The great thing to stress is the need of a general scheme of providing for at least winter employment for all who need it. Premier Pattullo has urged the desirability of providing a five year plan for the Dominion, devoted to constructive work such as the building of an interprovincial highway running from one end of the Dominion to the other. In England and Scotland people are deploring this system of waste and that in a country where so much is already done. Here where so little has been done, every dollar of money and every ounce of effort should be devoted to improving conditions.

In this matter of constructive effort we may well take a lesson from such countries as Germany or Italy, from Switzerland or Sweden or even from our neighbors to the south.

LEADERSHIP

While we all admire real leadership and look for it particularly in high places, we do not feel that leadership can be developed by talking about it nor by naming a political party for it. Leaders are born. Many born leaders do not ever have an opportunity to lead while some of those who get the opportunity find out when it is too late that they are not real leaders. Noise does not mean leadership. Criticism does not mean leadership. Now and then the world sees men appear like meteors, flash for a brief period and then disappear forever. There is this to be said for the present leaders of the two big political parties-they have been prominent for a number of years. They have proved their leadership ability such as it is. Sometimes we had fancied they were too timid but they may then have been showing their strength. At any rate they are the best men so far in sight.
