VANCOUVER, Feb. 14: (CP)-Samuel Lyness Howe, aged 74, former provincial secretary, minister of mines and commissioner of fisheries in the Tolmie government, died last night. A native of Grey County, Ontario, he came to the coast in 1897 and invested \$20,000 in downtown real estate from which he real-4zed nearly \$1,000,000 in 1928. One of his well known properties was the northwest corner of Granville and Georgia Streets. He was also an active sportsman and horseowner and supplied the mount which the late Sir Arthur Currie rode in France throughout the Great War. He was elected to the first Legislature in 1928 as member for Richmond-Point Grey. He was a druggist.

INDUSTRY POSSIBILITIES

The letter published yesterday in this paper from Peter Kalvik proved very interesting to many people. His suggestion that a local industry might be started was one which seems to indicate possibilities, either as a co-operative or as a one-man concern. In any event, it seems worthy of further discussion and investigation. We hope that more will be heard of this in the near future.

AN UNWISE REMARK

Camellien Houde, Mayor of Montreal, made a very unwise remark when he suggested that the French Canadian people might, under certain circumstances, not be loyal to the British Empire. TRANSATLANTIC SERVICE

It will be a wonderful advance in transportation, the commencement of a new era in airline services.
