DEDICATION AND OPENING OF NEW METHODIST CHURCH

REV. DR. CHOWN WILL BE PRESENT—SERIES OF ATTRACTIVE SERVICES AND SOCIAL GATHERINGS WILL FEATURE OPENING OF RUPERT'S FIRST PIPE ORGAN CHURCH.

Sunday, March 3rd, will witness the dedication services in Prince Rupert's first pipe organ place of worship, the new Methodist Church, Sixth Avenue and Musgrave place. This is the largest and most modern constructed of all the churches at present in Prince Rupert, and its pastor, Rev. Charles Sing, and congregation have reason to be proud of their new building. The dedication service will be conducted Sunday morning, March 3rd, at 11 o'clock by Rev. S. D. Chown, D. D., general superintendent of the Methodist Church of Canada, assisted by the Rev. C. H. Raley, chairman of the Port Simpson district. Dr. Chown will also preach both morning and evening, at 11 and 7:30 o'clock. Anthems will be rendered by the excellent choir now organized and the pipe organ now being installed will be in readiness for the opening services under the capable control of Professor Charles Serle, who will give an organ recital on Wednesday evening, March 6th.

In the afternoon of March 3rd in the new Sunday school room of the church Rev. F. W. Kerr, B. A., pastor of the Presbyterian Church, and Rev. C. S. Reddick, B. A., of Kitimat, B. C., will deliver short addresses at a school children's and young people's rally. Special music will be rendered by the children. Offerings at all services will be in aid of the building fund.

On Monday, March 4th, from 6 to 8 p. m., an opening banquet will be given in the basement by the Ladies' Aid, the banquet being followed by an entertainment in the church auditorium. Dr. Chown will give a special address and the clergymen of the city will also give short addresses. There will be special music by the choir and others.

The opening services will be continued on Sunday, March 10th, when Rev. C. H. Raley will preach at 11 a. m., and Rev. J. H. White, D. D., at 7:30 p. m. At 3 o'clock

By the Camosun last night there returned to Prince Rupert Mayor Newton. City Clerk Woods was there to greet him. City Solicitor Peters arrived with him. Mayor Newton is looking well—positively sprightly—since his sojourn below, but he has little to say regarding his visit to Victoria.

"Mr. Peters and I went south," he said, "in connection with a matter which we considered of urgent importance to the city, but which I deemed it inadvisable to make public as it would be liable to be misconstrued. The matter I may say is proceeding satisfactorily. We accomplished what we set out to do, but the end is not yet in sight sufficiently clear for the business to be made public."

Regarding other matters the Mayor mentioned that from all sources of information he gathers

that the government is not likely to contemplate the sale of their Prince Rupert lots this year.

He added that lobby talk during his visit to Victoria was all toward an early provincial election, and further made special mention of the fact that legislation is contemplated for an early date by which towns and cities of British Columbia can take a vote of their citizens on the question of the abolition of the ward system, probably without need for a petition as at present.

TORY POLICY ON RAILWAYS

Brief Outline of the Railway Policy Upon Which Premier McBride Will Shortly Appeal to the People.

Victoria, Feb. 21.—The guarantee of bonds to the extent of \$35,000 a mile to Messrs. Foley, Welch & Stewart for a line from North Vancouver, via Howe Sound and Pemberton Meadows, to Fort George, with its ultimate extension to Peace River. Connection to be made with Vancouver over the Second Narrows bridge.

C. N. R. bonds are guaranteed for a line from Kamloops to Vernon, with a branch to Lumby.

PROVINCE IS OVER NINE MILLIONS IN DEBT

Budget Speech Shows Large Increases in Products From Natural Resources Such as Agriculture, Timber and Fisheries

C. N. R. bonds are also guaranteed for an extension of the Victoria-Barclay Sound line to Strathcona Park.

Provision is made for the extension of the E. & N. to Comox. The government agrees to repurchase 2,500,000 acres of the Columbia & Western lands at 40 cents an acre, amounting to \$1,000,000.

A bill provides for the repair and operation of the Kaslo and Soan line.

