Fleming of Saskatchewwan Thinks Election Inadvisable This Year-C. C. F. Lauds U. S. Pact

OTTAWA, Feb. 24: (CP) - A Saskatchewan Liberal, Dr. Harry R. Fleming, member ofr Humboldt, candidly cautioned the government in Parliament yesterday against holding an election this year, Recalling the Liberal defeats in 1911, after the reciprocity pact, and in 1930, after the Dunning budget, Dr. Fleming suggested the advisability of holding off an election until after the results of the United States trade treaty be-

came more definitely ascertained. Dr. Fleming predicted that there would be a revolt against the government unless something was done to reduce the price of implements and gas and to im-

prove prices for primary products. "Unless the government does somthing to smash international combines, the government must be smashed itself," declared Fleming.
