

FREWEN CASE ON APPEAL BEFORE PRIVY COUNCIL

TENDERS FOR CITY LUMBER

Three Hundred Thousand Feet Wanted for Streets and Cemetery Road—Tenders Referred to Engineer and Public Works.

More lumber—300,000 feet in all—is required by the city for streets and for the cemetery road construction. Tenders were called for and opened last night in council. The Swanson Bay Forests Company did not bid, as their mills are closed down and will not reopen in time. The Westholme Lumber Company bid \$16.75 per thousand for spruce only. The Ocean Falls Company bid \$15.50 per thousand for rough fir or spruce delivered at the wharf and offered Weston's cartage at cost to the city for delivering the lumber. The matter is referred to the City Engineer and Board of Works for consideration with power to act.

ROSS OPENS THE CAMPAIGN FOR THE LIBERAL PARTY

Energetic Bunch of Delegates Elected Last Night to Attend Liberal Convention at Vancouver---Mr. Ross Points Out a Few of the Abuses Which Mark the Conduct of the Two-Man Government

The campaign for the provincial elections may be said to have opened last night at a meeting of the Liberal Association held in the hall of the Knights of Pythias. Dr. Kergin, the new president of the association was in the chair, and the feature of the evening was an able address by Duncan Ross, the candidate of the party at the last federal election. It was an address of wise counsel, of admonition that the party, strong as it is in Prince Rupert, should not enter the campaign now upon us with too confident a tread, but should carefully watch the ways of the enemy, some of whose devious and crooked ways, especially in regard to the railway issue, Mr. Ross took pains to detail.

The primary object of the meeting was to select delegates to the Liberal convention to be held in Vancouver on the 29th. During the discussion it was shown that the association had already several members in Vancouver and Victoria, and that in addition among those who were going below on business anyway, or could conveniently make the trip as delegates were H. Campbell, John Piercy, J. Sloan, C. Peck, Dr. Kergin, George Frizzell, J. R. Morgan, G. R. Naden, Fred Stork, C. B. Lockhart and Dan McKinnon. Duff Pattullo, John Y. Rochester and Alex. Manson are already there.

