PREDICTION CAME TRUE

Pattullo Tells of Friendship With Mackenzie King and Of Their Fathers Before Them

TORONTO, August 9: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo of British Columbia, who was here to attend the anniversary dinner for Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King last night, said it represented to him much more than a mere political event.

Mr. Pattullo said: "The Prime Minister's father and my father were friends and Mackenzie King and I have perpetuated that friendship since we were boys. I can clearly recall my father cautioning me to stay out of politics and, at the same time, telling me that boy King will be Prime Minister some day."

SECESSION TALK OFF

Visit of King and Queen Has Killed Movement in Saskatchewan, Premier of That Province Declares

TORONTO, August 9: (CP)—Here to attend the dinner marking the twentieth anniversary of the election of Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King as Liberal party leader, Premier William J. Patterson of Saskatchewan said that the visit of the King and Queen had done more than anything else to stop talk of secession in his province. Although he admitted that certain adjustments were necessary, Mr. Patterson expressed the opinion that there was a greater feeling of national consciousness in Canada today than there had been for many years.

SENATORS BAT HARD

Every Member of Team Connected As Washington Defeated New York Yankees

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 9: (CP)—Every member of the Washington Senators club made at least one hit yesterday as they defeated the league leading New York Yankees seven to three. The Boston Red Sox swept a full game further up on the Yanks as they defeated the Philadelphia Athletics 9 to 2. The Yankees' margin is now but six games.

In the National League, the Cincinnati Reds split a double bill with the Chicago Cubs and held their margin of seven and a half games over St. Louis Cardinals who were rained out with the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Many Seeking Harvest Work

King Zog Will Live In France

Former Ruler of Albania Arrives in Versailles to Make Future Home

VERSAILLES, Aug. 9: (CP)—After having wandered around Europe since the absorption of his country some months ago by Italy, former King Zog of Albania has arrived in Versailles and will take up permanent residence here. Zog is accompanied by the former queen and her baby and three sisters of the former King.

Mackenzie King Drops No Hint Regarding Election; Is Accorded Great Ovation

TORONTO, August 9: (CP)—Leading Liberals from all parts of Canada to the number of nearly 4000 including federal cabinet ministers, provincial premiers and members of Parliament and various legislatures assembled here last night at the banquet table to do honor to Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King on the occasion of the twentieth anniversary of his selection as Leader of the Liberal Party of Canada in succession to the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The toast to Mr. King was proposed by Rt. Hon. Ernest Lapointe, Minister of Justice and the Premier's chief lieutenant. So great was the ovation accorded Mr. King by his admirers and supporters that it was several minutes before he was able to start on his address. It was an unprecedented tribute to the Prime Minister who was praised for his contribution to Canada's well-being in more than twenty speeches by Liberal leaders from Charlotte town to Victoria.

The date of the general election and the personal future of the Prime Minister were the question uppermost in the minds of his listeners as well as followers of political affairs in the nation but on neither subject did Mr. King drop any hint whatsoever. He never even mentioned the word "election."

Regarding the position of Canada in international affairs, Mr. King said he would never say what Canada might or might not do under circumstances of which he might at the time know nothing. The Prime Minister declared he would not now nor at any future time make a statement on Canada's stand toward a hypothetical situation that might arise in some other part of the world. The Liberal party was always prepared to take a firm stand when circumstances demanded it. "But I do not think it would help the cause of international peace if we seek to change the form of government in other lands," he said.

The Premier discussed with much feeling the value of Liberalism to the maintenance of orderly government and urged continuation of the two-party system. Mr. King paid feeling tribute to the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier, his illustrious predecessor, whose political protégé he was and whose cabinet he entered at the age of thirty-four.

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WOULD TAKE OVER YUKON

Annexation by British Columbia Is By No Means Dead Issue, Declares Pattullo

OTTAWA, Aug. 9: (CP)—Annexation of the Yukon by British Columbia would result in development of the district to an extent hitherto undreamed of, Premier T. D. Pattullo of British Columbia said in an interview here.

"The Yukon is similar in every respect to the northern frontier of British Columbia and its annexation would permit of more direct administration of its affairs than is possible from Ottawa," Mr. Pattullo asserted. "Economically, British Columbia and the Yukon form an entity."

Mr. Pattullo said he did not know whether he would be given permission to take over the Yukon but it was still a definitely live issue. Action had been meantime postponed pending the report of the royal commission on Dominion-provincial relations.

