Will Great Britain Stiffen Its Foreign Policy?

Lord Halifax, Said To Realize Need Of Changing Stand, Meets Anthony Eden In London Parley

With Hungary Completing Conquest of Carpatho-Ukraine, There Are Signs That Der Fuehrer May Advance Further Eastward

LONDON, March 17: (CP)—Not only with the British public at large but among an increasing number of Parliamentary and governmental leaders is the feeling gaining ground that the time has come when a much firmer stand must be taken against the dictators of Europe, more particularly Adolf Hitler of Germany.

many government supporters, and possibly some of the ministers, are in favor of such a move. It is hinted that the recall of the British ambassador to Berlin, Sir Neville Henderson, may be a step in this direction.

Public feeling in Britain continues to warm up with the question on every lip: "Is Hitler preparing to dominate the whole of Europe?" Certainly everyone now agrees that his signature and word are worthless. Nor, in the light of latest developments, can it longer be said that racial feeling is in any way responsible for his foreign policy.

SETTLE AT PR. GEORGE

Refugee Families From Central Europe Are Going Into That District

VICTORIA, March 17: (CP)—Immigration department agents of the Canadian National Railways and Hon. A. Wells Gray, minister of lands, yesterday discussed settlement of refugee families from central Europe in the Prince George district.

Following the conference Mr. Gray said there was nothing definite to announce but added that the colonization department would submit a scheme later.

The number of families involved was not announced but government officials believe that an extensive scheme may be proposed.

This will be in addition to a settlement scheme for 200 Sude-ten families for the Peace River and Fraser Valley districts which was announced recently.

Cause Of Mine Disaster Not Settled Yet

TORONTO, March 17: (CP)—Premier Mitchell Hepburn announced yesterday that investigation was proceeding into the rock-burst in the Lakeshore mine at Kirkland Lake which caused the deaths of two miners last week but that the cause of the double fatality had not yet been determined.

Chamberlain-Roosevelt Unite In Bitter Denunciation; Will Resist Forceful Domination

Heads of Two Great Democracies Are Thoroughly Aroused as Indicated in Utterances Today—Daladier Asks For Special Defence Powers

LONDON, March 17: (CP)—Led by Great Britain and the United States through the heads of their respective governments the democracies of the world are uniting in condemnation of the latest exploits of aggression by Chancellor Adolf Hitler in Central Europe.

Speaking at his home city of Birmingham tonight Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain bitterly condemned Germany for absorption of Czechoslovakian territory and pledged Great Britain to resist any attempt to dominate the world by force.

Chamberlain asked: "What reliance can we place upon any assurances from Germany?" Events of this week in Central Europe, he declared, raised the question whether German's action in Czechoslovakia was a step in the direction of an attempt to dominate the world by force.

ROOSEVELT ALSO SPEAKS OUT

At Washington the United States government expressed "condemnation" of German "wanton lawlessness and arbitrary force" in occupying Czechoslovakia. Earlier President Franklin D. Roosevelt had said that European developments demonstrated the need for revision of the United States neutrality act at this session of Congress.

Meanwhile at Paris Premier Edouard Daladier asked the French Parliament for a free hand to govern France by decree until November 30 with a view to bolstering up national defence in view of the collapse of Czechoslovakia.

Officialdom here is anticipating the customary vitriolic outburst from Chancellor Adolf Hitler in view of the latest criticism that has been directed against him.

resulted fatally for those countries. With the absorption of Czechoslovakia by Germany, there is now no longer a buffer state between the Reich and Hungary. There is a growing feeling that Der Fuehrer may not much longer delay a coup to annex Hungary.

Meanwhile at Warsaw Poland was reported to be celebrating the achievement of a united front with Hungary through the conquest of Carpatho-Ukraine. There were cries, incongruously enough, of "Down With Germany! Down With the Jews!"

Masaryk Square in Prague, named after the first President of the Czechoslovakian republic, was yesterday renamed for Adolf Hitler coincident with the visit of the German chancellor. Hitler arrived in Vienna today after a two-day journey through his new protectorate of Bohemia and Moravia.

Minister Holds Out WASHINGTON, D. C., March 17: (CP)—Loyal to the last to his anti-Nazi convictions, Vladimir Hurban, Czechoslovakian minister to the United States, yesterday ignored cabled instructions from the German Foreign Office to relinquish his office. He said that he would not do so until he was in receipt of written instructions from Prague which will take at least a week to arrive.

EDITORIAL

WHAT IS WEALTH?

Discussions in this paper in regard to bonusing production of wheat and production of silver lead to the natural discussion as to what is wealth. Is wheat, the staple food of the nation, wealth or is silver which may be converted into currency wealth? Some argue that silver is not a necessity of life and, therefore, is not anything like as valuable as food. Others argue that silver, being convertible into money, is more nearly wealth than wheat or, at any rate, more easily convertible into something that we all need.

One line of argument is that the first need of man is food. We may have all the silver in the world yet, if there were no food to be bought with it, we should all starve. We could not eat the silver.