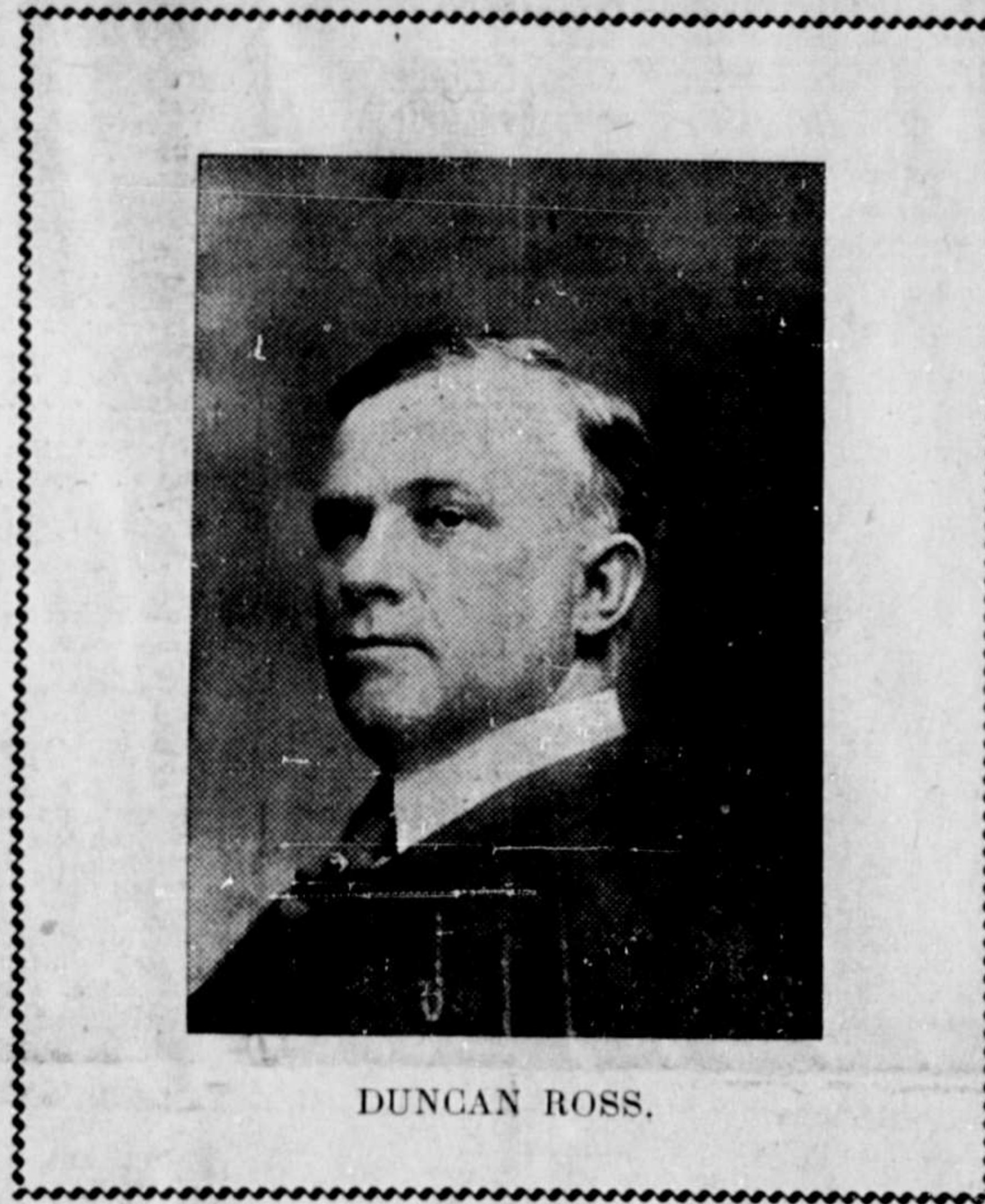
Secretary Anderson was unable to say how many delegates Prince Rupert were entitled to, but on the motion of Mr. Stewart, seconded by Mr. McRae, eight delegates were suggested. Those willing to serve were asked to stand up, and

the chairman decided all those going to Vancouver should be empowered as delegates, leaving the convention to decide how many it would seat. Questions were asked as to reduced fares, and Secretary Anderson stated that the C. P. R. agent here had no knowledge of reduced rates to delegates attending the convention, but that the

Grand Trunk Pacific was willing to give reduced rates if the Canadian Pacific would.

Mr. Ross then asked if a resolution should not be drawn up for the delegation to present to the convention. The president thought this might be left to the delegates themselves, and par-

M'BRIDE BUDGET BROUGHT UP IN PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

ESTIMATES CALL FOR AN EXPENDITURE OF NEARLY THREE MILLIONS IN EXCESS OF LAST YEAR, BUT THE ESTIMATED RECEIPTS ARE LARGER.

(Special to Daily News.)

Victoria, Feb. 23.—The estimates of revenue and expenditure for the fiscal year ending March 31st were last evening introduced in the legislature by Finance Minister Ellison. They show the estimated receipts for the year to come to be \$10,387,830.06, as compared with the estimate of \$8,192,401.06 for 1911-1912. The expenditures for the ensuing twelve months are forecasted at \$16,870,011.09, as compared with an estimate of \$11,035,360.75 last session.

The estimates as brought down call for an expenditure for 1912-1913 of the record sum of \$8,353,860, being almost \$3,000,000 in excess of last year, the increase being made up in proportionate advances for the require-

ments of roads, bridges, works, buildings, ferries and contingencies.

