# FINAL BULLETINS

KING NOT COMING

City Commissioner W. J. Alder has been advised by Hon. Fernand Rinfret, Secretary of State at Ottawa, that it was impossible to include Prince Rupert in the itinerary of the forthcoming visit to Canada of King George and Queen Elizabeth. Appreciation of the official invitation sent from this city and regret that it was impossible to accept it were voiced.

BIG CHILEAN EARTHQUAKE

SANTIAGO, Chili- Three Chilean military planes sped south today to check unconfirmed reports that 2000 persons had been killed in the Concepcion area by midnight earthquakes which shattered normal communication. President Cerda, several cabinet ministers, forty doctors and seventy nurses are going to the 'quake area by special train. Forty per cent of Concepcion's houses are reported demolished. Early reports accounted for fourteen dead. A city of forty thousand persons is reported completely destroyed.

TENDERS DUE MARCH 21

OTTAWA-Tenders for the new steamship service to be established between Prince Rupert and the United Kingdom this year are returnable March 21, it is announced.

RESERVISTS CALLED OUT

ROME-A class of sixty thousand Italian army reservists bern in 1901 were called to the colors today for training and instruction. The order is effective February 1.

CRIPPS IS EXPELLED

LONDON-The national executive of the Labor Party voted teday to expel Sir Stafford Cripps, militant Socitlist leader, from the party for his Popular Front activities.

DEFENCE PURCHASING BOARD

OTTAWA-Hon. Ian Mackenzie, minister of national defence, gave notice last night that he would introduce in Parliament today a resolution which will provide for an independent defence purchasing board and the initiation of a policy of financing defence expenditures of a capital nature over a ten-year period. The resolution appeared on the order paper today.

NO MORE MUNICH

PARIS-Disturbed by latest international developments coincident with the apparent conquest of Spain by General Francisco Franco, official quarters stated that a new "Munich Conference" concerning the Mediterranean was impossible. "There is not a French government that could, even it it wanted to, agree to discussion with the object of ceding any territory whatever now under French sovereignity," it was said. The Chamber of Deputies resolved today that France should not accede to any more concessions under threat of war.

OFF TO WEST INDIES

ESQUIMALT-Four Canadian Destroyers sailed out of Esquimalt Harbor yesterday morning for a cruise to the West Indies which will extend until the end of April and possibly longer. Lieut. Orme Stuart and other members of his unit from Prince Rupret are on board.

NEW MOUNTAIN RANGE

PRINCE GEORGE-Pilot Russ Baker and Game Inspector Thomas Van Dyk, back from a flight to the Dease Lake country, report sighting a new mountain range one hundred miles south of the Yukon boundary, peaks of which may be the highest in British Columbia, more lofty than Mount Waddington on the lower coast of the province which is some 13,000 feet high.

### SUBSIDY FOR STEAMSHIPS

Providing the cost is not too great, it is evident that Prince Rupert is to have a line of steamships between Prince Rupert and United Kingdom ports with three sailings annually.

The government is asking for bids from steamship companies to make the three sailings a year with a view to testing out the possibilities of the port, presumably for a term of years. The ships, it is understood, will carry any kind of freight including grain or fish. Just what is meant by the vessels carrying mail we do not understand.

The proposed vessels will undoubtedly be British and of the size usually calling at this port for grain. More particulars will be available later.

The government already has some idea about what the cost of such a service will be as they have already had ofters from steamship companies. However, the policy of the Department of Trade and Commerce is to call for tenders in such cases.






