## Great Britain Still Rules Waves

### MURDER IN HOLLYWOOD

Body of Wife of Screen Writer Found In Canyon Back Of Beverly Hills

BEVERLY HILLS, Cal., March 16.—It looks like Hollywood has another murder mystery on its hands. Yesterday the body of Mrs. Edward Dougherty, wife of a screen writer, was found in a canyon back of Beverly Hills. Search had been instituted for her following her failure to return after going out for a walk. A man, who is alleged to have been seen loitering around her home, is being sought.

### WAS DOWN ON OCEAN

German Long Distance Flier, On Way to South America, Picked Up Off Atlantic Ocean

NATAL, Brazil, March 16: (CP)—Herman Diehl, German long distance flier, essaying a flight from Ostman to Brazil, was forced down on the Atlantic Ocean yesterday 125 miles off the coast of Brazil. Word last night was to the effect that Diehl and his companions had been rescued by a German steamer. The plane had left Berlin on Tuesday, flying via the Cape Verde Islands.

### Not Liable For Spanish Vets

Saskatchewan Relief Department Holds They Gave Up Canadian Citizenship By Enlisting

REGINA, March 16: (CP)—The Saskatchewan relief department holds that it is not responsible for veterans of the Spanish civil war. In enlisting for that campaign, they gave up their Canadian citizenship rights, it is held.

### Six Months In Essington Case

James Flewin Sent Down For Breaking and Entering With Intent To Assault

James Flewin was sentenced to six months' imprisonment by Judge W. E. Fisher in County Court yesterday afternoon on a charge of breaking and entering with intent to commit an assault. Flewin pleaded guilty to the charge which arose out of a recent affray among Indians at Port Essington following a drinking bout.

### Minister To Be Relieved

It May Not Be Comfortable For Czechoslovakian Envoy To United States To Return Home

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 16: Vladimir Hurban is still functioning as Czechoslovakian minister to the United States although it will probably not be long following the taking over of his country by Germany. His speedy withdrawal is anticipated. Hurban has been an outspoken critic of German Nazism and, following his withdrawal as minister, he will probably remain in the United States in the interests of his personal safety.

### Carpatho-Ukraine Is Now European Danger Point As Invasion Being Resisted

LONDON, March 16: (CP)—Defying Hungary whose military advance it is resisting and appealing to the nations to be accorded rights and protection as an independent state, the Carpatho-Ukraine, the narrow easternmost strip of former Czechoslovakia, today looms as a centre of international complications. Ruthenia, as the Carpatho-Ukraine is also known, has made it plain that it does not want to be annexed by Hungary which, in its campaign with that end in view, has the blessing of the German Reich and Chancellor Adolf Hitler. Up and down the mountain slopes the Ukraine Sitch Guards were fighting the Hungarian forces with heavy losses on both sides reported. Meantime, Polish troops were still massed on the frontier to the north.

Premier Volosin of Carpatho-Ukraine is still in Roumania, having fled before the advancing army. Particularly fierce street fighting was reported today from Chust, the capital of the Carpatho-Ukraine.

In Budapest Premier Teleky told the Hungarian Parliament that "the Carpatho-Ukraine has become a part of the Kingdom of Hungary."

Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain told the House of Commons today that the government was considering calling home Sir Neville Henderson, British ambassador to Germany, to report on the German annexation of Bohemia, Moravia and Slovakia.

### WILL BRITAIN PROTEST?

Premier Chamberlain, asked whether the government contemplates protesting to Germany against the invasion of Czechoslovakia, declined to answer immediately.

Geoffrey Lloyd, Under Secretary for Home Affairs, told the House of Commons that Nazi organizations in Great Britain were being watched closely.

The new German annexation will not destroy the scheme for the transport of three thousand Sudeten Germans to Canada but it will seriously reduce the number of the emigrants.

### OFFENSIVE BY FRANCO

Nationalist Commander-in-Chief Plans Speedy Capture Of Madrid and Valencia

PARIS, March 16:—General Francisco Franco is reported to be massing his forces around Madrid for a final offensive against those two cities with a view to bringing a speedy conclusion to the civil war. They are the only two points of importance still held by the republicans.

### MANY ARE IN FIELD

Fifty-Eight Are Nominated For Civic Office In Ketchikan—List Will Be Reduced

KETCHIKAN, March 16:—No less than fifty-eight names for civic office at the elections in April were presented at a caucus yesterday. Many of these will be eliminated before the ballot papers are prepared. One mayor, three councillors and other lesser offices are to be filled.

### Co-Operative Plan For Importing Of Farm Implements

REGINA, March 16: (CP)—The Saskatchewan Legislature has under consideration a co-operative plan for the importation of farm implements.

### Cold Weather Over Prairies

Unseasonable Sub-Zero Temperatures General With Low Points In Saskatchewan

WINNIPEG, March 16: (CP)—Frigid north winds yesterday held March weather across the prairies to unseasonable sub-zero levels. North Battleford in Saskatchewan, with 24 below, reported the lowest temperature. In Regina and Saskatoon it was 22 below; at Edmonton, sixteen below, Calgary, fifteen below, and Winnipeg, five below.

