000 which had been regularly made by Finland. The money would be made available to the Finns as they desired it.

BIDS FOR WARCRAFT

Tenders Called From British Columbia Shipyards For Thirty Small Vessels

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—It has been revealed that Ottawa has invited B. C. shipyards to tender on 30 small craft for war purposes.

If all the orders were to be placed in B. C. it would result in about \$12,000,000 worth of work but it is probable that eastern yards bidding on the same contracts will get a large proportion of them. The Eastern yards have the advantage of cheaper steel for these steel craft and labor that costs from a quarter to a third less than in B. C. However, with better weather conditions for working, B. C. should be in a position to make faster deliveries and this may be an important consideration.

ROOSEVELT OUTSPOKEN

Expression of Admiration and Sympathy for Finland Far Beyond Usual Felicitations

WASHINGTON, D.C., Dec. 6: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt, on the occasion of the twenty-second anniversary of the founding of the Finnish republic, expressed to President Kallio of Finland his "earnest hope" that the Russo-Finnish war would end soon so that Finland might continue steady development untroubled. Mr. Roosevelt said that he hoped the tragic days for Finland would not be long and that they would soon give way to happier conditions. The statement of the President went far beyond the usual expression of felicitations to other nations. Admiration for Finland's courage against aggression was expressed by Mr. Roosevelt.

EDITORIALS

REVIVING THE LEAGUE

The League of Nations seems about to be revived. The world, outside of Germany, may possibly make common cause against Russia to prevent further raids upon the smaller countries. Geneva is the centre around which the countries are rallying with a view to stopping further depredations.

It is to be hoped that this League will take such action as will provide greater national security for all countries.

TIGHTENING BLOCKADE

The blockade against Germany seems to have been very successful so far and the new regulation preventing Germany from exporting to other countries will tighten it much more. While a great many ships have been sunk, no appreciable dent has been made in the blockade so far. Much of the loss has been made up by seizures of German ships and goods. Some British lives have been lost but the number is very small compared with the losses in previous wars.

Convoys of ships from across the ocean and from the Mediterranean have been arriving with considerable regularity although the supplies of dairy produce have been cut off to a large extent by the blockade. Canada has been increasing her food supplies and so have Australia and New Zealand.

Britain has had plenty of food so far but, as a precautionary measure, it is planned to ration a few of the staple foods. That is to prevent hoarding.

REPATRIATING SECURITIES

"As part of the British government's war financing it is generally expected an effort will be made to dispose of a substantial portion of Canadian securities held in Great Britain for the purpose of obtaining Canadian dollar exchange," says the Victoria Times. "The amount of these so held is estimated, as at the end of 1927, to be \$2,685,000,000, divided as follows:

Vernon Tax Collections

New High Record Is Set With Total of \$107,000 This Year In Okanagan City

VERNON, Dec. 6.—Tax collections of \$108,278 by the City of Vernon to October 31, 1939, set a new high record, comparing with \$107,747 in 1938 and with \$98,000 in 1937. Actual percentage of receipts in relation to the levy was down very slightly from 1938 but a greater total assessment resulted in a higher gross collection. Tax rate was unchanged at 48 mills. In addition, the sum of \$14,038 was collected in arrears for the 1938 and 1937 payments, and on the school district arrears. The total of arrears was placed at \$21,641 before such payments were made. Against the school district levy of \$15,032 the sum of \$10,180 was paid for 1939. The full city levy this year was \$122,851.37, and the payments amounted to 83.137 percent of that levy. Last year the income was 90.64 percent.

of the securities of mining, industrial and other corporations would involve a great deal of difficulty. If the British government were to throw them on the market, a sharp decline in prices of these securities would result, for the Canadian market could not easily absorb them. The Dominion government also is not in a good position to absorb the securities of corporations. Not only would this materially increase the debt of the Dominion, but also it would give the government direct control over a number of business enterprises. Such a development is not desired by the government or by the respective industrial concerns whose securities are held in Great Britain. One authority argues this way:

"What methods will be adopted by Britain in liquidating these securities is as yet impossible to predict and will depend to a considerable extent upon the duration of the war and the need for Canadian dollar exchange in Great Britain. If this need should arise, it is possible that a portion of Canadian securities held by British investors will be sold in the United States. It is also likely that part of these securities will be used as collateral for the purpose of obtaining credits from the charter banks. The main danger that arises out of such a development is that it would increase the volume of deposits too rapidly and might be inflationary in character. The repatriation of even a portion of the Canadian securities held in Great Britain, however, would materially strengthen the international balance of payment of the Dominion."

