GT. BRITAIN RESENTS BOMBARDMENT OF BIERUT

ANOTHER ENGLISH SYNDICATE TO DEVELOP GRAHAM ISLAND

Have Transported Seventy-Five Tons of Drilling Machinery Thirty Miles Through the Brush—To Test One Hundred Sections

F. C. Greene, a visitor who is staying at the Inn, is the general manager of the Graham Island Coal & Timber Syndicate, Limited, of London, and has just returned from the island after taking in seventy-five tons of machinery. To get this landed on the coast was comparatively easy, but to get it through the brush, without any roads, was an arduous and tedious job. It was effected by means of a donkey engine.

Mr. Greene is not only the general manager but was the promoter of the syndicate. He made investigation of coal and oil lands on both Graham and Moresby islands last year, and as a result purchased one hundred sections of coal lands on Graham. He then went to London and succeeded in floating his company. H. E. M. Bourke is chairman of the board of directors and H.

Noel Hoare, coal merchant and banker, and Gerald Brown directors. W. H. Armstrong of Vancouver is the resident director. The head office is Capel House, New Broad street, London.

F. C. Wright is Mr. Greene's field superintendent, and they have now about forty men employed. Mr. Greene says that geologically the hundred sections is a coal area extending between Masset Inlet and Skidegate, and his idea is to thoroughly prospect it, using core drills for the purpose. There are good indications of oil on some of the land and they will drill for this also. He says there is no stock on the market and none will be issued until the company has definitely decided the values of the property. Then some development stock might be offered or might not.

NEW DRAGON PRESIDENT

Yuan Shi Kai, to Administer the Chinese Republic, a Mighty Personality—Called Crooked as They Make Them.

Yuan Shi Kai will probably become the first president of the Chinese republic, Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the provisional president, retiring. Yuan is about 55 years old. In younger life he was sensual and reckless. He has a wholehearted respect for the foreign powers, which put great confidence in him. His critics, however, say he has always been a trimmer and guilty of double dealing. Certainly, he has been hand in glove with the republicans while professing to be striving with might and main to save the monarchy, and has now given the Imperialists the "double cross." Stories of his cunning and ruthlessness would fill a book.

A PIONEER OLD-TIMER DIES AT LITTLE CANYON UP RIVER

Dan Stewart, Veteran Trail Blazer of Hudson Bay Company and Early Rancher of Skeena Valley Succumbs to Advancing Years

By yesterday afternoon's train there arrived in Prince Rupert news of the death of Dan Stewart, rancher of Little Canyon and one of the very oldest of the veteran pioneers of this coast. Dan, or Dave, as some called him, died on Saturday at his ranch, where he leaves a grown-up family, including a daughter. His death resulted practically from reduced strength due to advancing years. His age was about eighty, and though hale and hearty up till recent months, he had of late become more enfeebled.

Dan Stewart at the time of his death could look back on a period of some fifty or sixty years on this coast. He knew the history of its development better than most men, and had always held supreme confidence in its qualities for agricultural and industrial enterprise. He came out here originally as a Hudson Bay pioneer, and did considerable trail blazing for the great company in his youth. From his knowledge of the country, its paths and passes, he was able to forecast accurately the main direction of railway enterprise and was seldom out in his estimate regarding probable locations of centres of population.

STEEL IS STRIDING ALONG TOWARDS SKEENA CROSSING

Track Reaches Mile 140 Tonight and Will be at the Crossing by Middle of March---General Superintendent Mehan Reports Rapid Progress---Local Development Work Merely Waits Removal of Buildings in the Way

"Tonight steel will reach Mile 140," said General Superintendent Mehan this morning. "Progress with track laying has been rapid recently owing to improved weather conditions. We shall be at the crossing by March 16th at the rate we are now going."

This information, although given out in quiet matter of fact manner, means exceedingly good work done in railway construction during the past few weeks. At Mile 140 steel will be only

thirty miles from Skeena River crossing. Track has been laid at the rate of well over thirty miles in six weeks in spite of snow hindrances, and mild weather up river is increasing the speed now.

The general superintendent was able to mention this morning that the first divisional point out from Rupert is to be at Mile 149, a station, not yet named, but the third one out from Van Arsdol toward Hazelton.

