

WHERE IS BORDEN'S NAVAL POLICY?

Lord Charles Beresford, popularly known as "Condor Meetings held every 1st and 3rd Sunday of the Charlie," for a British admiral made some startling charges against the British government, one of the most serious of which G. VUKOVICH, is that they furnished dreadnoughts when they ought to furnish men for the navy. He expressed the opinion that the British public had been hypnotized by the huge dreadnoughts, and the British government, yielding to the craze, built the monster I sea-fighters and then were unable to properly man them.

He has been marshaling his battalions of wind and frost and hurling them, in Ontario, against the advancing hosts of Spring. He has won some victories there recently. GOING HIGHER

The Department of Labor Tells a Story of the Cost of Living, Which Steadily Increases in the Dominion.

Oftawa, Feb. 19 .- The Department of Labor's price record for January shows the general price within the present generation. Certainly since the early eighties.