The Yukon had a great future as a gold producer, the British Columbia Premier said.

Union of British Columbia and the Yukon would also simplify arrangements for the construction of the British Columbia-Alaska Highway, Mr. Pattullo declared.

Lumber Exports From Province Hit High Mark

VICTORIA, Aug. 9: (CP)—British Columbia lumber exports, totalling 117,000,000 board feet, struck an all time high in July. The United Kingdom is by far the most important market, having taken 91,000,000 board feet, making the total for the year to date 514,000,000 board feet.

SENATOR IS HERE

Comments On Lack of Election Announcement—To Visit Gold Mining Operations

"That will be a great disappointment to a lot of people," commented Senator A. D. McRae this morning when told as he arrived in Prince Rupert that Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King had failed last night to make any hint as to when a federal election might be expected. General McRae refused to be drawn into any political discussion. "I am through with politics," said the former Dominion Conservative organizer.

General McRae was a passenger aboard the Prince George going through to Juneau whence he will fly to Fairbanks to visit two gold dredging operations on the Yukon River three-quarters of an hour flight from Fairbanks. Next year, he said, he hoped to have at least one dredging or dragline operation going on the Stewart River in the Dawson district.

Poland Blamed For War Spirit

Berlin Newspapers Claim it is Trying to Start Conflict Over Danzig Issue

BERLIN, Aug. 9: (CP)—Berlin newspapers yesterday again accused Poland of trying to provoke war over the Free City of Danzig. The newspapers still predicted that there would be no war. They again referred to the policy of Chancellor Adolf Hitler to obtain a peaceful settlement of the issue.

WORKLESS QUESTION

Import Recommendations by Labor Committee of Chamber of Commerce

The labor committee of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce has reported in favor of endorsing the suggestion that the federal government make an immediate attack on the unemployment problem and follow out other recommendations contained in the report of the National Employment Commission.

The committee also recommends that the government be requested to pension unemployed men of sixty years and over who are physically unfit to take their places in the ranks of labor and have no other means of support.

This report came before the Council of the Chamber at its recent meeting but it was thought too big a question to be dealt with by the executive and was referred to the first meeting of the Chamber in September.

HITLER'S LATEST ORDERS

DANZIG—Albert Foerster, Nazi leader of Danzig, is returning to the Free City today with the latest instructions from Chancellor Adolf Hitler and will speak to a mass meeting in Danzig tomorrow night, it was announced today.

KING REVIEW'S FLEET

WEYMOUTH, England—The King today reviewed 133 warships of the reserve fleet which Great Britain is tuning to active service pitch.

BITTER INTERNAL STRIFE

SHANGHAI—A bitter internal struggle in Japan over whether the Empire shall conclude an outright alliance with Germany and Italy may cause the fall of the Japanese cabinet, an informed traveler from Tokyo said today.

VICTORIA MAN KILLED

LONDON—The air office announced today that Leslie Phillips, aircraftman, killed with two other Royal Air Force men in the crash of a bomber near Eastbourne, Sussex, was from Victoria, B.C. The crash took place during the great aerial manoeuvres.

NEW ZEALAND ARMING

WELLINGTON, N.Z.—Defence Minister F. Jones announced Tuesday that the peace time strength of the New Zealand territorial force has been increased from 9,500 to 16,000 men, in case of war. Some 40,000 trained men are standing by in addition to the regular army.

POLES STAND READY

WARSAW—Orders to wear full uniforms and carry rifles while on duty have been issued to Polish customs officials, on the Danzig east Prussian frontier, the newspaper Kurjer Warszawski said Tuesday. There was no official confirmation.

HUNTING OUT LOYALISTS

HENDAYE, France—Spanish Nationalists were reported Tuesday to be hunting thousands of men, without a government, hiding in the Asturian Mountains of northwest Spain. Advances said General Franco's men had arrested hundreds of civilians accused of giving former Republican soldiers food and shelter.

CHRYSLER VERY ILL

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y.—Walter P. Chrysler, automobile manufacturer, is critically ill at his Long Island home.

FREAK BABY GIRL

MANILA—A seven-pound baby girl was born with her heart completely outside her body here and lived through her second day of life Tuesday, as physicians pondered what to do. A thin stemless cocktail glass protected the exposed heart resting on the infant's chest. It helped maintain body heat for the heart and guard against infection.