Regarding the forthcoming work within the city Mr. Mehan remarked that he is only waiting

now for the removal of the buildings in the way before commencing to move the G. T. P. Inn and start grading the depot site. This morning Mr. Mehan was measuring up the ground available at Pat Burns old meat market site, to which he said the Inn will be removed if there proves to be a great deal of rock excavation necessary at the first site proposed near the Kelly-Douglas store. The city hall is moving fast, but so far the post office is delayed, awaiting instructions from the department.

SMALL STAMPEDE FOR THE NORTH LEAVES ON MAY THIS AFTERNOON

Some Are Making for the New Discoveries Reported on Sixtymile in Yukon and Others are Heading for Liard Country

The Princess May is due to arrive about 5 this afternoon and she will carry away with her to the northward some thirty persons, principally prospectors badly smitten with the placer fever. Of these the most important party is a quartet headed by A. R. Young, for many years engaged in mining in Yukon and at Nome, but for over a couple of years a contractor in this city for the moving of buildings. The other members of his party are H. McDougal, T. Wilson and H. Shaw, all soundrough mushers. They purchased nearly a year's supplies here and have a dozen to fifteen dogs.

The Young party and its outfit and dogs will be landed at Wrangell and will have a strenuous mush up the Stikine River to Telegraph Creek, then along the McKenzie & Mann trail to Dease Lake and over the divide into the Liard country, their objective point being Turnagain Creek, a tributary of the Blackwater, which flows into the Liard. Good reports have recently been received from trappers in this wholly unexplored country, and the party has hopes of striking another Klondike before next winter's snow flies.

RAPID REPAIR WORK ON LINER

Leviathan of the Atlantic Laid Up and Entirely Renovated in Nine Weeks—An Engineering Feat So Far Unparalleled.

The Mauretania left her dock at Liverpool the other day. Her repairs have occupied nine weeks, an achievement, says the Journal of Commerce, that is most interesting, for the engineers' operations occupied three shifts, the men working day and night seven days a week.

The extent of their task may be gathered from the fact that nearly 700 tons of new plating and other iron material had to be worked into the hull.

The time saving feat is probably unequaled in shipbuilding records.

PRESBYTERIANS CANNILY CONSIDER CHURCH UNION

Ballot Papers Distributed at Service in Empress Theatre Last Night Mostly All Taken Home by Members and Adherents

Ballot papers were distributed in the Presbyterian Church last night in order that the members and adherents might vote on the proposed union between Methodist, Congregational and Presbyterian churches. It had been half expected by the pastor, Rev. F. W. Kerr, that ballots would all be in and the vote counted last night at the close of the service, but though a number of the congregation handed in their ballot papers marked, the majority preferred to take them home and consider the question quietly before marking their ballot for or against union.

By March 15th the result of the ballot as far as Prince Rupert Presbyterian members and adherents are concerned will be made known. From indications ascertainable so far it has been stated that the vote will be practically unanimous in favor of union. Pastor F. W. Kerr believes there will be a great majority. The ballots already in indicate, in fact, an overwhelming majority.

Amongst the announcements made at the Presbyterian Church last night was one that there will be no evening service on Sunday next, March 3rd, in order that members of the Presbyterian Church may be present at the opening services of the new Methodist Church.

"PREMIER M'BRIDE'S DECEIT."

Under the above caption the new Liberal morning paper of Vancouver, the Sun, gives a long expose of the much vaunted railway policy upon which Premier McBride is appealing to the country with apparently every confidence in success. But the Sun does not share this confidence, and asks that the public pay the closest attention to the railway program, in order that the deception practiced by the cabinet in the matter of guarantee of the Canadian Northern Pacific Railway bonds should not again be repeated. It says thus:

A consideration of the conduct of the government in its previous arrangement with the Canadian Northern will show not only was Mr. McBride guilty of misrepresentation and of deceit in dealing with the province, but that he exposed the people of British Columbia to a much larger risk in guaranteeing the bonds of the railway than they are aware of. In his speech delivered in the Ancient Order of United Workmen hall in Victoria, on November 29, 1909, the premier said: "What is it we are going to guarantee? We are guaranteeing thirty-year bonds to the amount of \$21,000,000, bearing interest at 4 per cent. We are guaranteeing \$35,000 a mile for the construction work in the province. As an evidence of faith that the Canadian Northern Railway will carry out its contract with us, we will secure from the company a deposit in cash, or a proper bond amounting to \$500,000."