GRAHAM'S OVERWHELMING VICTORY OVER COMBINED FORCES OF CONSERVATIVES

(SPECIAL TO DAILY NEWS.)

RENFREW, ONT., FEB. 23.—HON. GEORGE E. GRAHAM, MINISTER OF RAILWAYS IN THE LAURIER CABINET, WHO WAS DEFEATED AT BROCKVILLE IN THE FEDERAL ELECTIONS, WAS RETURNED FOR SOUTH RENFREW YESTERDAY BY A SPLENDID MAJORITY. HE DEFEATED DR. MALLORY, CONSERVATIVE, BY A MAJORITY OF 294. THE ELECTION WAS NECESSITATED BY THE RESIGNATION OF MR. LOW, LIBERAL. IT WAS THE MOST CRUCIAL CONTEST THAT HAS BEEN WAGED SINCE THE CONSERVATIVES WENT INTO POWER. EVERY POSSIBLE EFFORT WAS MADE TO PREVENT THE RETURN TO PARLIAMENT OF MR. GRAHAM, AND IN THE CAMPAIGN ITSELF MANY LEADING CONSERVATIVES TOOK PART. ALSO MANY LEADING LIBERALS, SIR WILFRID HIMSELF GOING DOWN TO SOUTH RENFREW AND DELIVERING TWO SPEECHES.

HOSPITAL EXTENSION NOW WITHIN REACH

Twenty Thousand Dollars Promised the Board by City and Govt. Grants of \$10,000 Each---President's Thanks

President D. G. Stewart of the Prince Rupert General Hospital Board, who is nothing if not the soul of courtesy, last night attended the City Council meeting in order to convey personally his thanks and the thanks of the board to the City Council for their generous grant of \$10,000 toward the hospital extension.

After mentioning the struggles of the board last year to keep things running in good shape in the face of a debt of \$4,000 to the Union Bank, payment of which debt the members of the board personally guaranteed, President Stewart warmly expressed the thanks of his colleagues on the board. "It is not easy," he said, "to realize the difficulties in the

way of raising money in this city even for so popular a purpose as this is, and the appreciation of the board for this grant, which has strengthened the hands of Mr. Manson at Victoria in his effort to raise an equal sum from the government, is the more intense."

O. H. Nelson, as a member of the board, added his appreciation of the grant, mentioning that the board planned a very wise expenditure of the money to the very best advantage of the city as a whole.

Opportunity was taken by Alderman Morrissey and Alderman Bullock-Webster, who favored delay over this grant at last council meeting, to assure the press and public that they were

heart and soul with the grant.

On behalf of the Council Acting Mayor Douglas rose to the occasion. "I might state," he said amidst cheers, "that every single member of the council is now in favor of this grant, and so far I have not heard one solitary opinion against it from any citizen." (Cheers.)

Late last night President D. G. Stewart was informed that the government has granted a further \$10,000 through Mr. Manson's approach, and that the money is now available. There is accordingly the certainty now that the general hospital will be extended adequately and substantially in an up-to-date manner as befits the city of Prince Rupert.

WHERE IS BORDEN'S NAVAL POLICY?

Lord Charles Beresford, popularly known as "Gondor Charlie," for a British admiral made some startling charges against the British government, one of the most serious of which is that they furnished dreadnoughts when they ought to furnish men for the navy. He expressed the opinion that the British public had been hypnotized by the huge dreadnoughts, and the British government, yielding to the craze, built the monster sea-fighters and then were unable to properly man them.

Prime Minister Borden's naval policy, such as it was, when it was, was to add another dreadnought to the British fleet without supplying a single Canadian to man the fleet. That is, of course, with Mr. Bourassa's kind permission. He wanted to give money to a nation well supplied with money, but declined to furnish men to the mother country which needed men. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's naval policy, which was thoroughly endorsed by the Dominion at large, was to furnish men to a nation that needed men, and not to furnish money or ships to a mother country which was well supplied with money and ships.

