How It Stands

The German-Polish war situation this afternoon stood thus: Answers are still being awaited by Great Britain and France to the British warnings to Germany delivered yesterday to cease hostilities and withdraw from Poland. If the answers are not received by noon tomorrow and Germany continues the war on Poland, Great Britain and France, all observers agree, will have to act.

Formal declaration of war within a few hours w Great Britain and France upon Germany for its ect of aggression in invading Poland apgeared inevitable today although up to time of going to press there had been no such declaration. Meantime, Great Britain and France are on a full war basis with everything organized and ready for action in efence of Poland as well as of their own territory. Parliaments of both Great Britain and France met today and clothed their governments with full authority to meet any situation. Declarations of war, lowever, did not immediately follow.

Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop's inswer to the demand of Great Britain and France or immediate cession of hostilities in Poland was statement that Germany had not made itself guily of any act of aggression.

LIAN PROPOSAL

CONFERENCE

Foreign Secretary Halifax told the British House of Lords that no reply had been received from Hitler to Britain's latest warning to stop hosilities in Poland and withdraw troops. Berlin disatches said Hitler and his advisers were framing in answer. Halifax made his statement in the hird session of the Lords during the day. It is inlicated that delay in British action in view of Hiter's silence may be due to an Italian proposal for a ave power conference.

The last warning of Britain and France, Haliax said, had informed Hitler that the two powers keep their pledges of aid to Poland unless halted roops withdrew. Halifax said that Britain would not find it possible to take part in a conference while Poland was being subjected to invasion and her towns were under bombardment and Danzig had been made the subject of an unilateral settlement by force.

MINIONS LOYAL MOTHER LAND

Great Britain has been receiving asurances of full support and co-operation from the Dominions and colonies in the event of war in defence of Poand against German aggression. Dominions sending such messages have included Canada, Australla, New Zealand, South Africa and Northern Ireand. In the most of cases, of course, Parliamentary ratification will be sought by the Dominion governments. The Australian Parliament is called to meet next Wednesday.

A message has been sent by Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain to Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King of Canada expressing great satisfaction at the stand of Canada as enunciated by Mr. King.

Premier Eamonn de Valera of Eire announced o an emergency Dail session that his government Intends to remain neutral "as long as possible in a European conflict under the circumstances." The Opposition Leader stated that the vast majority of

the people of Eire are in favor of joining the cause of Poland. The British House of Commons passed through the important second reading stage a government conscription bill making men between 18 and 41 liable for military service. The vote was 340 to

The Soviet ambassador to Germany has been released and Declaration Of War Will Not Be Before Noon Tomorrow, It Is Announced by Chamberlain

EXPECTS, HOWEVER, THAT THERE WILL BE ONLY ONE ANSWER — MUSSOLINI'S PEACE PLAN HALTS MARCH TO RESCUE OF POLAND

LONDON, September 2: (CP)-Great Britain has delayed any declaration of war against Germany at least until noon tomorrow but Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain declared in the House of Commons that "I anticipate there is only one answer I shall have to give the House at that time." The Premier's statement followed revelation by Foreign Secretary Halifax that Italy had proposed a five power conference in an attempt to restore peace between Grmany and Poland. The declaration of war had been expected throughout the day.

Mr. Chamberlain told the Commons that he would be "horrified if the House for one moment thought my statement concerning the Italian proposal betrayed the slightest weakening either of the British or French governments in the attitude we have already taken."

After Chamberlain had spoken, Rt. Hon. Arthur Greenwood, Labor leader, declared: "There is a growing feeling in all quarters of the House that this incessant strain must end sooner or later and the sooner the better. "If we march I hope we shall march with complete unity and march with France."



(Continued from Page One)

forts made to save peace. "It is a lie," he said "to say that Poland rejected German proposals because it was never advised of them." He added that, if attempts at conciliation were renewed, the French government was ready to join them but he declared that "France and Great Britain cannot watch the destruction of a friendly people. In effect this is a new phase of the march toward world domination by the Hitler dictatorship."

Daladier said that the government places no faith in German guarantees and that France's very existence is threatened by the German attack on Poland. Daladier paid tribute to the Italian government's efforts to maintain peace.

Daladier was granted implied authority by the Chamber of Deputies to declare war on Germany. Power was vested in a war budget bill of about one billion and a half dollars which the Chamber of Deputies adopted unanimously.

Edouard Herriot, President of the Chamber, declared after the session that there would be no need to summon Parliament again for the purpose a war declaration.