Victoria, Feb. 24.—The budget speech of the Finance Minister was delivered yesterday afternoon. It places the debt of the province at a little over \$9,000,000, with assets over liabilities during the year at \$1,497,594. During the past two years there has been a saving in revenue as against expenditure of \$4,792,291. The present bonds of British Columbia stand higher in the British market than those of any other province in Canada. Agriculture products of the province have risen from \$14,962,904 last year to \$20,837,839 this year. Imports remained at \$14,000,000. Timber products are one billion thirteen hundred thousand feet manufactured into lumber and forty-seven million feet exported. The fisheries value is placed at \$11,000,000. Registry office returns netted \$613,000.

Evidences of the storm were seen on the vessel, her work boat having been torn from its lashings and swept overboard from the forward hatch by green seas which washed aboard as the John wallowed broadside to the gale.

OUR KNIGHT IN THE LEGISLATURE.

When Duncan Ross mentioned the name of Brewster at the Liberal meeting Thursday night there was a spontaneous burst of applause. It must be pleasant reading for Mr. Brewster, the lonely champion of public rights in the Victoria halls of legislation, to find that his name is so well and so favorably known here, in this far-away corner of the province. Bold words and brave deeds carry far.

"How far that little candle throws his beams!
So shines a good deed in a naughty world."

That is the kind of a world by which Mr. Brewster is surrounded, and in that world he is not only the representative of a solitary constituency but is also one of the three representatives the Liberals of this constituency have upon the floor of the House. We know Mr. Brewster as a brainy man and a clever speaker. As a sample of his style we give the following excerpt from a recent speech, not alone for its style but because the subject matter must have a deep interest for all our Liberal readers. He was speaking to a resolution patting Premier Borden on the back for the "better terms" proposition and he said:

"Is this House, Conservative as it is, with three members alone in opposition, going to follow the lead of the premier in this line of trickery—possibly the premier might object to the expression."

The Speaker—It is not a parliamentary word.

Mr. Brewster—I might say, then, political chicanery.

The Speaker—That is equally improper.

Mr. Brewster—Then I withdraw both, but I must say that this resolution is so patently and so apparently an attempt to catch the votes of those who will unthinkingly accept these long-winded phrases as something of weight that it is our duty to tell the premier that if he means business he must do something and let him cease merely talking. I was taken to task the other day by the Attorney General for referring slightly as he thought to the premier. We had the premier yesterday dealing with the name of a man who stands head and shoulders above any other public citizen in the Dominion of Canada in a manner which, had I used the same language from this side of the House, I would have been called to order for by the speaker, so I suppose it is all right. We were told by the premier that Sir Wilfrid Laurier had practiced duplicity and I did not hear him called to order.

The Speaker—He was not referring to a member of this House.

Mr. Brewster—When the premier refers to a man occupying such an exalted position not only in the Dominion but also the Empire at large, and I may say the world, and talks about that right honorable gentleman in such a manner that he can use the word duplicity, I think I would be right in calling him to order and it would be for him to apologize for his language, as I do not think even he can put his finger on any act in the whole political history of Sir Wilfrid where that word can be applied in any sense. I am sorry the first minister of the province should go so far as to make such statements.

The best information to hand in regard to the provincial election is that the prorogation will take next Tuesday and will be followed almost immediately by dissolution, the writs to be issued at once for a general election to be held on April 12th.

THE LIE THAT IS HALF TRUTH.

"An election campaign serves the purpose of exemplifying from how many different aspects a critical opposition can view actions of a government," was the sage introduction to the editorial of the morning paper this morning. It takes a good part of a column to demonstrate this but it succeeds. The subject upon which it is hung is the statement of Duncan Ross that there is but one licensed hotel between Hazelton and Aldermere, and of course there is a glorious puff for the McBride government for restraining its "grafting propensities" in this regard, as its policy is to restrict or prevent the sale of liquor during railway construction. The lie that is half a truth is ever the blackest. Government officials, according to Mr. Ross, ignored the lesser graft of licensing for the more profitable one of blind pigging. Here is what Mr. Ross is quoted as having said on this subject:

Yet between Hazelton and Aldermere there was but one licensed house and no traveler could get decent accommodation on that road. But there were seven blind pigs, with dirty beds and bunks, running openly, selling whisky freely, run solely for the selling of whisky.