In the light of the premier's statement on that occasion, it is interesting, it is somewhat painful, to read his answers to questions asked in the legislature by Mr. Brewster on the thirteenth of the present month. In neither case is Mr. McBride's answer to these questions of a nature to satisfy the people that he is to be entirely trusted in making other agreements of this nature for them. In respect to the bonds, it will be observed that there is an unconditional guarantee of both principal and interest and that the bonds are made repayable in 1950, that is, Premier McBride, instead of guaranteeing thirty-year bonds of the railway company, guaranteed forty-year bonds. He thus exposes the public of British Columbia to the risk which they have assumed in this matter for a period of ten years longer than he told them he would, or than they expected. The liability is one, it is true, which they may never be called upon to assume, but it is a liability nevertheless, one which they cannot repudiate and one which, for aught the public knows, may be a source of great embarrassment to the province.

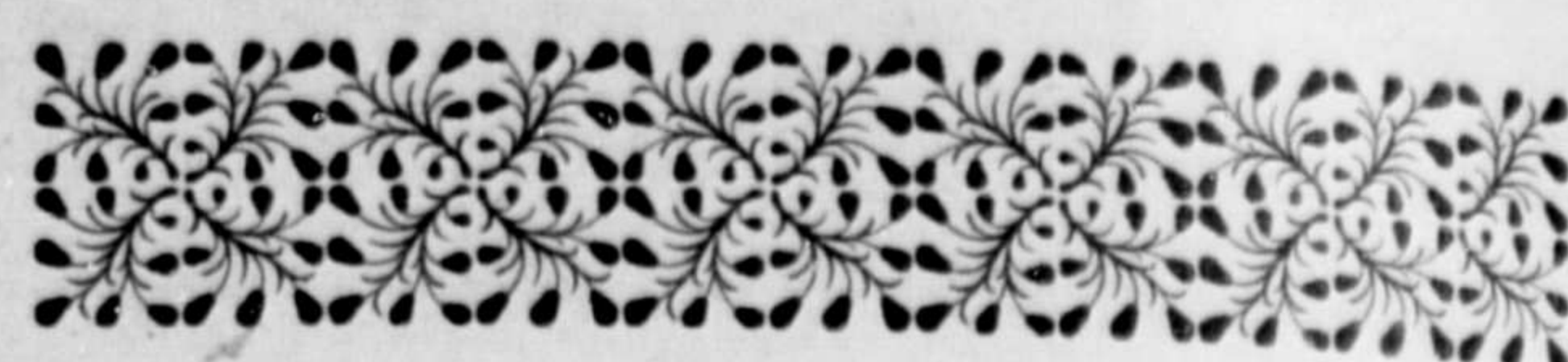

WORLD'S GREATEST WOMEN; AN INTERESTING LIST MADE

THE TWENTY WOMEN, NOT NECESSARILY GOOD WOMEN,
WHO HAVE EXERCISED THEIR INFLUENCE MOST MEM-
ORABLY ON THE WORLD'S HISTORY.

Recently there has been much making of lists of the world's greatest men and women. Because in this last generation women have been able to accomplish things in many fields closed to them before, interest in the lists of the world's twenty greatest women is a bit keener than it was the last time this periodic form of amusement took possession of the public mind.

It was Chaucer, by the way, who originated this gentle form of amusement. He also wished to make a list of the twenty great women of the world, but when he got to the ninth he had to stop for lack of material. He could find no more names worthy of a place. Between Chaucer's day and ours, however, stretch some five hundred years, during which woman has been slowly coming to her own, so that now one might hope to find names to round out the list.

But to return to the recent lists. They have been made out by American women—the two most notable makers being Mrs. Taft, wife of President Taft, and Mrs. LaFollette, wife of Senator LaFollette of Wisconsin, who may be the next occupant of the White House. As might be expected, these lists contain many American names—American education does not tend to catholicity of judgment—some of the names of whom each one of a company of Winnipeg people who fell to discussing the matter the other evening finally confessed himself ignorant.