Unshrinkable Socks Boon To Everyone

Thus quietly do great events dawn upon the world. The discovery for which countless of thousands of men—and their wives—have been waiting for generations occurred at last "in the unimpassioned calm of the Woolen Industries Research Association near Leeds," where "intensive scientific research has been going on" throughout the hubbub of international crises.

"It is safe to predict," the letter continues, "that very shortly every British mill will adopt this new gift from science and so earn the blessings of housewives and other buyers of wool clothes throughout the world."

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Wheat futures leaped 2½¢ to 3¼¢ on the New York market yesterday with May closing at 92½¢.

PRICE OF PULP UP

Canadian Producers Will Benefit From Newly Announced Increases In Contracts

VANCOUVER, Dec. 6.—B. C. Pulp & Paper Ltd. will be among Canadian producers of sulphite pulp which will benefit from the newly announced increase in contract prices. For the first quarter of 1940 the price has been advanced \$10 per ton. The new price for bleached sulphite will be \$60 per ton and for unbleached sulphite \$50 per ton. Other Canadian mills which will benefit from the rise in price are: Fraser, Abitibi, Bathurst and Canadian International.

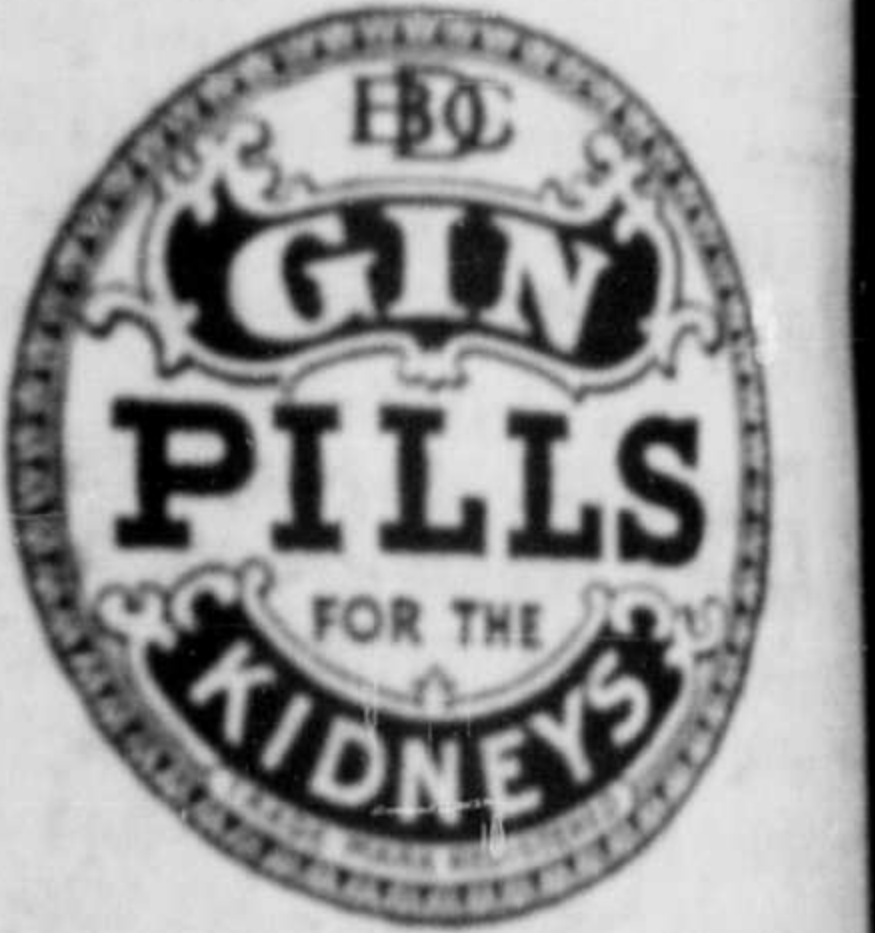
New York Stock Mart Is Steady

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.—Important to Western Canada is the fact that neutral shipping is looking with a great deal more favor on Pacific charters than formerly.