The Laurier policy was more practicable and more patriotic than the Borden policy that used to be. Everybody can see this. The mother country saw it and took that rod out of pickle for Master Borden. What Borden's naval policy is just now nobody seems to be able to predict—not even Bourassa.

FIGHTING FEBRUARY'S LAST BRAVE KICK.

We had a snow storm yesterday afternoon and instead of being something to worry about it rather inclined us to feel good; because the wire told us where this same storm, possibly, in Ontario had played havoc, had tied up railroads and street cars, broken the telegraph and telephone wires and unsettled conditions generally. But the big flakes of yesterday did not even make a coating on our sidewalks, not a wire was broken or a street car stopped.

February is a great old bluffer. It was the worst day he has given us, so don't be cross about it. February is the general who is chosen to end Winter's forlorn hope. He knows he is fighting a losing battle, especially in this benign climate. "As the days begin to lengthen, the cold begins to strengthen" is an old saying, but has not other reason for appearing in a Prince Rupert almanac. When it is daylight from seven to six, the reign of Winter is coming to an end. Soon his grip will relax. The imprisoned waters of the Skeena River are already beginning to move. Little brown buds, all glossy and sticky with sap, are appearing: you will notice during your ramble in the bush on Sunday little green things and even flowers timidly poking their heads above the sod.

But the fierce old whiskered warrior February knew what was coming, and that makes him all the more grim and determined. He has been marshaling his battalions of wind and frost and hurling them, in Ontario, against the advancing hosts of Spring. He has won some victories there recently. But when the other generals come in to congratulate him on the way he walloped Spring, he will say, using the philosophic language of our acting mayor: "I might state that you have not yet seen those seed catalogues Sheriff Shirley has."

A sad and disappointed man, in the person of the official whipper-in of the McBride dispensation, Mr. T. Wadham, left on the Prince Rupert this morning. He is sad because of the report to the premier which he carries, as Bunyan carried his load. It is to the effect that the insurgent Conservatives of Prince Rupert still insist on insuring; that the Progressives are still determined to progress and protest. All of which is too sad for utterance.

The Trombone was also sad this morning. Not so much so on account of the disappointment of Mr. Wadham, which it sympathetically shares, but that it has to admit that The Daily News was right when it said the government wharf was a public matter and not a private McBride enterprise. And this is the jam it spreads over its own dose of medicine: "After pursuing a most presumptuous course by intruding itself into the private business of the Property Owners' Association, the Liberal organ," etc. Why does the Trombone not ask why a public body, associated for public good, should have butted into such a sacredly private concern as the McBride wharf?

ALWAYS KEEPS GOING HIGHER

The Department of Labor Tells a Story of the Cost of Living, Which Steadily Increases in the Dominion.

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—The Department of Labor's price record for January shows the general price level highest known, probably, within the present generation. Certainly since the early eighties.

Since the middle of June last a pronounced and continuous upward movement has been in progress, and though there was a short breathing spell in December, January now shows the highest level of all. The department's index number, which is based on the observation of fluctuations in 261 commodities, selected for their representative character, rose to 131.0 in January, that is, general prices were 31 per cent. higher in that month than was the average for the decade 1890-1899, which is taken by the department as the standard of comparison in constructing its number, compared with prices in 1897, the lowest year in the last quarter century. Prices are now at least 45 per cent. higher.

GETTING GOOD PAY

Nelson's Civic Laborers Paid Better Than Vancouver's.

The Nelson, B. C., branch of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners through its secretary, G. H. Hardy, writes as follows to the Province: "It having come to the notice of members of this union that Vancouver's city engineer has stated that three dollars per day as a minimum wage is the highest paid by any city in Canada to civic laborers, we beg to state that Nelson, B. C., has enjoyed this privilege for four years and the minimum wage for city employees for Nelson, B. C., is now \$3.20 per day."

FEDERAL DISTRICT

Would Have Ottawa and Hull Ruled as Washington is.