These same eight people—three men and five women—thereupon set to work to make up a list of their own which they are confidently showing to their friends as the best list so far put forth. They define great women as not necessarily good women, but as women who have exercised a wide and far-reaching influence on history. As will be noticed their list contains five English women, six Americans and five French women. It is also interesting to note that the first five names received a vote from each

of the eight people. The three next received seven, the next three six and the next four five votes each. By contrast with the lists made by American women it may be observed that the first American name belongs in the second group, no attempt being made to distinguish between the names in each group. The list is as follows: Florence Nightingale, Mme. Curie, Catharine of Russia, Queen Elizabeth, Joan of Arc, Mary Baker Eddy, Cleopatra, the Dowager Empress of China, Clara Barton, Frances Willard, Elizabeth Barrett Browning, Queen Victoria, Maria Theresa, Catharine de Medici, Susan B. Anthony, Jane Adams, Rosa Bonheur, Harriet Beecher Stowe, Margaret of Valois, George Eliot.

STAY WITH CANADA

Miserable Fate of Canadian Who
Quit for Australia.

Melbourne, Feb. 20.—Samuel Walker, a Canadian, was shot and killed today by his son, Joseph Benalla Walker, who then turned the weapon on himself, inflicting a fatal wound. Mrs. Walker and the rest of the family are still in Canada. On the son was an unmailed letter to his sister, stating that he had been unable to obtain work and had not even seen the color of money since arriving in Victoria. In his letter he advised his sister not to come here as there was evidence of poverty on every hand.

Pictou, Feb. 9.—Stanley Dancy, son of Mr. Thomas Dancy, until recently a newspaperman at Vernon, B. C., has been appointed by the British Columbia government to lecture in the old country on the possibilities of the Pacific province. The position carries a \$6,000 salary.

