Resistance to Russians Still Stubborn, However-Severe Air Raids Continued

#### Extreme Cold

Fuel in Motorized Equipment Congeals-Wounded Russians Freeze to Death

BETTER AGAIN TODAY HELSINGFORS, Dec. 21: (CP) Destruction of two Russian battalions and destruction or capture of large quantities of Russian tanks, machine guns and other weapons in successes along the eastern front were reported today by the Finnish army.

HELSINGFORS, Dec. 21: (CP)s Finland officially called to the colors all able-bodied men forty years of age, military sources claimed that hordes of Russian troops had been thrown back close to their own frontiers on the Karelian Isth-

Soviet bombers continued their raids on Finnish cities to the south while, according to dispatches from Kirkenes, Norway, blizzards and low temperatures had, annarently, paralvzed the Russian drive in northern Finland.

As the raids continued for the al. third successive day over Helsingors, a hospital area was singled for attack today and sixteen pugibs were dropped therein. school for the blind as well as hospitals being struck by a squadron of ten planes.

The air raids were the most severe since the war began, leaving fires burning in a number of cities and many dead. Over 200 planes were used, twenty Russian machines being brought down in fierce dog

The sub-zero temperature is congealing the oil in Russian tanks, rendering them useless and easy victims for capture. Other motorized equipment is also being put out of commission by the cold. Further, the extreme cold is causing slightly injured Russians, not prepared for such conditions, to freeze to death before they can be minstered to.



As slimly streamlined as the fuselage of an acroplane is this "bullet car," the invention of Bill Clark, world war veteran and aero mechanic, of Enid, Okla. Designed for use in war, the car is constructed of metal throughout with two wheels in front, one at the back, which makes for fast maneuverability. Guns could be mounted in the pointed nose and, claims Inventor Clark, enemy bullets would glance off the streamlined sides. 




