Mr. Herridge is setting up a straw man in order to have something politically to aim at. He says that pretty soon the Liberals and Conservatives will join together to form a national government which will really be a Fascist Administration. In the first place we have noticed no inclination on the part of Liberals and Conservatives to join forces. Water and oil do not mix very well. Even if they did join, there is no reason to think there would be anything unconstitutional about their administration. Mr. Herridge has some good ideas and we would like to see him taking part in public life but we doubt if he is a big enough man to form a new party. Hon. H. H. Stevens thought he could do it but he failed dismally. The present indication is that Mr. Herridge would cause scarcely a ripple on the surface of the political life of the Dominion. And vet it is difficult to prophecy in political life. Most unlikely things happen.