### C.C.F. Quitting Alberta For This Province

OTTAWA, March 16: (By Tom Reid)—Unless the election is going to be delayed prospects of an early adjournment of the House are not very bright. Each party is showing a certain amount of activity in preparation for the expected forthcoming election battle this year. The C.C.F. are evidently feeling more hopeful about the results which may be expected in British Columbia for their party than in the province of Alberta as evidenced by some of their stalwarts leaving Alberta with intention of running in some of the constituencies in British Columbia.

### Britannia Is Ready To Accept Any Challenge For Battle With Navy

Largest Fleet Building Program in Any Peacetime Year is Provided For in Estimates Presented Today—Two Hundred Fighting Craft to be Built

LONDON, March 16: (CP)—The Royal Navy, Great Britain's first defence line, "can confidently accept a direct challenge in battle by any combination of foes," Geoffrey Shakespeare, financial secretary to the Admiralty, told the House of Commons today. Mr. Shakespeare presented estimates totalling £149,000,000 (\$700,000,000) for the fiscal year 1939-40, a record for peace time, and outlined a vast naval building program involving two hundred vessels, large and small to be built in dockyards and shipyards this year and next.

### New Route To Orient Is Planned

SEATTLE, March 16: (C P)—The United States Coast and Geodetic Survey discloses a five year 25,000,000 project to chart a shorter and safer course to Asia through the North Pacific and to facilitate naval operations in fog-shrouded Aleutian Islands.

### NAZI LAWS LAID DOWN BY HITLER

Der Fuehrer at Least Sounds Benvolent in Talk About "Autonomous Protectorate" Within Reich

PRAGUE, March 16: (CP)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler, stretching the arms of his expanding Empire two hundred miles to the east, today laid down the law of Germany for Bohemia and Moravia and agreed to take Slovakia under his protection.

The third part of broken Czechoslovakia, the Carpatho-Ukraine, is due to disappear from the map by Hungarian annexation.

In a decree issued here, Hitler charted the future of the ancient lands of Bohemia and Moravia as that of an "autonomous protectorate" within Greater Germany. Later, the Chancellor left Prague for an unannounced destination.

### THE GREAT OUTDOORS

This is the season of the year when people turn to the great outdoors for their recreation and enjoyment. During the winter the tendency is to stay in the house or attend indoors events often lasting through half the night. The result is a lowering vitality with tendency to colds.

One of the tendencies of life in our climate is that we do not spend enough time outside. We like to sit around the fire when we should be inhaling fresh air. Exercise out of doors is almost essential to health.

Now we turn to our favorite outdoor pursuits. Some like boating and swimming. Others like walking or outdoor games. Of late years there has been a tendency toward gardening, an occupation that gives a reward in health and in beauty. The great thing is to get outside for at least an hour or two each day.

### IMPROVED CONDITIONS

Conditions on the highway have been improved during the past few weeks. Some of the bad turns have been made less dangerous and driving is now much more enjoyable than it had been in the past. This is excellent and we are glad to be able to congratulate the department of public works of the provincial government on the work they are doing. We hope they will keep it up.

### ST. PATRICK'S DAY

Tomorrow is St. Patrick's Day and Irishmen everywhere will celebrate more or less. Some will simply wear a sprig of shamrock in the buttonhole. On that day Irishmen everywhere stick out their chests, hold their heads high and let the world know they come from a great little island where the grass is green and people are happy or quarrelsome or possibly happy while being quarrelsome. In Canada these same Irish people seem to lose their propensity to quarrel and are among the very best citizens.

We are not much concerned with who St. Patrick was or what he did. It is the results that count. We know the Irishman today and, doubtless, St. Patrick had something to do with making him what he is.

### VALUE OF AIRPLANES

What is the value of the airplane in war? That is a question that is being asked by a great many people. The totalitarian nations are putting their faith in bombing planes and are building them by the thousands. They undoubtedly, do a great deal of damage but in the early days of the Spanish war Franco had very few and the Chinese have had very few compared with their opponents. In each case the war lasted two years and even yet is not ended. Lately Spain was well supplied with bombing planes and yet they have not taken Madrid.

It is just possible that the value of airplanes is over-emphasized. They have their place, undoubtedly, but whether such a tremendous number as Germany seems to be building will justify the outlay remains to be seen when and if war comes.

## The Letter Box

### WHEAT AND SILVER

Editor, Daily News: We almost regret having tried to put in a word for the farmers.

It is the concerted attack upon them by all other industries that gets us down. It reminds one of the Germans accusing other countries of forcing them into the armament race.

I shall try to be brief and make one last effort in view of the fact that Mr. Kenney's letter might be more than a coincidence.

You will note that we agreed with the fishermen's statements providing they were in the same position as the farmers in their claims. We will just mention that the farmers are not to blame for their receiving \$1.75 a ton for nice herring at Rupert nor do we blame the fishermen because we have had to pay as much as \$230 a ton for the same herring after they had come only 290 miles to use here.

