International Situation Still Jittery

TO MARRY ENMASSE

Sunday July 23 is Wedding Day of 100 Montreal Couples

MONTREAL, July 20: (CP)—Wedding bells on Sunday, July 23, will cause flutters in not only two hearts, but more than 200, for it is the mass wedding day here for 100 "model couples."

One hundred youthful brides, dressed in white tulle and flowing veils will join their blue-suited grooms at St. James' Basilica to receive Holy Communion on their wedding morn, writes A. W. O'Brien in The Montreal Standard.

Arising from a survey among 35,000 boys and girls in 123 Quebec and Ontario cities and towns, this venture, as a glorification of marriage to re-establish the prestige which it is said to have lost in the minds of many moderns, is the idea of a youthful priest, Rev. Henri Roy, founder of the Canadian J.O.C. Movement, and is sponsored by the Jeunesse Ouvriere Catholique (Young Catholic Worker) known as the J.O.C.

Will Follow Up

But the romantic experiment does not halt at the altar rail. For two years past the wedding day, Father Roy will act as a counsellor and friend to the young couples, brooding out difficulties, discussing marital problems, and generally studying the result of pre-marriage studies, which the couples underwent before making their final vows.

Husbands-to-be in the ceremony earn an average wage of \$26, but in most cases they have a reserve fund of \$500 set aside in a bank. They are free from debt and are reasonably sure of their positions.

Two Ring Ceremony

With a view to bringing back an old custom, they will be wed in a two-ring ceremony, the bridegroom receiving his plain gold band from the J.O.C. The groom's gift will be a crucifix, and the bride's a rosary, both blessed by the Pope.

Prayer stools will fill the centre aisle of Notre Dame church for the bridal pairs, their witnesses and celebrant priests. Gay red and pink flowers will be given church spectators to lend color to the ceremony. Following the nuptial mass, with prayers spoken aloud, the great wedding party will go by car to St. Helen's Island where a monster luncheon will be held, the 200 newly-weds at one "head" table.

Many Veterans Get Benefits

Annual Cost of Assistance Act to Government is \$7,200,000—Recipients Total 20,806

OTTAWA, July 20.—Hon. G. C. Power, minister of pensions and national health, announced yesterday that 20,806 war veterans in Canada are now receiving benefits under the War Veterans' Assistance Act. The annual outlay is \$7,200,000.

EXPORT OF WHEAT UP

Expected to Total 160,000,000 Bushels For Present Crop Year

FORT WILLIAM, July 20: (CP)—Wheat exports from Canada for the present crop year are expected to reach 160,000,000 bushels, having amounted to 129,000,000 for an eleven-month period. Last year's exports totalled 73,000,000 bushels.

Deathless Days Campaign Is Not Very Successful

VANCOUVER, July 20: (CP)—The fatal injury of W. A. Hanna, Canadian National telegraph operator, at a suburban street intersection when the car he was driving was struck by a passenger filled bus, was the sixth traffic death since the city commenced its deathless days campaign on July 1.

TAKE FIGHT TO NATION

President Roosevelt May Make Issue of Revision of United States Neutrality Law

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 20: (CP)—President Franklin D. Roosevelt, reluctantly accepting the advice of Senate leaders to abandon his demand for revision of the neutrality law at this session of Congress, was represented yesterday as being prepared to take the fight for repeal of the arms embargo to the country.

The President argued that the Senate's failure to act would weaken the influence of the United States in preserving peace.

CHINESE WINNING

Japanese Said To Have Lost Seven Thousand Men In Fighting During Past Two Weeks

SHANGHAI, July 20: (CP)—Chinese military reports from the deep interior continue to tell of major successes by the Chinese against the Japanese in long stalemated Hupei and Shansi provinces. Advice said that a large scale battle was in progress at Shansi and that the Japanese had lost 7,000 men during the past two weeks. The Chinese are reported to be pushing the Japanese back on other fronts as well.

REVIVES FIGURE-HEADS

LONDON, July 20: (CP)—The Fred Olson Steamship line vessels have figure-heads at their prow, a revival of the ancient custom thought dead with the passing of the clippers. The line operates out of Oslo and Bergen.