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—Replying to a delegation who waited upon the government this morning and asked for the creation of a federal district, taking Ottawa and Hull, to be governed by a commission, Premier Borden said that he was much interested in the proposal. He asked the deputation, however, to furnish the government with more definite details in regard to their proposal.

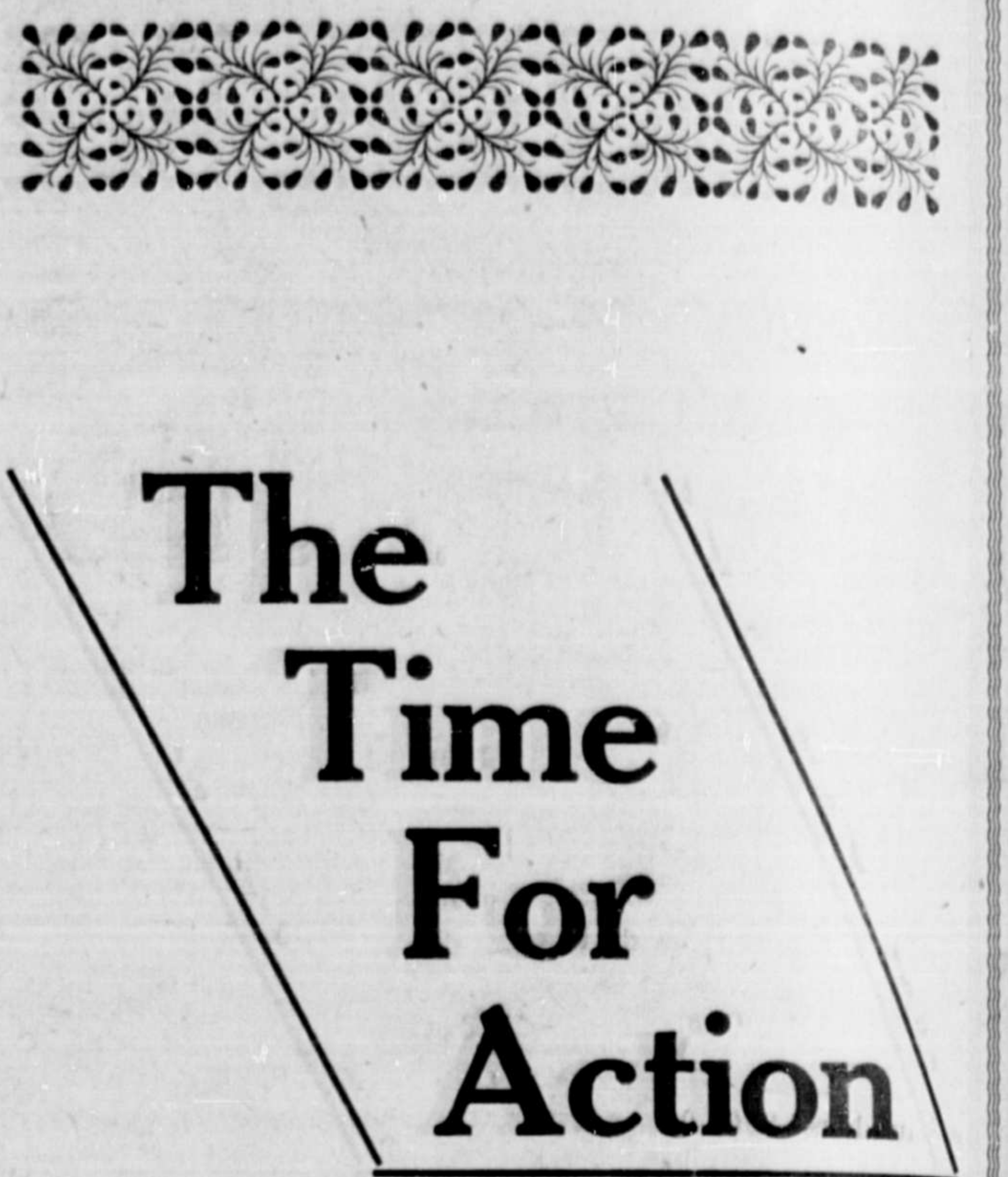

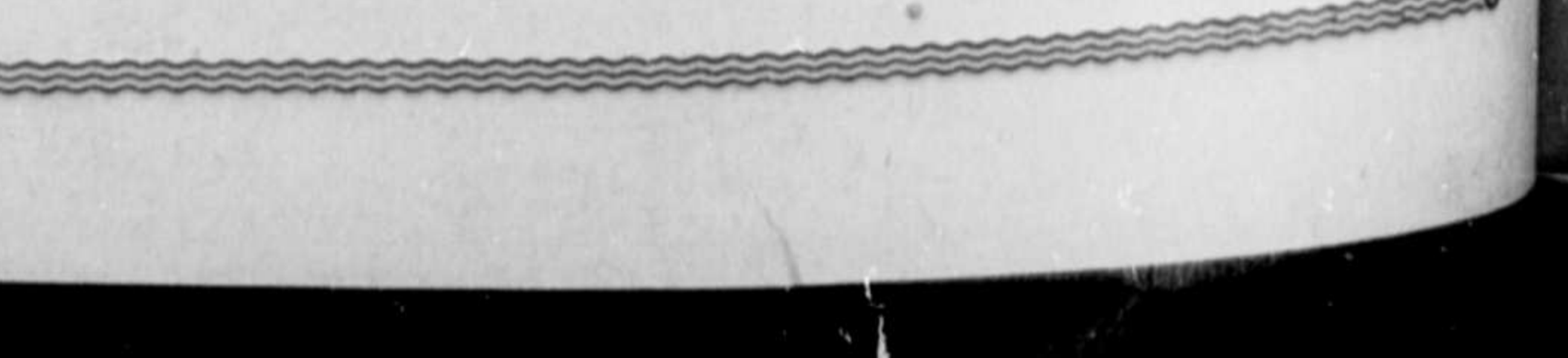

"SPLENDID BANKRUPT"

Ernest Terah Hooley, Notorious "Crook" Financier, Now in Prison for Comparatively trifling Offense in London.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) London, Feb. 22.—Ernest Terah Hooley, who was one of the leading men in the financial world of London a few years ago, was sentenced at the Old Bailey to one year's imprisonment on the charge of obtaining money by fraudulently representing as free of encumbrances some property he had sold to the complainant. Hooley was one of the leading financiers in England from 1890 to 1898, when he was declared bankrupt. In 1896 Hooley launched a tire company and made a profit of \$12,500,000. He owned many race horses and yachts, including the racing cutter Britannia, formerly the property of King Edward, and he possessed also several historical country stables. After his bankruptcy he was known as the "splendid bankrupt," as he continued to live in princely style on money which had been placed in his wife's name.

British Censor Resigns. Earl Spencer has resigned his office as lord chamberlain. His action is attributable to the widespread criticism recently of his conduct of the office of censor of plays.

American troops are being forwarded to the Mexican boundary merely to keep the line fence in good repair.

RECOGNITION OF NEW REPUBLIC

President Yuan Shi Kai of China Sends a Note to All the Powers That Republic Be Recognized.

Pekin, Feb. 19.—Yuan Shi Kai has prepared a notification to the powers of the Chinese republic and at the same time has requested their recognition of the republic. It is not expected, however, that recognition by the powers will be accorded until a cabinet has been appointed. The adoption of the western calendar has been given to the public by formal manifesto which replaced the imperial edict of the former regime.

SIR WILFRID UPSET
Sleigh in Which He Was Riding in Ottawa Was Overturned.

