Some people are sick, sad or sorrowful, not because they really have any reason to be sick, sad or sorrowful but because they have a sick, sad or sorrowful mentality that always searches out the sad things of life and refuses to see the joyfulness, gladness and abundant health all around them.

One of the most useful things a cheerful person can do is to change cheerlessness into cheerfulness.

Have you ever felt downhearted or sad and wondering what ever was going to happen next? Then a cheerful friend arrives on the scene. He points out the bright side of the situation. He is cheerful, happy and radiates happiness. In a few minutes your sadness and your fears disappear and you feel like a different man. A man who radiates good cheer is worth more than great riches to a community. He can heal the sick, cheer the sad, give hope and renewed faith to the downhearted.

Some people are naturally cheerful and happy while all can cultivate the spirit of cheerfulness. Sometimes our climate is a little depressing and it is easy to give way to spells of gloom. But we do not have to do it. If we cultivate the spirit of cheerfulness at all times and in all places we shall find that the spirit of gloom disappears and happiness pervades both ourselves and those with whom we come in contact.

Charles Dickens realized what a boon was cheerfulness when he created Mark Tapley in his book "Martin Chuzzlewit." Mark was always cheerful and often regretted that he had never been given a chance to "come out strong." When ever he found himself in distressing circumstances, the people he met always proved themselves so much better than he expected that he could not do anything else but be cheerful and happy. He felt there was no credit in being cheerful under those circumstances. So with ourselves. If we cultivate cheerfulness and happiness we find all the people around us imbued with the same spirit. Some people call that Christianity. Other people call it by other names but its the same spirit. Good cheer is the best medicine in the world for all the bodily organs function best when a person is happy.

P.T. ASS'N MEETING

Mrs. Winslow Re-Elected President
 —1938 Was Good Year—Miss Hartin Interesting Speaker

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Parent-Teachers' Association took place last evening in the auditorium of the Booth Memorial School with Mrs. R. M. Winslow, president of the organization, in the chair. As this was the sixteenth annual meeting of the Association, reports covering the activities of the past year were submitted and officers were elected for 1939.

The reports submitted by the president, treasurer and secretary disclosed that the past year had been one of the most successful in the history of the Association. With a record membership of 204 parents and teachers, it was felt that the Parent-Teachers' Association could take its rightful position as a powerful factor for good in the life of the city. The Association, working in harmony with the public schools, was performing great service towards creating and maintaining a wholesome family life which was one of the great fundamental objectives of the whole educational system. The very fact that so many parents had joined the Association and attended its meetings showed their very vital interest in the welfare of their family members.

The treasurer's report showed that the sum of \$382.50 had been given to the schools during the year for the purchase of sport equipment and urgently needed books for the school libraries. This was the largest sum given to the schools by the Association in any single year.

Following the election of officers, Miss M. Hartin of the King Edward School gave a very interesting address on "The Activities Curriculum" with special reference to the primary grades. Miss Hartin emphasized the importance of primary activities in character development, the most important objective of education. The schools were no longer to be places where facts were poured into the child but were to be copies in miniature of the world

as people should like it to be and as it ought to be. In activity schools the child was the centre and, around the child, the whole processes of the school were to revolve. The work was based upon interest rather than on external force and authority. Physical and social activities, excursions and investigation, creative undertakings, learning by doing, conference and discussion regarding activities made the activity school and place where children learn to be helpful, courteous and kind to others.

Such a program required some important changes from the old type programs. Plenty of space to move about was essential. This, however, was impossible in classrooms where there were over forty children. Movable tables and chairs must take the place of screwed down desks. Lockers, activity equipment, pictures and attractive books should also be provided. Group and individual teaching must take the place of the old mass teaching and programs must be flexible and elastic. The short periods where children jumped from one subject to another every ten or fifteen minutes now give place to longer periods, some of which were free periods, others directed and some used for conferences between pupils and teacher.

In activity schools, the formal subject such as writing, phonetics, arithmetic, health, music were taught better because the child acquired his knowledge of them in accordance with the laws of learning.

A very enjoyable musical program was contributed to by Selvig Mork with a delightfully rendered pianoforte solo, "Jolly Roger," and by William Bond who skillfully played "Nocturne."

The meeting ended with the singing of the National Anthem after which refreshments were served by a committee in charge of Mrs. R. Wood and Mrs. H. Perkins.

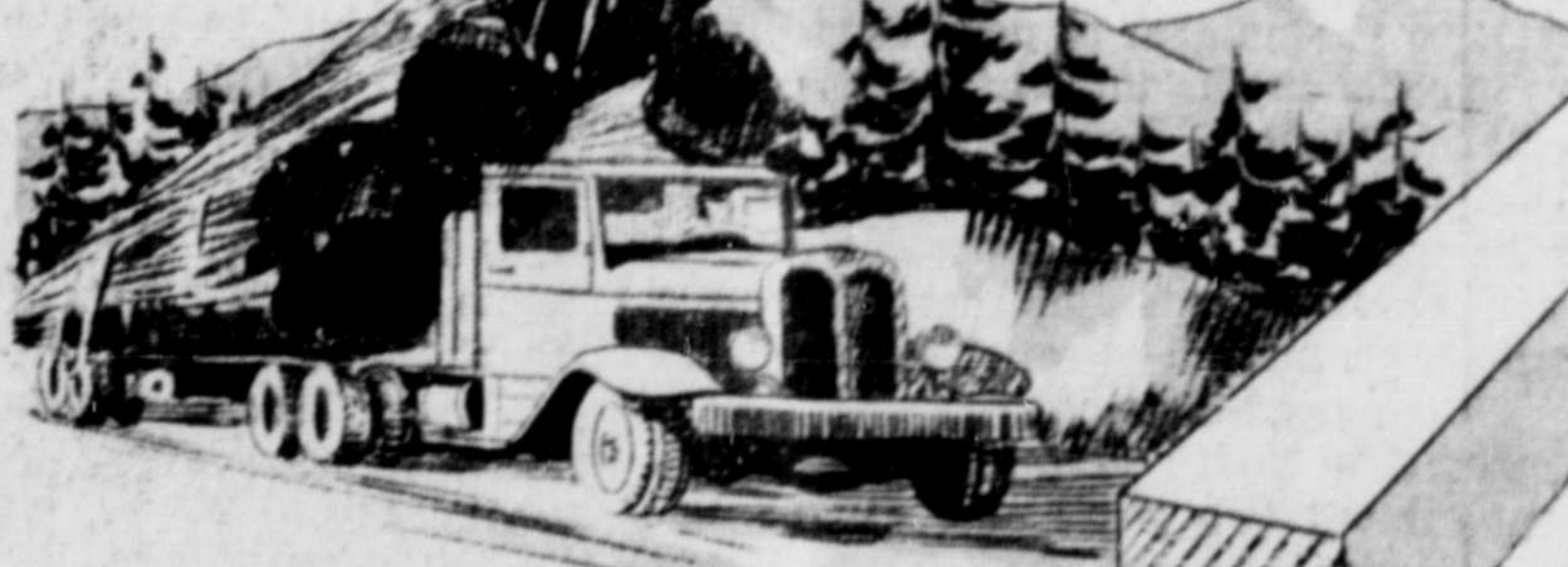
