City Solicitor E. F. Jones Passes Away While On Way To Vancouver

City Solicitor Edward F. Jones of Prince Rupert, who sailed from there Saturday evening on the Prince Rupert for a business trin to Vancouver, was found dead in his berth aboard the ship near Alert Bay yesterday afternoon. He had expired from a heart attack as the vessel steamed down the coast. The remains were taken on to Vancouver aboard the Prince Rupert.

The late Mr. Jones had been city solicitor here for sixteen years, having come to Prince Rupert in 1923 from Vancouver where he had been city solicitor and corporation counsel for sixteen years.

Mr. Jones was born in Halifax and, as a boy, moved to Saint John, New Brunswick, where for years his father was manager of the main office of the Bank of Montreal. He attended Edinburgh University and read law in Saint John and practised for a while in Montreal before coming west. He was a well read man and an authority on municipal law. For some time he was a law partner in Vancouver of Former Justice W. A. Macdonald.

For the past few years Mr. Jones had suffered from diabetes and his health had been gradually fair-