Usually an exporting country is looked upon as a wealthy country, because other countries pay money or other goods for what it has to sell. Ability to buy from others is based on the ability to produce something for which others are willing to pay cash or goods. Either wheat or silver may be exported and neither is in very great demand just now. That is why the government is asked to help finance production.

ANNUAL**

Ninety garden enthusiasts sat down together at the annual banquet of the Prince Rupert Horticultural Society last night at the Boston Cafe, the highlight of the evening being a lantern address by Fred Cole of Seattle, a graduate of the Kew Institute of London, England and now a garden architect at the Puget Sound city. Mrs. J. T. Mandy, vice-president of the society, presided in the absence of Charles Balagno, who was unable to attend. Dr. C. H. Hankinson, who brought Mr. Cole to the city to plot his garden, had a seat at the head table.

There were about two hundred pictures shown, mostly photographed in their natural colors, of various scenes in the famous Duffy Gardens at Seattle which

Mr. Cole laid out. The speaker told how he transformed this piece of steep wild woodland into a beautiful garden for the millionaire owner. He got his inspiration one evening from a wonderful sunset in which there were splashes of radiant color extending in every direction in the evening sky so he set about to imitate it in the garden. How well he succeeded was illustrated in the views he showed.

Many of the views shown were little dells and splashes of color formed by the use of the most common flowers, the seeds for which cost only a few cents. At one moment were seen the blues of massed hydrangeas, the mauves of candytufts, the creams and pinks of astilbes, vari-colored godetias, the scarlet of azalea, walls covered with aubretia. Evidently one of his favorites was the soft blending nepeta, heather, lavender, thyme and similar flowers. Most of the pictures shown were of common flowers easily grown in Prince Rupert. It was the way in which they were used to create such a succession of pictures that proved interesting to local people. Mr. Cole said this famous gar-

den was open to the public every Wednesday and was visited by large throngs of people. It was a common thing for as many as six hundred people to visit it in one day. Out of town visitors could see it at any time by request.

The question of fertilizers was discussed after the showing of the pictures, the speaker urging the use of small quantities of fertilizer at frequent intervals rather than large quantities at one time which were often wasted. Wood ashes were just as good as artificial fertilizers but they should also be used sparingly.

A vote of thanks was passed to the speaker and after the meeting adjourned many crowded around the visitor asking more specific questions, all of which were answered, Mr. Cole declaring that if ever he had the opportunity he would return to Prince Rupert and meet the local people again.

In order to give the visitor the whole evening for his pictures and talk, the business meeting was adjourned to Wednesday, March 29, when the election of officers will take place.

is no evidence (nor is there in the evidence any ground for suspicion) that the minister or the deputy minister or any officer or official of the Department of National Defence was guilty of any act of corruption or anything in the nature of corruption.

Despite this definite statement, however, every attempt is and has been made by the Opposition to keep on with insinuations and innuendos but with no definite charges.

The motion by the C.C.F. member, Mr. MacNeil, to refer the contract and the entire matter to the public accounts committee was accepted right away. The Prime Minister pointed out that, if Mr. MacNeil did not proceed with the motion, the government itself fully intended to do so.

Although no member had read the contract or knew anything of the details of the agreement the Conservative Party, not to be outdone by the C.C.F. party, immediately moved an amendment that the agreement be cancelled, the effect of which would have prevented the entire matter going to the public accounts committee but which amendment, however, was ruled out of order by the Speaker. The Leader of the Opposition challenged this and so the House witnessed the spectacle of the C.C.F. and Social Credit joining with the Conservative party in voting against the Speaker's ruling even though that ruling protected the main motion of the C.C.F.

Later on the same day Harry Stevens moved another amendment to the effect that the entire matter be referred to a committee of the whole House rather than to the public accounts committee. This shows to what an extent the Conservative party went to steal any political "kudos" from the C.C.F. party. When the vote was called on this, the Conservatives stood alone and, although the government was most anxious that the whole matter go to the committee as soon as possible, they forced a vote on the final motion to show

their sincerity in the matter. That most of the speeches made by Opposition members were made before they had read either the contract or the documents relating thereto was evidenced during the debate. Many, including the Leader of the Opposition, and others were accused of not having done so and there was no denial.

Minister's Policy

Here let it be said, that the Minister of National Defence has never departed from his own views, that the manufacture of guns and armaments should be in a government owned factory but when on evidence the government was informed it would cost thirty-five or forty million dollars for the government to do so, it became a serious money question and it is doubtful indeed if Parliament would have voted such a sum of money for this specific purpose.

Hon. Ian Mackenzie has repeatedly informed the House, that all contracts were available for inspection but no attempt was made last year by the Opposition to avail themselves of this opportunity. The likelihood of an election, however, this year has evidently changed their attitude in the matter.

Alex Gordon, well known chief engineer of the steamer Princess Adelaide on the local run between Vancouver and Prince Rupert, has been transferred to the Princess Alice. His successor on the Adelaide is Allen Matheson from the Princess Mary.

With spring travel now in the northerly direction, there were only fifty-six passengers aboard the Princess Norah which was in port yesterday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. Four persons disembarked here. The vessel took one passenger from this port.

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