MORAL REARMENT?

VATICAN CITY—Papal secretary of state, Cardinal Magliano, in a letter to the president of Canada's Catholic annual social, stated that forms of government or social organizations will not in themselves save world peace, if the spirit of sacrifice and equity is absent.

ENORMOUS WHEAT CROP

ROME—The International Institute of Agriculture predicted today that world wheat production for 1939 will be the highest since the World War, except for last year's crop.

STOCK MARKET WEAKER

NEW YORK—Declines at the close wiped out initial gains running to a point or so on the stock market Tuesday. Transfers were around 450,000 shares, the smallest turnover for a month.

STRENGTHENING SINGAPORE

SINGAPORE—One battalion of British troops and two of Indian troops arrived Tuesday from India to strengthen the Singapore garrison. A squadron of planes arrived Monday.

Reich Demands Record Of All People Between Ages Of Five And Seventy

BERLIN, August 9: (CP)—A new scheme of national registration was decreed in Germany yesterday. Under it, every person in the country, male or female, between the ages of five and seventy, is required to register, giving details regarding physical condition and all other personal particulars.

Alberta Vouchers Are Not Wanted

Road Workers Go Out on Strike in Protest at Their Being Given Vouchers For Wages

BLAIRMORE, Alberta, Aug. 9: (CP)—Seventeen men on government road work here have gone on strike. They refuse to accept twenty-five per cent of their wages in government vouchers.

PINCH IS NOW FELT

Import Cuts Imposed by New Zealand Having Bad Effect Upon Trade

AUCKLAND, N.Z., August 9: (CP)—New Zealand is starting to feel the pinch of the import cuts imposed to conserve Dominion's overseas funds. Supplies of many goods are running short, and at the same time numerous indentors and agencies are dismissing their staffs and closing, as they cannot obtain stocks.

Canada was the first country to make a reduction in its official representation. As a result of the import cuts, Canadian trade to New Zealand has been greatly curtailed and the post of assistant trade commissioner in the Dominion has been temporarily abolished. The commissioner will remain to maintain contacts, but the assistant commissioner, R. O. Bower, has been transferred to Australia.

Actually in the first three months of the year the value of Canadian goods imported into New Zealand rose from £1,166,525, New Zealand currency \$4,293,654 in the same period last year to £1,642,500. This was largely because an automobile company started shipping from it (Canadian instead of its United States plant, and because the full effect of the import bans had not then been felt. It is expected that later figures will show a heavy drop.

Traders Protest

The Canadian-British Traders' Association of New Zealand has protested against the bans on Canadian goods, which are more severe than on articles from either Britain or Australia. It pointed out that although New Zealand buys more from Canada also imports much New Zealand produce, such as wool, woollen goods, skins, sausage casings and grass seed, via the United Kingdom.

Meanwhile there has been a rush to buy what stocks remain of prohibited articles. Brands of cosmetics, English women's shoes, canned fish, breakfast cereals, popular sauces and pickles, English biscuits and American cigarettes and tobacco have been in particularly heavy demand, and supplies of many lines are now either running short or exhausted.

ASSIST DEMOCRACY

Mr. Justice C. H. O'Halloran of the Supreme Court of British Columbia, when addressing the Catholic Youth organization, said: "Canadian youth should offer constructive effort to assist the cause of democracy rather than criticize a form of government far superior to that prevailing in other countries."

These are wise words uttered at a time when they are sorely needed. We all set ourselves up as critics and make slashing statements about the system being bad whereas very few of us do anything to try to make it better. If all take a keen interest in our democratic government, join a political organization, use every possible influence to see that all political dealings are "on the level" and refuse to be a party to any action not in the interests of the whole community, then we shall make progress. No government is ever any better than the people governed. Very few governments are worse than the people governed. On the whole we have representative government no matter what party is in power. With human nature as it is today, a cabinet of

angels would find it difficult to administer the affairs of the country satisfactorily to the critics.

WILL STAY WITH IT

Premier Pattullo says he will stay with it until the road to Alaska goes through. That is the spirit. Stay with it if it is right! We feel sure Prince Rupert's member will win through if his plane does not make a foul landing and upset him.

