Louis. scene in the House of Commons when, on the eve of war, Prime Minister Chamberlain, still clinging to the hope of peace, closed his speech without actually declaring war. Arthur Greenwood, leader of the Labor Party, rose told speak amid a hush, the only sound being a voice from the Conservative benches "Speak for England, Greenwood." A chorus of fifty Conservative voices followed: "Yes, I speak for England."

Canadian Presse Staff Writer TORONTO, Sept. 26: (CP) While women in the United Kingdom and other countries are already in uniform in home service war duties, Canadian women active in preliminary movements at home to take their share of wartime emergency work.

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