STILL IN DEADLOCK

Anglo-Japanese Conference Continues But With Little Success

TOKYO, July 20.—Police put a protective guard over the British ambassador today as an anti-British campaign produced new manifestations of bitterness. It was disclosed that a Japanese had been arrested after surmounting the British embassy grounds wall and hiding. Tokyo movie theatres posted signs "No Britishers allowed."

TOKYO, July 20: (CP)—The British ambassador, Sir Robert Craigie, and the Japanese foreign minister, Hachiro Arita, resumed their conference on the Tientsin blockade situation today but with no definite progress towards a settlement.

Great Britain continues to refuse to agree in principle that a state of war exists in China. Such agreement would constitute the granting of belligerent rights. Yesterday the ambassador also refused to pledge British assistance to Japan in resisting anti-Japanese activities in China.

COAST ROUTE FAVORED

VANCOUVER—The Vancouver Board of Trade presented a brief to the Canadian section of the British Columbia-Yukon-Alaska Highway Commission noting advantages of construction of the proposed highway along the coast route rather than any route through Alberta and the Northwest Territories via the Yukon to Alaska.

BRITISH DEFENCE SHOW

LONDON—The British air force staged another demonstration of aerial strength with a great mass flight of bombing planes over France yesterday. Similar flights may be made over Poland, Greece, Roumania, Turkey and other allies.

ALBERTA WEATHER

EDMONTON — Hailstones as large as walnuts fell in the Strathmore district of Alberta yesterday, flattening down crops and doing ten to 75 per cent damage. There was thunder and lightning in the Wembley district and a sixteen-year-old boy was killed in the fields while working with his father and brother.

MATERIAL OF CRISIS

Trouble Is Developing Between Japan And Russia Over Sakhalin Island

TOKYO, July 20: (CP)—Another crisis is developing between the Japanese and Russian governments over oil properties on Sakhalin Island which is partly owned by the two nations.

FLEET AIR STATIONS

SOUTHAMPTON, England, July 20: (CP)—Air stations at Lympne, Kent, and Eastleigh, Hampshire, are being taken over by the Fleet Air Arm. Lympne will be known as H. M. S. Buzzard and Eastleigh as H. M. S. Raven.

KEEP PROPERTY TAB

CANBERRA, July 20: (CP)—A compulsory census of property, to be taken in conjunction with the national register of manpower, has been approved by the Australian House of Representatives.

Postal Dep't Shows Surplus

Revenue in United States for Past Fiscal Year Exceeded Expenditure by \$10,000,000

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 20.—Postmaster General James M. Farley informed Congress yesterday that the postal department had shown a net surplus of \$10,000,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30. It is the fifth surplus for the Postal Department in six years.

BIG STRIKE NOW ENDED

Peace Returns To Harlan County Coal Fields In Kentucky And Will Be Reflected In Larger Area

HARLAN, Kentucky, July 20:—Peace has returned to the coal fields of Harlan County, Kentucky, with five thousand miners deserting picket lines to return to work today following a compromise settlement of the colliery strike which for months has held the mines idle and has resulted in violence and bloodshed.

WILL GO ON LIFE TRIAL

Jack Russell Expected To Be Prosecuted For Kidnap-Slaying In Chicago

CHICAGO, July 20.—Jack Russell, notorious bandit and jail breaker, who was recaptured at Ozark, Arkansas, on Tuesday, will likely be brought to Chicago to face trial under the Lindbergh kidnapping law in connection with the kidnap-slaying of 23-year-old William Hamilton. Five states want Russell on charges ranging from automobile theft to murder.

Germans Leave Saskatchewan

Tired at Being Taunted for Belonging to Bund So Depart for Home

LOON LAKE, Saskatchewan, July 20: (CP)—Nineteen Germans, saying that they are tired of being taunted for belonging to a German Bund, have left the settlement for the Fatherland.

