TESTING DEFENCE

Two Hundred French Planes Stage Imaginary Air Raid Over London

LONDON, August 18: (CP)—Great Britain tested the resourcefulness of her fighting planes yesterday in a striking demonstration of sky strength of two hours which brought more than two hundred French bombers over London in manoeuvres. It was the first time that French planes had ever manoeuvred in mass flights over England. The demonstrations were both by night and day. Besides London there were mock raids of other large cities such as Liverpool, Birmingham, Manchester and Bristol.

WAS ALL ACCIDENT

Strain Of Weight Of Aircraft Carrier Formidable Was Too Great For Holding Blocks

BELFAST, August 18: (CP)—Circumstances of the runaway launching yesterday of the great British Navy aircraft carrier Formidable are stated officially to have been of entirely accidental nature. It was stated that too great a strain had been imposed by the enormous weight of the hull against the wooden blocks which were holding her in place. One person was killed and several others injured by flying timber and pieces of metal but the vessel itself was not damaged.

Bandits Made Big Haul From Bank In East

PHILADELPHIA, August 18:—Bandits, armed with machine guns, entered the Wyoming Bank and Trust Co. premises here yesterday, lined up the staff and customers, and made a clean getaway with \$37,000. The five bandits also used sawed off shotguns in the northern suburban hold-up.

Asselstine Flies Into Peace River

Minister Of Mines Leaves Calgary To Inspect Government's Oil Drilling Operations

CALGARY, August 18: (CP)—Hon. W. J. Asselstine, British Columbia minister of mines, left today by airplane for the district in the Peace River Block west of Peace Coulee to inspect progress of the provincial government's oil drilling operations. At least one well will be under way this year, Mr. Asselstine said.

Exports From Alaska Higher

Showed Substantial Increase In July This Year Over Year Ago

JUNEAU, August 18:—Commodity shipments from Alaska to the United States this July amounted to \$5,408,000 as compared with \$3,773,000 in the same month last year. Gold and canned salmon led the way in the increase.

JUNEAU, August 18:—The seal population of the Pribiloff Islands is reported to have reached a new high of 1,750,000.

HUNGARY TO EXPECTS PRINCE RUPERT WILL BE DEVELOPED AS STEADY SHIPPING PORT

H. R. McMillan, Here Today, Tells of Preparations Being Made to Utilize Port With Three Ships Coming This Year

H. R. McMillan, prominent Vancouver exporter whose shipping and business activities include practically all the natural resources and important manufactures of British Columbia, says he expects that, within the course of the next couple of years, the port of Prince Rupert may be developed as a regular shipper of mixed cargoes to the markets of the world. To change the course of trade was always difficult, Mr. McMillan remarked, but efforts were now being made to direct some shipments through this port and Mr. McMillan appeared to have every hope that they would meet with success.

KETCHIKAN, August 18:—A site immediately adjoining the federal building is said to be favored for the \$50,000 fisheries research laboratory to be established in southeastern Alaska. This is one of several sites that have been under consideration by R. H. Fiedler and R. W. Harrison, Bureau of Fisheries engineers, who have been here this week. Charles E. Jackson, acting commissioner of fisheries since the resignation of Frank T. Bell, arrived today in connection with the selection of the site.

ALBERTA FINANCES IN BETTER SHAPE

Net Surplus and Reduction In Provincial Debt Reported By Government

EDMONTON, August 18: (CP)—An overall cash surplus and a reduction in the public debt for the second quarter of 1939 are shown in a statement issued yesterday by the provincial government. The surplus for the three months ending June 30 was \$316,000 as compared with \$751,000 last year. The net debt at June 30 was \$149,000,000 or \$5,000,000 less than a year ago.

IS REMANDED FOR WEEK ON CHARGE OF KILLING MAN

VANCOUVER, August 18: (CP)—Nelson Maracle, aged 28, second engineer of the tug Clayburn, was remanded for a week in city police court yesterday on a charge that he murdered Kenneth Cassidy, first engineer of the same boat. Cassidy was taken from the water of Burrard Inlet early Wednesday morning by a wharf watchman and was found to have bruises on the head.

STANDINGS ARE SAME

Pittsburg Loses Ninth Straight Game With Defeat By St. Louis

CINCINNATI, August 18: (CP)—Pace setting and running up clubs in both National and American Leagues won their games yesterday. Cincinnati took a close 7 to 6 victory from Chicago Cubs here. St. Louis Cardinals won 4 to 2 over Pittsburg Pirates whose ninth straight defeat it was.

MINISTER RESIGNING

Daniel C. Roper Quits As Envoy To Canada, President Roosevelt Announces

BAY OF ISLANDS, Newfoundland, August 18: (CP)—Daniel C. Roper, first foreign envoy to Canada to present his credentials directly to the King in the Dominion capital, has resigned, it was announced by President Franklin D. Roosevelt here in the course of a cruise aboard U. S. S. Tuscaloosa. Roper was formerly secretary of commerce.

