To any such person the suggest it mould be very wise to keep his own counsel and most certainly not try to make converts just now. Any opinions expressed along those lines might be construed as bringing aid or comfort to the enemy and, therefore,

To object to the present war is to admit that Hitlerism is right, that enslavement is right, that world control by one man is right. He is the person who would see his neighbor robbed, beaten and otherwise abused without lifting a hand to help him. Usually he is the intensely selfish person who is afraid for his own hide.