STAMP OUT TERRORISM

British Government Asks for Special Powers to Deal With Irish Republican Army

LONDON, July 20: (CP)—The British government yesterday asked Parliament to give it extraordinary powers to stamp out the Irish Republican Army terrorist campaign. Sir Samuel Hoare, Home Secretary, introduced a bill which would empower the government to deport or refuse entry to Great Britain men and women suspected in connection with the Irish Republican Army or similar terrorist organizations which are held responsible for numerous bombings in Britain recently.

Beef And Veal Consumption In Canada Increase

OTTAWA, July 20: (CP)—There was a large increase in beef and veal consumption in Canada last year, according to statistics of the Department of Agriculture. Consumption of butter and eggs showed a large decrease.

DEPORT JAPANESE

Ontario Leader Suggests Line of Policy for Canada in Case of Anti-British Policy

MIDLAND, Ont., July 20: (CP)—Lieut. Colonel George Drew, Ontario Conservative leader, believes Canada should say in courteous but firm language that adoption of any clearly definite anti-British policy by Japan would be followed by immediate deportation of all Japanese settlers in Canada.

New Zealand's Internal Loan

WELLINGTON, N.Z., July 20: (CP)—An internal loan of \$17,500,000 for public subscription issued by the government was fully subscribed by the closing date. The loan was handled by the Reserve Bank of New Zealand and could be taken up either in four per cent stock at 96, repayable at par May 31, 1958 or four per cent stock at 99, repayable at par November 30, 1948.

In the case of the 1958 issue the Minister of Finance retains the right to repay at par at any time on or after May 31, 1954, on giving three months' notice.

The moneys raised are to be used for public works and general developmental purposes, including capital expenditure on defence. The announcement of the terms was quite favorably received in investment circles. Satisfaction was expressed that the government had met the market and had not endeavored to force a rate of interest lower than the current yield as shown by the ruling prices of government loans.

EUROPE IS WAR SCARY

Another Dose of Jitters Developing As Everywhere Preparations Are Made For Conflict

DANZIG, July 20:—The killing of a Polish soldier near a Danzig frontier village this afternoon suddenly increased the tension between this city and Polish authorities. The Poles charged that the soldier was shot by a Danzig border official on Polish soil. The Danzig authorities said the customs officer shot the man in self defence.

ANOTHER INCIDENT

LONDON, July 20: (CP)—The situation as regards the Free Port of Danzig is becoming much more tense, it appears to be agreed by international observers and in all capitals preparations are being made for any eventuality. Many seem to be convinced that Chancellor Adolf Hitler will have essayed his expected coup by September 1, an act which both Great Britain and Poland have declared cannot be lead to war.

The Reich continues to move forces into Danzig and otherwise prepare for action of a definite character to bring the Free Port back into Germany. A development yesterday was the reported jailing by German police in Danzig of twenty alleged Marxists.

In Poland intensive preparations to resist any such move continue unabated. Yesterday it was reported that a gigantic loan had been negotiated with Great Britain, the entire proceeds to be used for war preparations.

United States Nervous

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 20:—Official United States is quite definitely fearful that war is in the offing as far as Europe is concerned. Stephen Early, secretary to President Roosevelt, in a statement yesterday on behalf of the chief executive, said that Congress would be called into emergency session should war actually break out.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 20:—Adjournment of Congress is expected by August 5. That object is being worked towards both in the Senate and the House.

Four days after adjournment, President Franklin D. Roosevelt expects to leave for the Pacific Coast. He will visit the Golden Gate International Exposition at San Francisco and visit in Seattle with his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. John Boettger.

NIEMOELLER IN PRISON

Rev. Martin Niemoeller is rapidly developing into a hero and possibly in a few years after his death will be accepted as a saint. He is fighting for the right of freedom to worship in Germany and for that he is being kept in a concentration camp with only his Bible to read. He has already served two years in the camp but his wife and family have continued to occupy the church home and to draw the regular stipend. Now the German government is threatening to punish the preacher by turning his family out of their home and stopping their allowance.

BRITAIN GAINING TIME

It seems evident to those who are watching the proceedings at Tokio that Britain has been trying to delay a definite decision in order to better prepare for what might follow a hostile decision. Nobody knows just what is the position of Britain from a naval and military point of view but it seems quite probable that, while all this talk is going forward at Tokio, British preparations for resistance are also being pushed forward.

