## "MONSTROUS ABOMINABLE"

NEW YORK-H. R. Knickerbocker, noted international correspondent, describes the Russian invasion of Finland as the "most monstrous and abominable crime of modern history." There is every evidence, Knickerbocker declares, that Russia also intends to continue the invasion of Sweden and Norway. "The Soviet wants that Swedish ore," declares Knickerbocker.

## **REVIVING THE LEAGUE**

The League of Nations seems about to be revived. The mitte world, outside of Germany, may possibly make common Wash cause against Russia to prevent further raids upon the smaller countries. Geneva is the centre around which the C countries are rallying with a view to stopping further depredations.

It is to be hoped that this League will take such action as will provide greater national security for all countries.

## TIGHTENING BLOCKADE

The blockade against Germany seems to have been very successful so far and the new regulation preventing Germany from exporting to other countries will tighten From it much more. While a great many ships have been sunk, Su no appreciable dent has been made in the blockade so far. Much of the loss has been made up by seizures of German ships and goods. Some British lives have been lost but the number is very small compared with the losses in previous wars.

Convoys of ships from across the ocean and from the Mediterranean have been arriving with considerable regularity although the supplies of dairy produce have been Ru cut off to a large extent by the blockade.
