British Business Circles Alarmed At Schacht Oust; May Mean Big Trade War

HIRE

LONDON, January 21: (CP)—British business circles are alarmed over the abrupt removal of Dr. Hjalmer Schacht, the conservative president of the Reichsbank of Germany.

Fear is expressed that the two countries may be plunged into a new and widespread trade war just at a time when they had been on the verge of coming to terms. Radical Nazi methods may result in ruthless competition.

The German financial position has dropped in British eyes following the removal of Dr. Schacht.

From Germany comes official word that the removal of Dr. Schacht as President of the Reichsbank does not mean an end of negotiations for the migration of Jewish refugees.

Hitler extended his reorganization of the Reichsbank today by relieving Vice-President Frederick Dreye and Director Ernst Huelse of their posts, naming Rudolf Brinkmann, right hand man of Walther Funk, the new president, to the directorate.

I wish to correct published accounts with regard to my accident up in the mountains. The facts are as follows:

My wife and son came up and arrived at the cabin at about o'clock in the afternoon of Decemper 27. They found me sitting by the stove with a broken ankle. had made some crutches but they were useless on account of depth of the snow. I had very little wood and was guite unable to get any and the temperature was I believe, about 20 below zero. My wife stayed up with me keeping the fire going all night with whatever fuel she could find and my boy went down and brought up a horse the next day and they both brought me down. The day after the police came out to the ranch and brought 30.28 me in to the hospital.

I firmly believe that, if my wife and son had not come up. I would not have been able to get down without aid.