We have always stated that the miners were entitled to more than 50c for silver. We see no reason why Bryan was not correct when he advocated a 16 to 1 ratio. In any case we do not see why silver should be practically pegged at its present price. The greatest wonder of them all is why no one has had a word to say about the fact that the government raised the price of gold 100 percent and fixed the price at that level. What justification for so doing or what it does to our property values we are not able to say off hand. We merely remark upon the fact that no one has ever said a single word about that matter. Does it have the effect of cutting our property values in half? Does it come under that horrible thing called inflation? Some one please tell us.

It seems to us that Mr. Kenney speaks rather slightly of wheat. In fact one might wonder what the farmers wanted to raise such useless stuff for in the first place. Allow us to suggest that neither gold nor silver would be much missed if it was sunk in the sea. We will also suggest the possibility that the governments of the world would show better judgment were wheat, instead of gold, made the basis of their currency.

We also believe the present manipulated prices of wheat must be very interesting to Britain as well as the other countries who are now storing up huge quantities of wheat for a rainy day, which recalls the farmers were skinned on wheat in the last war with fixed prices. We would also like to point out that the 20c bushel, on No. 1 wheat alone, is but a very small item compared to the fixed prices paid farmers in most of the European countries for the past 15 years.

And have these wise guys figured out just who gets the 20c paid in Canada and what would have happened had it not been done? There are so many things about this matter that most people do not seem to have the least idea about but they just take a crack at the simple minded rubes because they think they can bite them without getting a sock in the jaw. We wonder if they ever

## T.B. FILMS ARE SHOWN

Large Parent Teachers' Gathering Gets Up-to-Date Ideas On Malady

There was a very large attendance at the regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Parent Teachers' Association which was held last evening in the auditorium of the Booth Memorial High School with Mrs. R. M. Winslow presiding.

Following the business meeting and musical program, Dr. R. G. Large showed four reels of moving pictures explaining and illustrating the work which is being done by physicians under direction of the National Tuberculosis Association and the Provincial Board of Health, and Tuberculosis Control. The showing of these pictures did much to banish false ideas regarding the cause, nature, and treatment of this disease. That tuberculosis can be cured if treatment is begun early was stressed. Delay in treatment, however, was likely to push the patient into the advanced stages of the disease. This could be prevented by early diagnosis by means of the tuberculin test and an x-ray picture of the chest if the test was positive. The pictures disseminated accurate and scientific knowledge regarding tuberculosis and tended to develop a sane and enlightened attitude towards its prevention and treatment.

Mrs. H. L. A. Tarr, with a skillfully rendered pianoforte solo, and Miss Betty Wilkinson, with vocal solos, accompanied by Mrs. B. Lundahl, provided a very enjoyable musical program.

Arrangements were made for the annual Easter candy sale in the schools and the following conveners were appointed: Borden Street School, Mrs. William Brown; King Edward School, Mrs. R. Wood and Mrs. H. Perkins; Booth Memorial School, Mrs. M. M. McLachlan.

## Whifflets From The Waterfront

Halibut Fishing Will Soon Be On Preparatory Work Becoming Intensive — North Island Co-Op Representative Arrives.

The Prince Rupert halibut fleet is becoming intensively active these days in preparation for the commencement of the 1939 season's fishing activities on April 1. All preparations are being made with that end in view and there appear to be no obstacles in the way now to a smooth and orderly start being made at that time. The only point of difference to be seen is that in regard to length of layovers between trips under the voluntary curtailment plan as between the Alaska and Prince Rupert fleets on the one hand and the Seattle fleet on the other, Seattle has offered to compromise but the northern fleets have reiterated their determination to adhere to the plan of last year. Halibut boats for Area No. 3 are expected to start leaving for the banks about the end of next week. The first of the Area No. 2 boats will be getting away two or three days before the actual commencement of fishing.

Following the recent decision of the North Island Trollers' Co-Operative Association and the Prince Rupert Fishermen's Co-Operative Association to amalgamate, George Olsen has arrived in the city from Vancouver to be in charge of the office here for the North Island

Association. The headquarters of the merger will be in Prince Rupert although the North Island Association will maintain an office in Vancouver for the time being at least.

Fabrication has been completed at the local dry dock of the new steel car barge for service on Okanagan Lake between Kelowna and Penticton. Six carloads, including equipment, has already

shipped to Kelowna and another eight or nine cars will be leaving shortly. Assembling of the barge at Kelowna will start next month. In connection with the work, Walter Hume, accountant, and Robert Cameron of the local dry dock staff have left for Kel-

owna and two or three more members of the staff will be going later.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Norah, Capt. William Palmer, is due in port at 3:45 this afternoon from Skagway and other Alaska points and will sail at 5 o'clock for Vancouver.

The Armour Salvage Co.'s power tugs Pachena and Daly, which have been away since last Saturday digging gravel at Hastings Arm for the new Dybhavn & Hanson building, are due back tonight from the north with the outfit and the cargo.