Ottawa, Feb. 19.—While on the way to the railway station to take the train for Eganville, where he addressed a meeting in connection with South Renfrew by-election, Sir Wilfrid Laurier's sleigh was overturned and the leader of the opposition was thrown into the street. He was not injured and proceeded to the station.

Lillian Russell's Patent Trunk. Lillian Russell has been granted a patent on a trunk for actresses that combines a wardrobe, dressing room and other conveniences. The trunk is electrically lighted. Years ago, when airy fairy Lillian was a burlesque actress, and had only been married a few times, the matter of trunks for her wardrobe was a secondary consideration, and in case of emergency a pill box would answer.

FOLLOW CANADA'S EXAMPLE AND MAKE PANAMA CUT FREE

New York, Feb. 20.—The World advocates a free Panama Canal. Editorially it says today:

"Canada has expended more than \$100,000,000 to provide ship canals from the Atlantic Ocean to the Great Lakes. It is a larger expenditure relative to population or resources than the United States will make at Panama. The cost of maintenance and improvements are relatively larger. "Nevertheless, American vessels are allowed to go toll free through these costly Canadian waterways. The American tonnage through the Welland Canal is larger than the Canadian. The tonnage of both countries through the American and Canadian canals at the Soo is larger than that of the Suez and larger than that will be at Panama. But Canada rejects the policy of cost tolls or

profit tolls where they could be so easily collected. It adopts the policy of making its artificial waterways as free as the high seas. The United States does the same with its canal at the Soo. "Can the United States afford to adopt a Panama Canal policy less generous to Canada or the nations than this Canadian canal policy is to the United States? Protests are being made in the Dominion Parliament against preferential tolls for the American ships in the Panama Canal. Canada has the right to protest. It has an equal right to ask for a canal without tolls, and this country will perform a world service of greater profit to itself than can be computed in money by adopting the policy of a free canal."

ROSS OPENS THE CAMPAIGN

(Continued from Page 1.)

cularly so as the association had already, through its secretary, acquainted the secretary of the convention with their views upon the principal issues of the campaign.

There were enthusiastic calls for Duncan Ross and amid hearty cheers that gentleman took the platform. He first gave thanks to the party for the uphill fight made for him two months ago, and said that although defeated the party had nothing to be ashamed of. After all Liberals did not mind defeat. They were fighting not for office but for good government and the honest administration of public affairs, and could not fail of ultimate success in the natural course of things.

In the coming campaign the party would undoubtedly put up a good fight because it had the strong backing of public opinion. The time was ripe for the people to rise against a government absolutely free from restraint and ruling the province by orders in council. The present government was absolutely weak in the administration of justice and in its dealings with the land question. Here were thousands upon thousands of acres of fine agricultural land awaiting the settler, and there in Vancouver was an angry, hungry mob of many thousands without work, while nearly one-third of the population of that city was getting rich by dealing in real estate.

He next referred to the liquor act, the alleged object of which was to secure to the traveling public decent hotel accommodation. Yet between Hazelton and Aldermere there was but one licensed house and no traveler could get decent accommodation on that road. But there were seven blind pigs, with dirty beds and bunks, running openly, selling whisky freely, run solely for the selling of whisky.

In this and in other respects the administration of justice was a farce. At Hazelton an Indian shot and killed two white men. He took to the woods and was uncaptured for a couple of years. We had been told that the murderer had recently died of pneumonia, which showed that the police force of British Columbia.

Mr. Ross next referred to the case of C.M. Woodworth, a lawyer who chanced to be president of the Vancouver Conservative Association. As such he was able to steal from the people of Prince Rupert the water they needed from Woodworth Lake, then sell for \$45,000 to the people of this city the water that was rightfully theirs. And William Manson let the deal go through. This was the effect of having in the legislature a servile supporter of the government in power. There was one man in the legislature deserving of all praise. This was H. C. Brewster. (Loud cheers.) The fight he was making against great odds commanded the admiration of every Liberal and of every man free to think and aspire for honest administration.