KILL OFF DRONES

"Bees kill off their drones but we elect us to Parliament," according to one authority. We are sure the reference is not to either of our members of Parliament. Both Hon. T. D. Pattullo and Olof Hanson are among the old workers. However the tendency is to elect to office the talkers rather than the workers. It is true in all walks of life. Free Hitting In Softball

Acropolis Hill Defeats McClymont Park 14 to 12

Acropolis Hill senior boys won a 14 to 12 victory over McClymont Park in a free scoring game in the Gyro softball league last night.

Both pitchers were hit freely and neither team gave their moundmen particularly good support. Runs were scored by both teams in almost every inning. Acropolis made two in the first, two in the second, four in the third and three in the fourth and had a commanding lead of 11 to 6 going into their half of the fifth inning. They were held scoreless in the fifth but managed to score three more in the sixth to bring their total to fourteen.

McClymont boys rallied strongly in the sixth inning. Five safe hits, coupled with two errors, allowed them to score three runs and, as they had managed to hold their opponents scoreless in the preceding inning, this brought them within two runs of tying the score.

In their half of the sixth, the Hill team scored three more runs to give them a commanding five run lead again. The fans, however, were stopped in their tracks when the McClymont boys started their half of this inning off with the first two men getting all round the circuit on two hits and a couple of sloppy fielding plays. The next three men up got on to fill the sacks with none out. With the tying run on first base it looked for a minute as if the Hill team was going to be robbed of their victory but Joe Davis was out trying to steal third and Bruce Simundson was caught out in a smart attempt to steal home. The next man up struck out to retire the side and end the game.

SPORT CHAT

Scottish sportsmen eagerly await the coming Saturday. For thousands the day marks the opening of the grouse-shooting season but for tens of thousands up and down the country it means the start of the nine-months soccer campaign north of the River Tweed. As the 38 teams that make up the Scottish League's two divisions finish pre-season training critics throughout the country speculate on the chances of a dark horse appearing to break the stranglehold of two famous Glasgow clubs on league honors. Between them Rangers and Celtic have kept the title in Glasgow since 1932, the former winning their 24th championship in a canter last April. To prove that their hopes arise not only from wishful thinking the experts point to the success of East Fife and Clyde in the Scottish Cup competition. The Methil squad made history two years ago, becoming the first second division club to win the trophy by vanquishing Kilmarnock two years ago. Clyde—an outsider in mid-season—carried off the honor last year at the expense of a doughty Motherwell eleven.

Entering senior company this year are Cowdenbeath and Alloa, leader and runner-up respectively in the second division race last season. With an unbeaten home record and only two losses on foreign soil, Cowdenbeath chalked up 60 points in 34 games and scored 120 goals against 45. Alloa finished level with East Fife but won promotion by a much superior goal average. Both clubs are strong in attack and should prove worthy successors to Queen's Park and Raith Rovers, who finished at the bottom of the major league and dropped into the second division. The Rovers were in difficulty throughout the campaign but it was nip and tuck between St. Mirren and the amateurs during the closing days of the competition. Queen's Park finally finished two points behind the Saints. The decline of the famous old club is regretted throughout Scotland.

FINE GAME OF SOCCER

Great Match Put Up By Navy And Velvet With Result a One-All Draw

One of the best football games of the season was that last night in the Gilhuly Cup series between Velvet and Royal Canadian Naval Volunteer Reserve which resulted in a one-all draw. Two minutes after the start of the first half, Doug Christison scored for the Navy with a penalty shot. Fine football was played and, during the last fifteen minutes of the second half, George Baker, as Velvet played downhill, drove in a loose ball from about fifteen feet to equalize. Morgan having no chance. Then Casey Vink had a busy session at the other end. Dr. McMeekin came close near the end just hitting the upright. Jack Ritchie also nearly scored on a cross from Dick Cameron.

Pete Doherty refereed and linesmen were S. Keays and T. Busavich.

The second game on Saturday resulted in a 6 to 5 win for the home team with Lary Warner doing the pitching.

On Sunday morning young Guy Ludgate took the mound for Smithers and the game ended with a score of 21 to 4. Rupert scored one in the first inning while Smithers scored five in that inning and followed with 3-3 and four in the next three innings while Rupert gathered no more runs till near the end of the game. The Rupert players were shifted around rapidly in the first few innings when they were kicking the ball all over the place and dropping all the fly balls that came their way. PICARD IS GOING FAR UNDER SEA

BRUSSELS, August 9:—Descent in a steel "balloon" from five to seven miles to the bottom of the sea is planned next spring by Dr. August Piccard, University of Brussels physicist, who ten years ago was the first human being to ascend into the stratosphere fourteen miles above the surface of the earth.