Angus MacPhee Tennis Champ

Is Better In United States Today Than Since Recession Started Two Years Ago

WASHINGTON, August 18:—Business in the United States, according to an index issued by the government yesterday, has reached the highest point since the recession of the fall of 1927 and the next few months are expected to be marked with further improvement. Steel mills department stores and mail order houses all report increased volume of business. Carloadings are also up.

SOAP BOX DERBY WAS EXCITING

Cliff Silversides Won With Whiz Bang; Ted Arney Came Second

Even the weather man smiled happily on the Gyro playground's Soap Box Derby yesterday afternoon. An enthusiastic crowd of about 600 jammed the finish line to see Cliff Silversides of McClymont Park flash across 200 yards in front of Ted Arney of Wes, view.

Before the race a motley collection of home-made cars milled about the starting line. There were large cars and small models. The eventual winner, the Whiz Bang, was the longest model in the race, measuring seven and a half feet wheel base but Ted Arney piloting No. 7, proved that a long wheel-base is not all that is necessary by bringing in his snub-nosed job with a four and a half-foot wheel base right on the tail of the Whiz Bang.

Carl Johnson's Bluebird, which followed the No. 7 across the line for the third prize, was a very good looking job with its battle-ship grey body and bright red and blue trimmings. This entry also won the special prize for the best built entry.

Every one of the five cars in the final race finished but Harry Astori lost a wheel in the first elimination heat and was forced to withdraw while Buddy Morris, in the third heat, also cast a tire and was unable to finish.

Despite the fact that this derby was something entirely new to Prince Rupert it was well received and, if the interest shown by the spectators at yesterday's race is any criterion, next year's will be a truly major event. After seeing one the boys know what to expect and an entry list of sufficient numbers to necessitate a series of eliminations is to be expected for the next race.

RUSSELL SMITH DIES VANCOUVER — Russell M. Smith, 58, Vancouver freight agent for Union Steamships Ltd., died in hospital here after having been ill for some time. He was in the service of the company for more than thirty years, having come to Vancouver from Prince Rupert where he was agent for some time. Prior to that he had been for a long time purser of company ships on the coast. He was widely known and highly esteemed for his fine personality and courtesy and efficiency as an official. He is survived by a widow.

NEW HEAD OF BANK MONTREAL — Huntley R. Drummond, vice-president for the last twelve years, was elected president of the Bank of Montreal today, succeeding the late Sir Charles Blair Gordon who died recently.

JAPS IN CONTROL HONG KONG—The Japanese Army announced today it had gained complete control of Chinese territory along the boundary of this British crown colony. British naval forces and troops maintained a close watch from precautionary positions they took. Meantime the British government today at London rejected Japanese demands that economic questions be included in discussions now going on at Tokyo in the Tientsin dispute.

TOURIST PASSES AWAY Preston H. Leslie of Los Angeles, member of the California State Railway Commission, succumbed to pneumonia early this morning in Prince Rupert General Hospital. He was taken ill while coming north at the end of last week as a tourist aboard the steamer Prince Robert and was rushed here for hospital treatment. His condition gradually became worse. Deceased's widow and son, Harry Leslie, were here with him. The remains will be forwarded to Los Angeles on the Prince Robert Sunday.

DIES TRAGICALLY Mrs. Anna Group, who has been in ill health for some three years, died under tragic circumstances shortly before noon at her home at 345 Ninth Avenue West. Dependent over her condition of illness, she evidently strangled herself. She was some 45 or 50 years of age. Her husband, Erik Group, a fisherman, who has ministered to her faithfully during the illness, left the home at 11 a.m. On his return at noon, he discovered the tragedy.

General Manager Of Elevator Is On Visit to City

R. Hetherington of Fort William, general manager of Canadian government elevators, arrived in the city on the Prince George this morning from Vancouver, being here in connection with the reopening of the local elevator by the government for storage of wheat from this year's prairie crop. Mr. Hetherington stated on arrival that the government would be operating the elevator here with William Finlayson, the present superintendent, continuing in charge. There will be certain key men such as accountant etc. brought in. At least one million bushels enough to fill the house, will be brought in but no arrangements for export have yet been made.

Mr. Hetherington will be here until Monday evening when he will proceed East by train. S. M. Capon, government weight man from Fort William, arrived on last night's train to test the elevator scales before the plant goes into operation again.

TELFORD IS CHALLENGED

Cornett Would Have Election Duel Over Police Issue—Wilson Suggests He Resign

VANCOUVER, August 18: (CP)—During heated discussion at the meeting yesterday of the Vancouver city council which, by resolution, turned back to the police commission responsibility for investigating Mayor Lyle Telford's charges of inefficient police administration. Ald. J. W. Cornett challenged the mayor to an election duel and Ald. Halford Wilson said that the mayor should go to the public if his charges against Chief Constable W. W. Foster were not substantiated.

DROP BARS TO ALASKA

Secretary of Interior Ickes Says Legislation Will Be Introduced To Permit Of Foreign Immigration

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 18: (CP)—Secretary of the Interior Ickes said Thursday that his department was working on legislation which would permit alien political refugees to enter Alaska. He said that the legislation was still tentative and was intended as a basis for discussion. It was proposed to ask the next session of Congress to remove the bars against foreign immigration into Alaska.