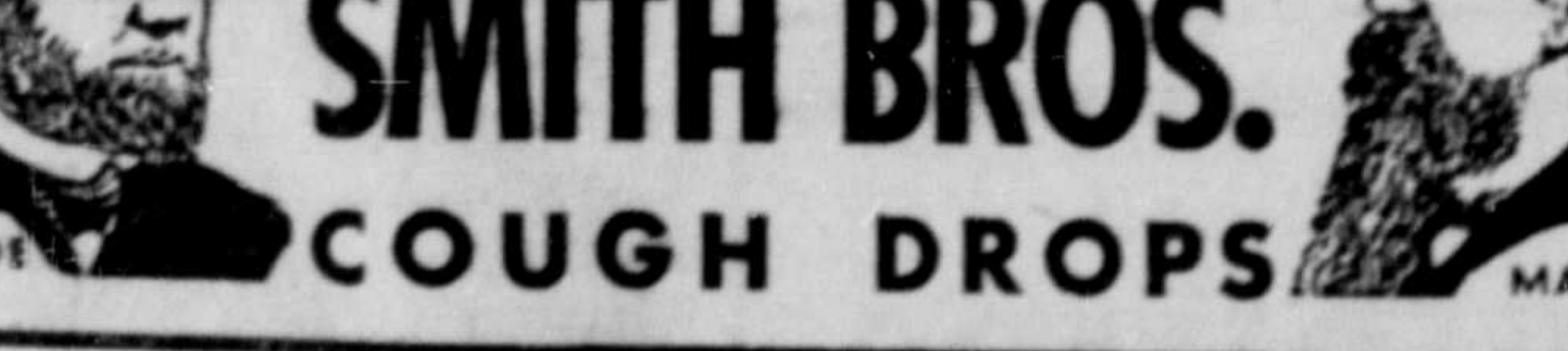

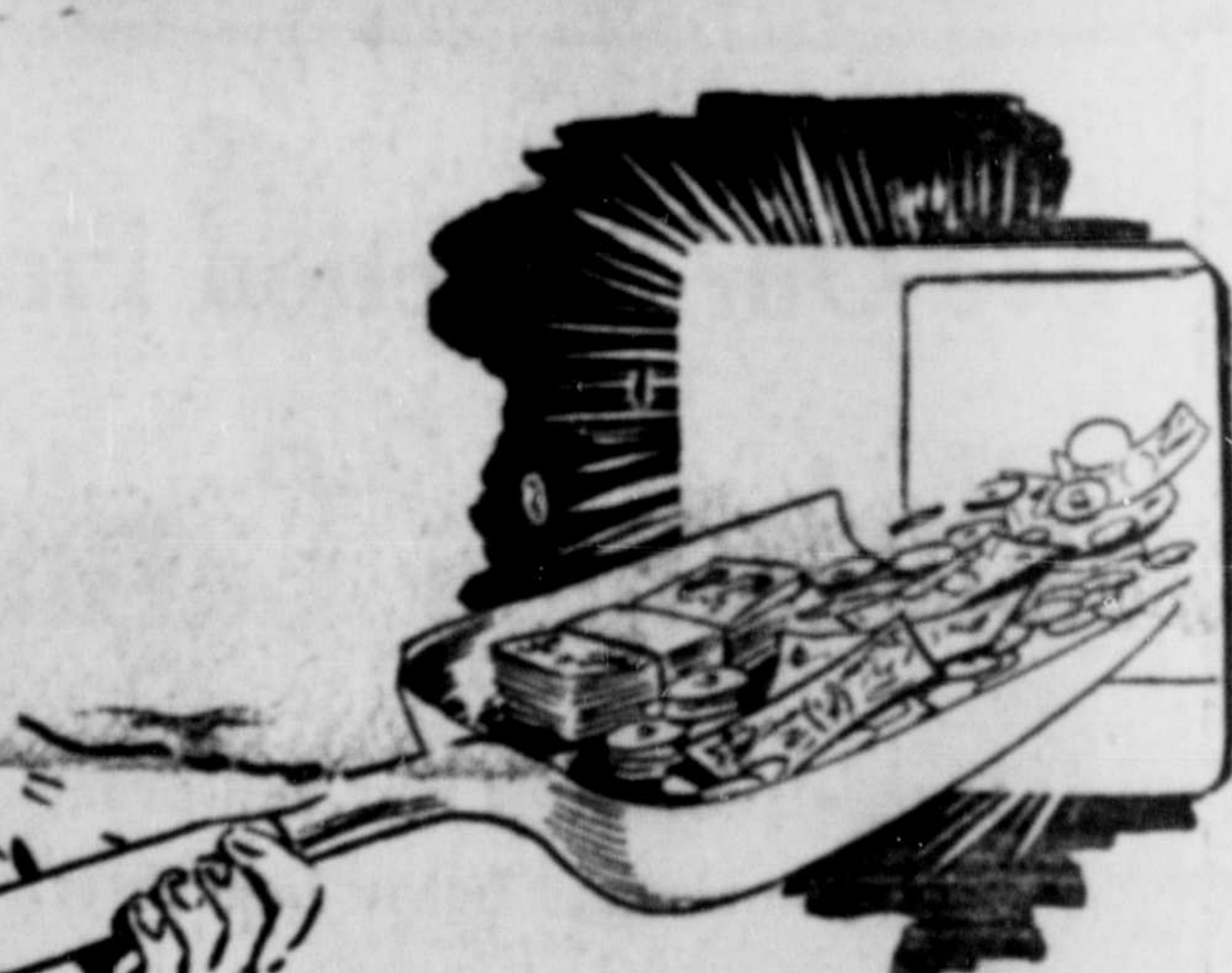

NEWS OF THE MINES

Marmot River Properties Ship Good Ore to Local Sampling Plant—Anyox Plant Being Razed—Development of War Minerals in Interior

Thirteen tons of high grade gold ore from Marmot River properties on Portland Canal near Stewart have arrived for treatment at the Prince Rupert ore sampling plant. Seven tons came from the Gold Boulder group of the Stewart Canal Gold Co. property on which Arthur Cameron and associates are extending the drift on a vein that carries, beside milling grade ore, a nice grade of shipping ore. It is proposed to continue work on this property as long as possible, making shipments at regular intervals. This ore is being extracted in the course of mine development work. The remaining six tons of the Marmot River shipment came from ore extracted in the course of development of the Gold Drop group owned by Joe Moran and Albert Cave. Both of these properties are ideally located within two miles of tidewater.

Wrecking crews of the A. R. Williams Machinery Co. of Vancouver are now engaged in dismantling what remains of the mining and smelting plants of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. at Anyox which a few years ago took over from Granby Co. Regular shipments of the old machinery are being taken south each week.

First large scale development of cinnabar ore in British Columbia to produce mercury will be undertaken by the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. at Pinchi Lake near Fort St. James. It is announced. A reduction plant to recover the mercury will be installed, the company deciding that