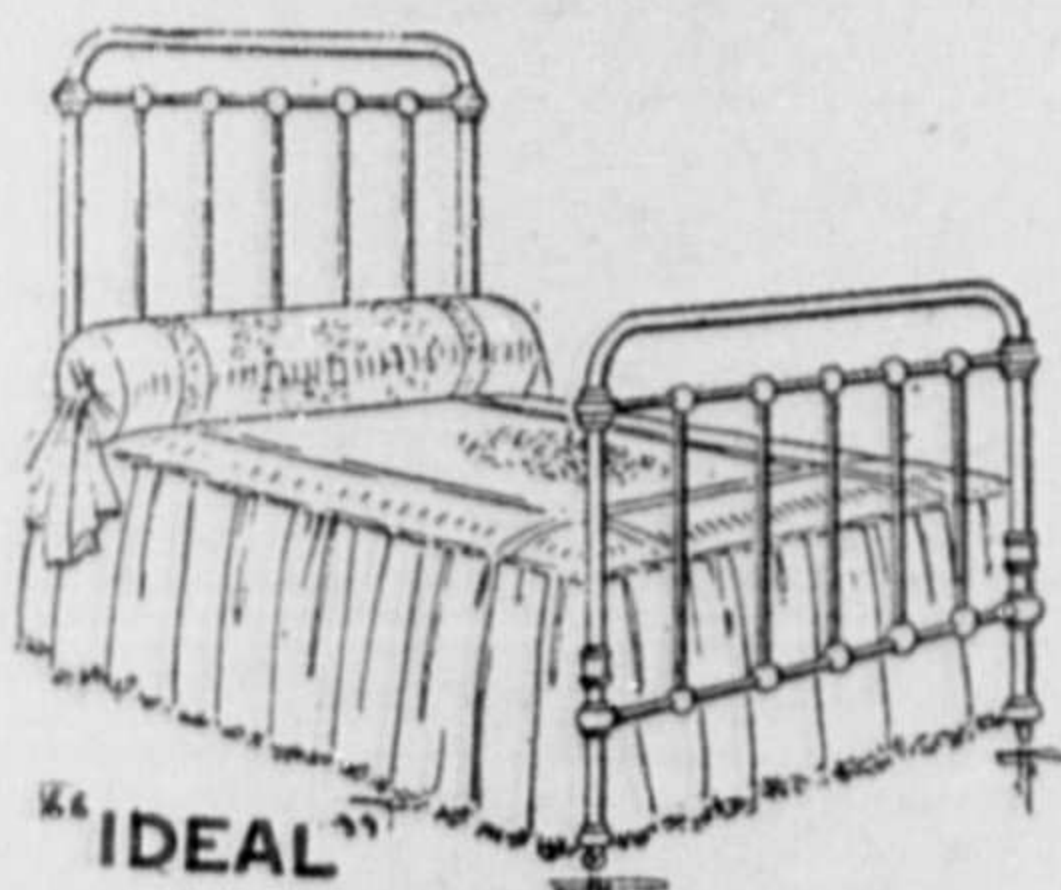

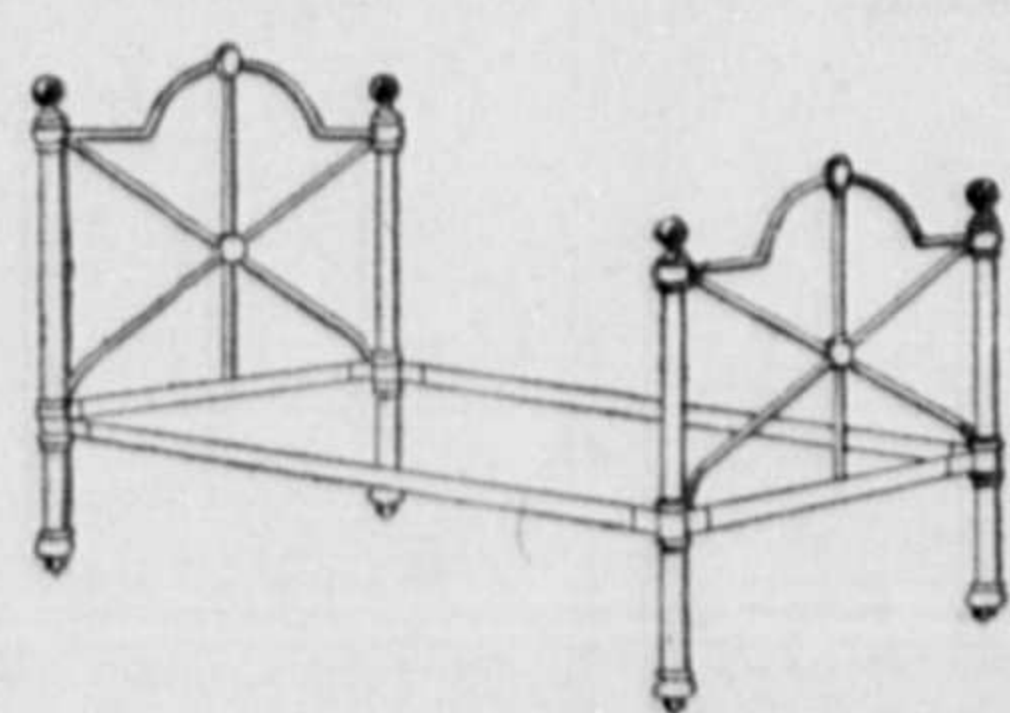

AERIAL FLEET FOR FRANCE

Senate Votes Five Millions Yearly
for Aviation Program, Believing
That Dreadnoughts Have
Become Back Numbers.

Paris, Feb. 21.—The Chamber of Deputies adopted the naval program tonight by a vote of 452 to 73.

M. Del Casse, minister of marine, in submitting the proposals, said that France must have enough warships to insure security in the Mediterranean, but that it was not necessary to keep pace with the construction activities of other nations.

The Senate adopted the aviation program, for which approximately \$5,000,000 yearly is asked. Fifteen dirigibles, said Senator Alexandre, would be constructed, but the special arm of France was the aeroplane. This year the army could mobilize 334 aeroplanes, divided into twenty-seven squadrons and manned by 344 officer pilots and 344 observers. An aeronautic regiment also was to be constituted.

RICH CLIME FOR FREAKS

Dog-Faced Men, with Voices Like
Towers and Bowers, and Men
with Beaks Like Birds Found
in Africa.

Los Angeles, Feb. 20.—Dr. Karl Kumm, African explorer, distinguished man of letters, of London, arrived the other day on the way to Washington, where he will lay evidence before the heads of the National Geographical Society that he has discovered men with the faces of dogs and birds in the heart of the Dark Continent. Dr. Kumm is an honorary member of the Royal Scotch Geographical Society.

"I have proof," declared Dr. Kumm, "that I have found men, negroes, with the faces of dogs. They spoke in a low, guttural bark, not unlike that of the canine. They live by clans and their mode of life is not unlike that of the stone age."

"In another part of Africa, far from the haunts of white men, I discovered a tribe of negroes who ran about like storks on one leg. They live in a section of the country where there are many pools and ponds of water."

"In still another part of Africa are negroes whose faces are virtually like the beak of a bird. They inhabit the trees."