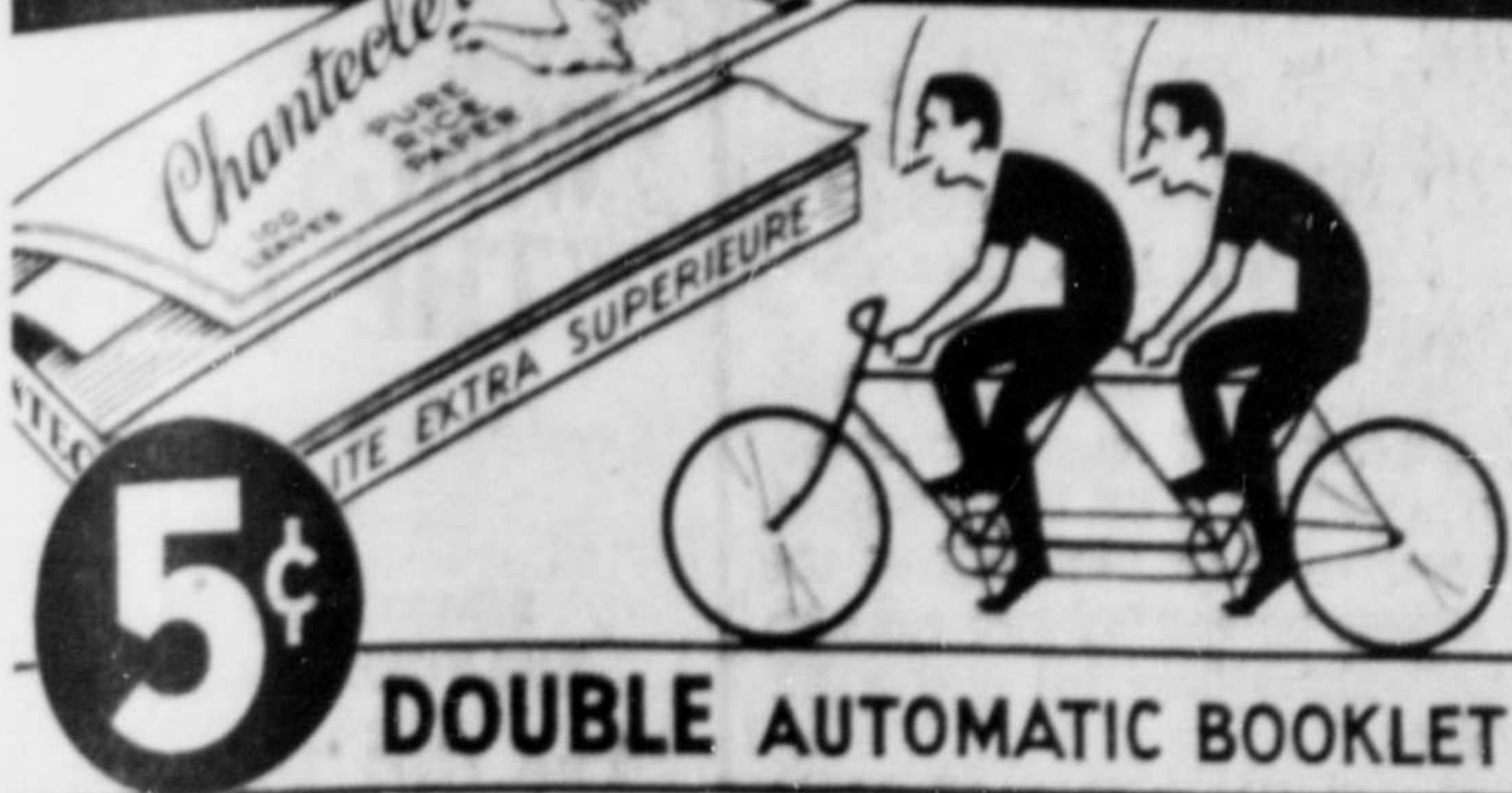

## DUTIES OF PARENTS TO OFFSPRING

Three-Fold Development Required in Order to Bring About Better Conditions

Parental obligation to youth is to provide youth with opportunities for all round development, according to Rev. H. G. Funston who addressed the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at its weekly luncheon yesterday afternoon. Not only is physical and intellectual development desirable but also spiritual development, he said.

Speaking of the need of physical development, Mr. Funston said this was recognized by the department of education and some provision made for it in the curriculum. Prince Rupert in particular was in need of a community centre because of the climatic conditions. He hoped that something would be

done soon to provide such an institution.

The intellectual development of the children was pretty well provided for. Most children could attend the public and high schools of the city and many had the opportunity to go to the universities.

Providing for physical and intellectual development of the young does not provide an all-round development, according to Mr. Funston. This was shown by the fact that so many young boys have been convicted of crime. To bring about complete development there must be spiritual education. Also it was very desirable that parents should set a good example to the children. He liked to see the old-fashioned family circle in church on the Sabbath.

Concluding, Mr. Funston said that physical development without intellectual was brute force. When physical development was accompanied by intellectual it was little better, as was seen in Europe today. The real need of the age was for spiritual development.