GERMANY KNOWS NOW

Both Poland and Great Britain and France make it quite clear to Germany that if it attempts to interfere with Danzig, it will mean war and war is something Germany does not want. No country really wants war just now for all people know about what it would mean. It would be a terrible thing and any person deliberately starting it will have a lot to answer for.

QUEBEC INFORMATION

We have just received a copy of the year book of the province of Quebec which gives official information in regard to every department of government. From it we learn that Quebec comes second among Canadian provinces in the matter of national wealth with close to seven billion dollars, 26 per cent of the total wealth of the Dominion. It is second to Ontario which has nearly nine billion while British Columbia has about two and a half billion. This is not money but is land, buildings, stock, machinery, in fact everything which can be bought with money.

In the matter of education the provincial government spends \$625,000 a year as contributions to public schools, \$311,000 for Catholic Superior Schools. It grants to superior and technical schools \$765,000, to Protestant superior schools \$185,000, to Normal schools \$363,000, schools for deaf mutes \$105,000, pensions \$360,000, inspection of schools \$285,000, and various other educational grants, the total amounting to close to three and a half million dollars.

Footloose Pro Zulu Giants, Colored Boys Looks For More From Detroit, Cheer Crowd With Funny Baseball Show

Popular Forward, Released By Canadiens Sees Defence Now Best Bet

MONTREAL, July 20: (CP) — Jimmy Ward, given his outright release by Montreal Canadiens after 12 years of continuous service in the National Hockey League, still believes he has a few more years left in the big time—but as a defenceman, rather than as a forward.

"I've made up my mind that if I can hook on with some team it'll be as a defenceman," said Ward, one of the most popular players who ever played pro hockey in Montreal. For 11 seasons with the now defunct Montreal Maroons, and last year with Canadiens, he has been a hero to all hockey-minded kids in the city.

"I still think that I have at least two more good years left and I'd be willing to quit then. Heck, I don't like being counted out now. If my legs were going back on me I'd say sure: 'I'm all washed up.' But I'm in good shape. I can skate all day and I weigh 195 pounds now."

Ward, one of the few players who have scored 100 goals or more during an N. H. L. career, said he would probably write Red Dutton, manager of New York Americans and a former teammate on Maroons, about chances of lining up with the New York team.

"I'm big enough to hit a good body-check and fast enough to get off on plenty of good break-aways from the defence," said Ward, always rated one of the fastest skaters in the league. "Why, when Eddie Gerard was alive and coaching the Maroons he told me once that whenever I wanted to go back to defence I could. He said it was a natural position for me."

In order to fill an engagement at Wells, it will be necessary for the Detroit Zulu Giants to leave Prince Rupert no later than Friday evening's train, thereby necessitating the cancelling of a third game of the series which was to have been played here tomorrow evening. The second game tonight will, therefore, be the last.

The colored boys from the home town of brown bombers and automobile strikes put on their act at Acropolis Hill grounds in Prince Rupert last night. It may not have been much of a ball game but it was a great show. Folks were still talking about it as they came down to work this morning. That means that all the big crowd which turned

before the series is over they will, apart from the clowning, show how the old ball game is really played. There were only flashes of ball last night, the time being largely in giving laughs to the cash customers.