Prof. Piccard already has constructed in his laboratory here models of the metal shell in which he expects to reach depths hitherto undreamed of and to open the way for exploration of a realm whose deep valleys of total darkness may be the abode of strange, primitive monsters, or the place of vast gold deposits.

The "Columbus of space"—as the tall Belgian professor with his hinged spectacles was termed a few years ago—is confident that both he and the companion he selects to accompany him will return to the surface alive and unharmed.

Makes Two Models

The sea balloon is based on essentially the same principles as the spheroid shell in which he made his supposedly fantastic flight in the stratosphere, but with everything in reverse. He has constructed two models. One a hollow ball made of electron—a combination of magnesium and aluminum—has been given rigid tests under high pressures such as one would expect to encounter at sea depths of five miles. The other, made of steel, stands pressures such as would be encountered at depths of seven miles.

Heavy pieces of iron ballast would be attached to the outside of the "balloon" by magnetic attraction, the force of which can be controlled from the interior. The speed of the actual descent below certain critical depths could be controlled by water chambers, shut off from the main compartments, which could be filled and emptied at will by valves on the inside. Electrical storage batteries, which would supply light and power as well as provide a feeble current for maintaining the magnetic attraction to hold the ballast, also would be attached to the outside of the shell and constitute the last bit of ballast to be dropped off in

case of an extreme emergency. Such an emergency, Prof. Piccard said, might result from getting caught in a tangle of seaweed near the surface after a successful ascension.

Inside the ball, Professor Piccard plans to carry much the same type of equipment as he used in his stratosphere flight. There will be equipment for purifying the air and tanks carrying a reserve of oxygen. The dimensions of the air-filled ball will be such that, with the weight varied by letting out and taking in sea water, it will be possible to float freely at any depth where the explorers find something interesting to observe, the balloon being wafted about freely by the water currents just as his stratosphere ball was at the mercy of the upper air currents.

The most difficult problem to solve, the professor says, was that of maintaining a sufficient magnetic attraction to keep his iron ballast attached with the feeble electrical equipment which it would be possible to carry.

This he has solved, he said, by working out a system in his laboratory by which the force is generated by a very powerful current applied for a few minutes. This then can be maintained by applying constantly an energy of only one watt per ten kilograms of weight.

The balloon will be equipped with portholes with thick glass windows through which, with the aid of powerful searchlights, it will be possible to see and photograph the "scenery" through which he passes. The windows, of course, constitute the weakest part of the shell. Provision is made, however, by which they may be covered immediately with watertight steel shutters of the same thickness as the steel walls of the rest of the shell, the instant the first crack is caused by the increasing pressure.

Equipment Carried

For auxiliary equipment, the balloon will carry motion picture cameras, instruments for recording the depth and speed of ascent or descent, and radio equipment by means of which, as soon as the ball reaches the surface, it will be possible for an accompanying ship with radio direction finder equipment to locate it and come at once to the rescue of its occupants. This equipment will be sufficiently powerful to send signals for 400 miles, indicating the maximum distance which Professor Piccard believes the balloon might be carried by the ocean currents at great depths.

REFORM IN AUSTRALIA

Constitutional Changes Supported By Leading Figures

SYDNEY, Australia, August 8. (CP) — Sir Earle Page, former Prime Minister and now leader of the Country Party, and Opposition Leader John Curtin are the two latest champions of the move to reform Australia's constitution, largely on the Canadian pattern.

Speaking at Perth, capital of Western Australia, on the 39th anniversary of the receipt of the royal assent to the Australian constitution bill, Mr. Curtin declared: "We want a constitution attuned to the times and simply phrased so that people will not have to go to high court to have interpretations."

Mr. Curtin added: "Several of the major sides of national life, including the relationship between employer and employee, and interstate and intrastate trade and commerce are now partly or completely vested in the states. These should all be controlled by the national parliament."

Sir Earle Page in New South Wales supported Mr. Curtin's remarks. He said that marketing under changed world conditions provided an illustration of the fetters an obsolescent constitution had fastened on Australia, evidently referring to the difficulties he had met when Minister for Commerce in the Lyons administration.

The public support which these two men both representative of parties outside the Menzies government, have accorded the government's reform proposals suggests a speedy passage of a reform bill when parliament meets, probably in August.