TOMMY BURNS IN THE RING

Canadian Champion Thinks He Can Come Back and Cut Quite a Figure as the White Man's Hope.

Chicago, Feb. 20.—Replying to a challenge from the Canadian pugilist, Tommy Burns, formerly titular heavyweight champion of the world, Jack Johnson, the colored gentleman who at present holds the title, expresses his

willingness to meet Burns if the latter carries out his expressed intention of re-entering the ring and, further, if Burns can find a club which will guarantee Johnson \$30,000, win or lose. Tommy Burns is now doing light training and incidentally looking for a purse about as big as the Big Smoke's expectations.

B. B. KELLIHER STAYS WITH IT

Chief Engineer of G. T. P. Will Devote His Whole Energies to the Completion of the Mountain Section.

H. A. Woods, assistant chief engineer of the Grand Trunk Pacific, who is now on his way west to take up his headquarters in Winnipeg, was first appointed to the position which he now holds with the company in 1905. Up to the present Mr. Woods has been confining his attention to the construction of the eastern section of the line from Winnipeg to Moncton. It has now been decided, however, to allow Chief Engineer B. B. Kelliher to spend the majority of his time supervising the building of the remaining 410 miles of the main line through the mountains. To do this Mr. Kelliher will be at the front practically the whole time, and under these circumstances it has been deemed advisable to have Mr. Woods transferred to Winnipeg, where he will supervise the ordinary work in the west as well as that of the eastern section, until Mr. Kelliher has finished building the road.

Several years ago Mr. Woods was in charge of the construction of the Panama railway. While engaged on this work he contracted a severe attack of yellow fever, but was able to resume his operations. He afterward entered the service of the Grand Trunk, and supervised much double tracking and improvement of the grades. In accepting the position of assistant chief engineer of the G. T. P., Mr. Woods succeeded J. R. Stephens, who resigned.

IS COMING TO RUPERT SOON

Deputy Minister of Agriculture Has Been Appointed to Look Into Conditions in Each Province—Will Visit Skeena Valleys.

C. C. James, deputy minister of agriculture for Ontario, has been appointed by the Dominion Government to be special commissioner of agriculture for the Dominion to examine into the needs of each particular province, with regard to the distribution of the grant to be made by the Dominion for the encouragement of agriculture. Mr. James will first visit every province of the Dominion and become acquainted with the needs of each section of the community. He will visit the agricultural districts tributary to Prince Rupert.

HE HELD MANY GRAVE SECRETS

Contents of the Will of the Late Sir George Lewis Relieves Fears of Many Big People Whose History He Knew.

London, Feb. 16.—The will of Sir George Henry Lewis, the famous English solicitor, who died in December, was filed for probate today. The value of his estate is placed at \$1,188,075. Sir George, as is well known, carried the secrets of half of England's aristocracy and many of those of royalty, and there has been great curiosity as to whether the will would provide for the publication of any biography. The will, however, is just what might be expected from a man who was never known to reveal a secret. It says the testator never had any intention of publishing reminiscences based on "many matters which were confided to me of a delicate nature, which, apart from considerations of ordinary professional honor, compelled the necessity of absolute secrecy." The will states that for over forty years the testator never kept a diary and that there were no documents of any kind which would reveal the confidences which had been reposed in him.

"BLIND PIG MAYOR"

Convicted Seven Times of Illegal Liquor Sales.

St. Agathe, Que., Feb. 20.—Ex-Mayor and Justice of Peace H. A. Belisle has been found guilty on seven charges of selling liquor without a license by Magistrate St. Cyr. He was fined \$50 and the costs of the court, or three months in jail, on each count. Belisle did not appear in court, nor was he represented by a lawyer.

