creamery had been a decided success. During the last two years of operation the output had increased Heach year 30 per cent. Last year it shipped 135,000 pounds of butter ! and this spring another creamery would be operating at Telkwa. The day would come when ships would carry cargoes of butter, eggs and pork from Prince Rupert and there would be a packing plant at the port for the handling of the products of the interior.

More Co-Operation Needed Mr. Dockrill frankly said there was not sufficient co-operation between the consumers in Prince Rupert and the producers of the interior. There was no doubt as to the standard of quality. If the city of Prince Rupert demanded butter produced in the district the butter pack would increase by leaps and bounds. It was estimated that Prince Rupert uses 160,000 pounds of butter in a year but only ten per cent of that was the product, of the interior valleys. The result was that some of the pack had to be marketed in bulk at Vancouver at lower prices, made up there under various labels and it was quite possible that some of it came from there to Prince Rupert under other