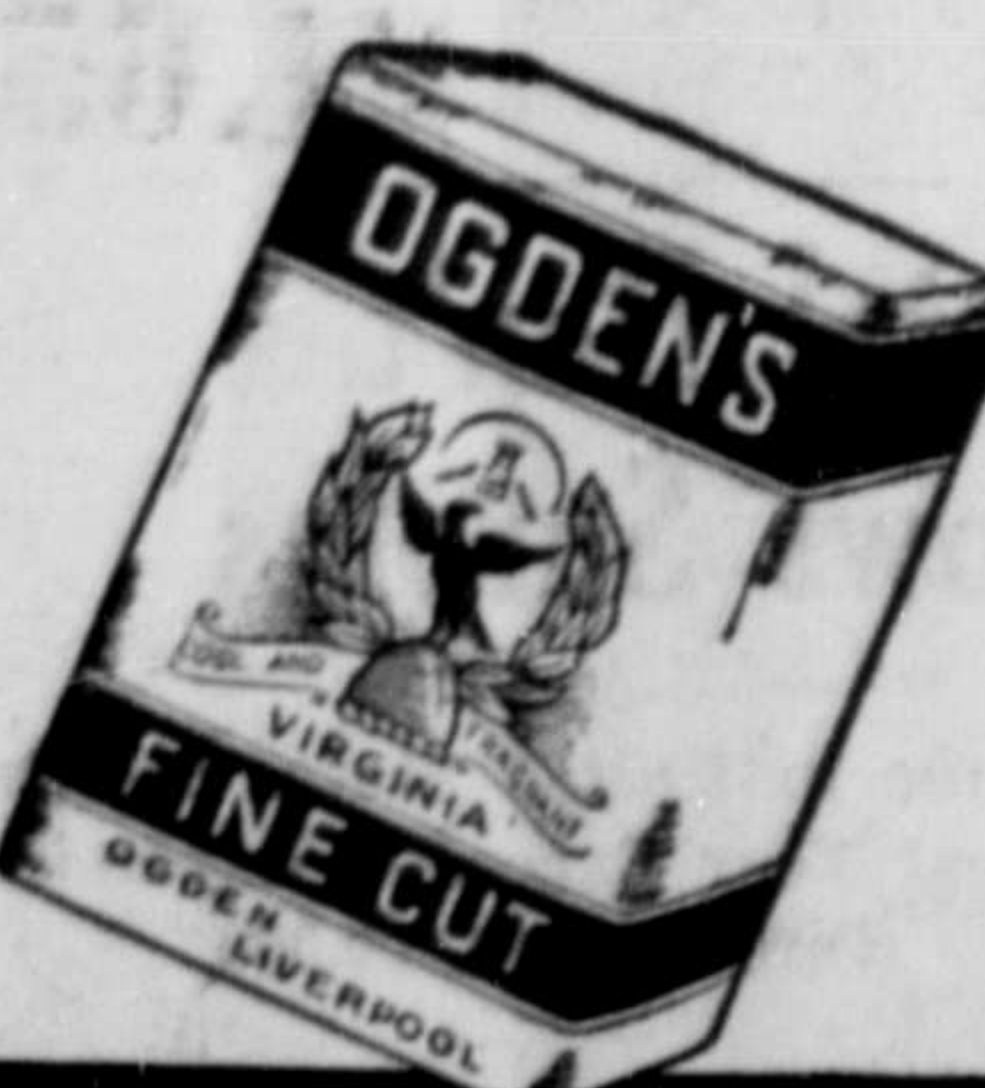
It would probably have been just as easy for the Zulus to gather a hundred instead of thirteen runs last night. Certainly, there was no necessity for having donated the pair to Prince Rupert, "Lulu" Willie Jones, the Zulu hurler, didn't seem to have much on the ball but he had the Rupert boys guessing. The visitors, so far as hitting was concerned, seemed to be able to place them when and where they wanted to. Sonny Stiles was starting pitcher for Prince Rupert and Frog Letourneau finished on the mound.

Incidentally, if it is of interest to anybody, the score of last night's game was thirteen to two in favor of the Zulus who were able to play around without any danger of being beaten. NEW YORK, July 20: (CP)—New York Giants suffered another casualty yesterday when Pitcher Walter Brown sustained an injured wrist which sent him to hospital with Johnny McCarthy, first baseman, going in to pitch in the emergency. That makes three Giant players now in hospital. The Giants lost the ball game to Pittsburgh Pirates 10 to 3 and slumped into fourth place. The St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Phillies in a night game at Philadelphia and assumed the runner-up position as Chicago Cubs were losing to Boston Bees. The Cincinnati Reds, league leaders, won a ten-inning night game from Brooklyn, scoring the winning two runs in the tenth inning. The runner-up battle, at least, continues very close. Brooklyn and Pittsburgh are now tied for fifth place with Boston Bees, in seventh position, only a game and a half below. The Phillies are as deep in the cellar as the Cincinnati Reds are high on top.