sufficient exploration has been done to warrant the development. Consolidated optioned this property from a group of Fort St. James residents in October 1938 and has steadily carried on development since that time. The work has consisted of stripping and cross-cutting the showings at a depth of over one hundred feet, vertically coupled with a diamond drilling campaign under the supervision of F. Bronlund. The provincial government has agreed to build a winter road a short distance from the Fort St. James-Manson Creek highway into the property to facilitate the transportation of machinery and supplies. zone favorable to the deposition of mercury. Outcrops of cinnabar in the vicinity of Stuart Lake are doubtless a portion of the area which Dr. Warren referred to. There is likely to be a considerable movement of prospectors into this area during the next season because of the increased demand and higher prices now obtaining for mercury. Mercury is very scarce at present in this part of the country.

Grade of ore \$3 per ton more than in the previous month was responsible for higher production by Surf Inlet Consolidated Gold Mine Ltd. in October of this year. From 2,493 tons milled the output was 1,984 ounces or a gross value of \$37,878, an average of \$15.21. In September production was reported at \$29,120 from 2,384 tons milled, an average of \$12.21 per ton. Underground development at the property is reported to be proceeding satisfactorily. Value of monthly production since March is announced as follows: March, \$37,816; April, \$38,673; May, \$35,792; June, \$43,319; July, \$35,197; August, \$30,537; September, \$29,120; October, \$37,828.

Fred M.