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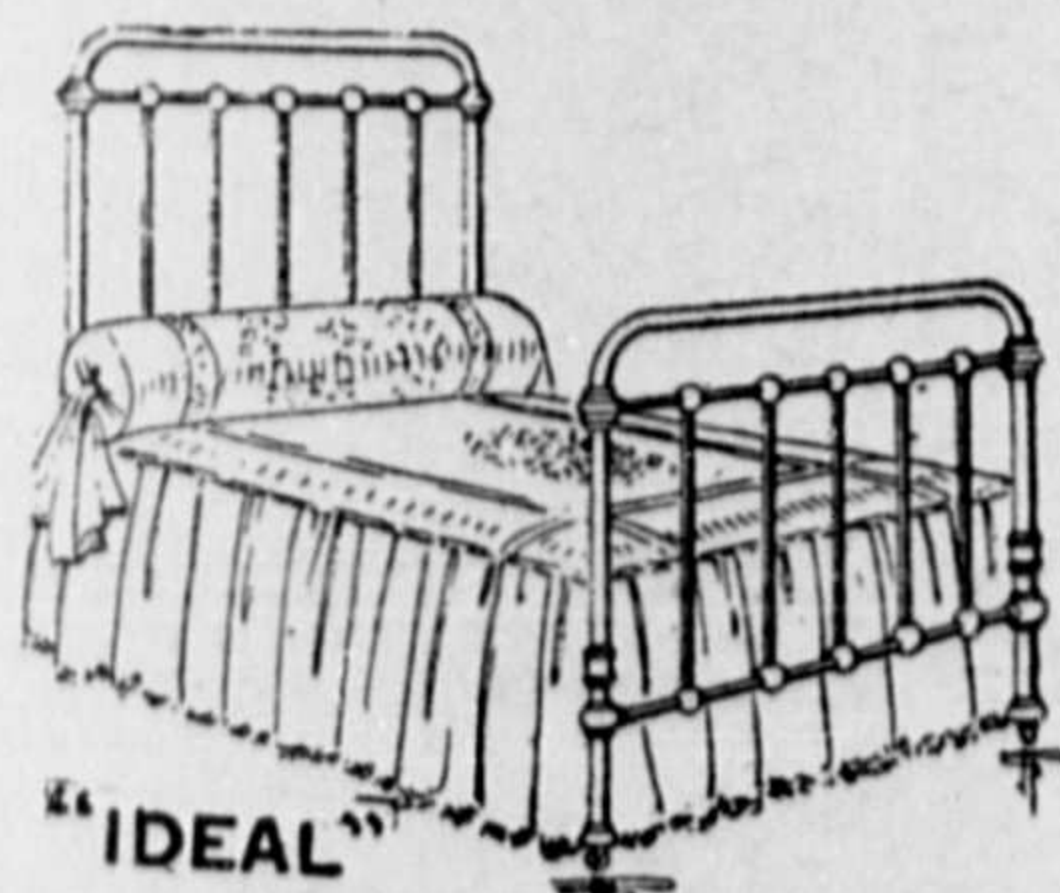

