FORMER COTTON MILLS

In the neighborhood of Manchester a number of cotton mills have been forced out of business as a result of industrial changes. Rayon has in many cases taken the place of cotton. Three of these factories have been made over and turned into factories for ready-to-wear clothes employing girls. Hundreds of them are getting work in these factories and some of the output is being exported.

VANCOUVER MODEL

The proposal to form a co-operative farm in the neighborhood of Vancouver where some of Vancouver's unemployed may get relief has a precedent in South Wales where in the Vale of Glamorgan one hundred unemployed miners settled on a farm which they cultivated with much pleasure and profit to themselves and benefit to their wives and families. Each settler averaged about eleven dollars a week besides getting free vegetables. The cottages in which they lived cost them a dollar a week for rent and a garden went with each cottage.