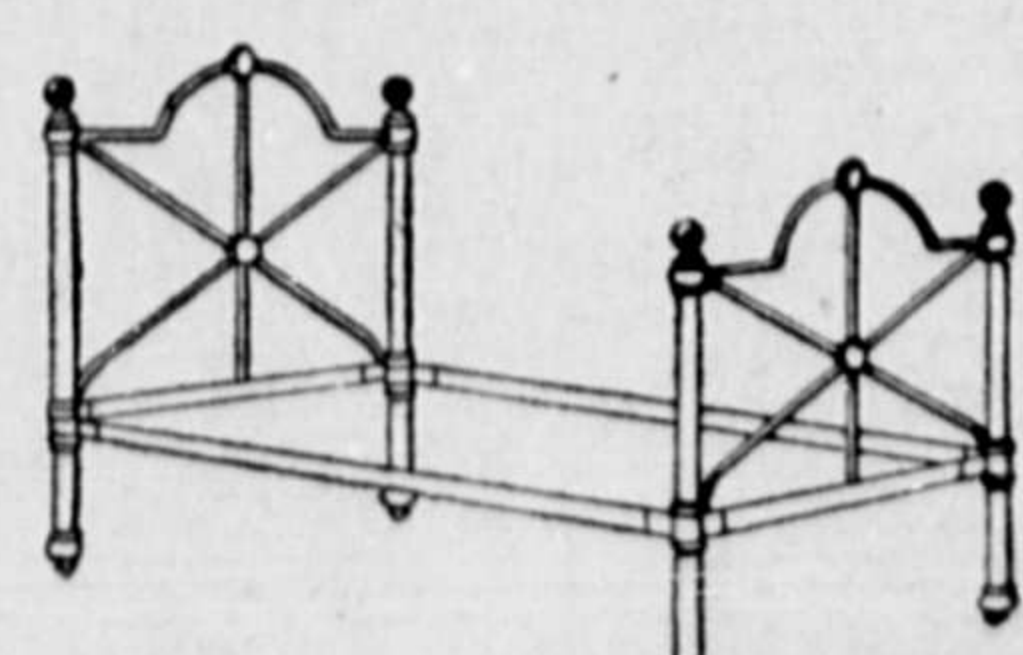

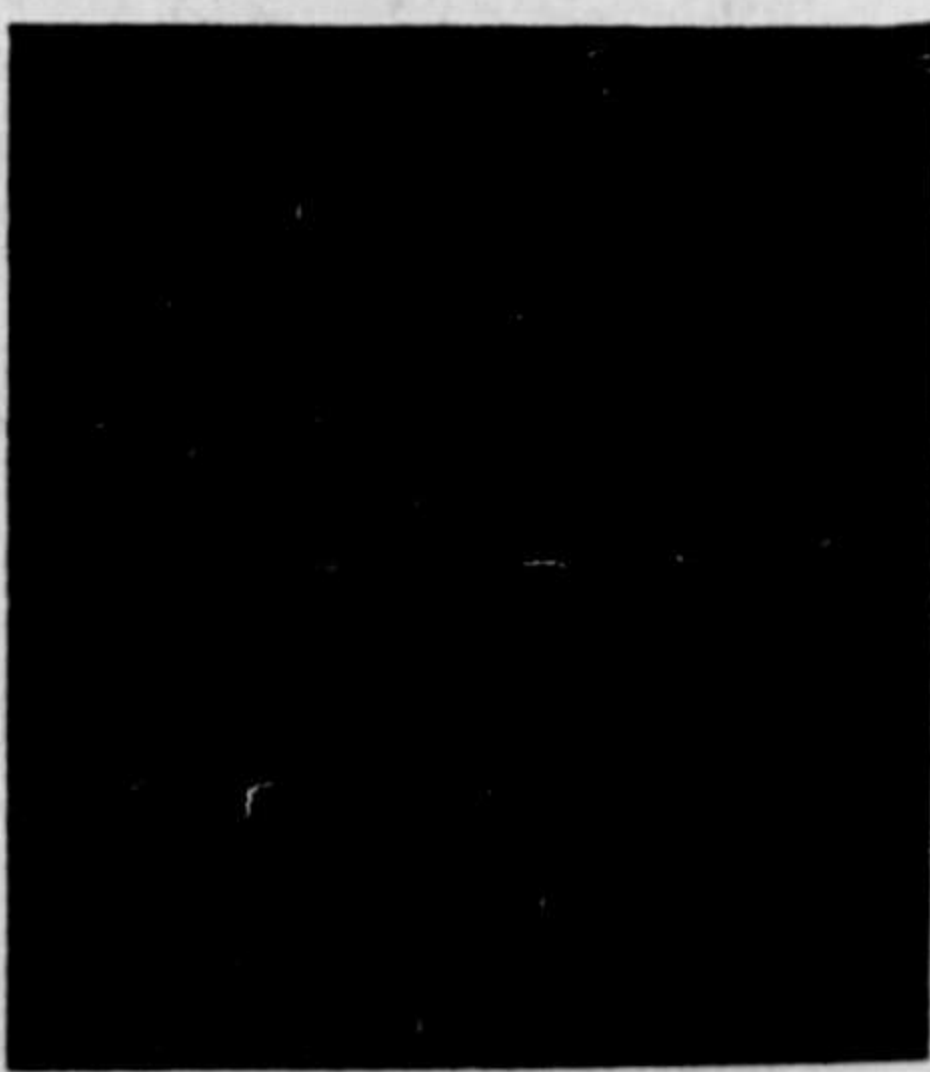
