## MAYOR NEWTON SMASHES HIS OWN PLATFORM

### MONTGOMERY DEMANDS LONG-KEPT SECRET UNRULY BOYS MAY SUFFER

Charged With Czar-Like Dictatorship, Mayor Demolishes Plank by Plank the Structure by Which He Mounted the Throne

#### NOW SUMMONS STAR CHAMBER METHOD

At Hastily Held Special Meeting Yesterday, Ald. Montgomery Demands Light on Dark Business Which Took the Mayor South—Deprecates Idea of Private Meetings, But is Denied Admission for Press to Kill Star Chamber Charge—Secret Meeting Will be Held Tomorrow

What amounts to a declaration of war between Mayor Newton and Alderman Montgomery on the question of star chamber or open and above board meetings of the City Council took place yesterday afternoon at a special meeting of the Council called suddenly in the midst of the removing business of the old city hall to the new fire hall. The purpose of the meeting was to pass a motion transferring the civic business to the new premises, but during the meeting Alderman Montgomery took occasion to ask the Mayor for information regarding his recent visit south. This information the Mayor has been guarding jealously from his colleagues, with the exception of the members of the Finance committee, who have a partial knowledge of it gathered from information vouchsafed them by the Mayor before he went below.

Alderman Montgomery sought information direct from the Mayor. He claimed that as a member of council he was entitled to it.

The Mayor announced that he would give out the information at a private meeting of the council to be held Wednesday at 7 p. m., before the regular meeting. This is a method which found high favor with Mayor Manson's council, as may be remembered. To Alderman Montgomery it savored of star chamber methods and he protested that the press should be represented if only to prevent the substantiation of any charge that the Council held star chambers or hole and corner meetings. He expressed confidence in the integrity of the press to refrain from publishing what might be considered dunripe for publication at this stage.

But the Mayor refused. He declared that he would make the announcement his own way. If Alderman Montgomery and the rest of the Council did not like it he would simply keep his mouth shut and reveal nothing at all.

Alderman Montgomery strongly questioned the Mayor's right to take any such position if the Council desired that the matter be made public. Mayor Newton reiterated his determination to have his own way with it.

"If we are to have a dictator in control of this Council," remarked Alderman Montgomery sarcastically, "why not do away with aldermen altogether and let the mayor run the city?"

"If Alderman Montgomery's wishes are the wish of the Council," retorted the Mayor, "then I close my mouth on the matter. It is not my intention to allow myself to be stamped into any position. I will reveal all to the council members as I have stated, but if pressed too far on the public announcement of the business I will maintain silence, and I be-

lieve it will be in the interests of the city for me to do so."

Here Alderman Morrissey made a motion to respect the Mayor's wishes. Alderman Bullock-Webster seconded, desiring that the information be made known as soon as possible. He did not like the position of having information which was denied other members of the Council.

Alderman Douglas backed up Alderman Montgomery, who contended that there is a principle

at stake in this. Alderman Morrissey referred to the alarming rumors running around in the streets on the Mayor's visit below, its purpose, its alleged failure and the attitude of the bank toward the city.

That he was willing to take the Council into his confidence and tell them the situation, but that the meeting must be a private one, was the Mayor's decisive statement. He claimed that he

### DIRECT BOATS FROM EUROPE

First Two Cargo Steamers Are Coming from British Ports to Prince Rupert This Spring with Direct Shipped Freight.

Direct shipments of goods in bulk from Europe to Prince Rupert are to commence this spring. Already Messrs. Balfour, Guthrie & Co. are collecting business in this city for direct shipment by two steamers which they have announced to leave British and European ports in the months of March and April to come with direct cargo for Prince Rupert, after having discharged any Vancouver stuff they may have.

This news marks an important era in the history of Prince Rupert's sea trade. Steamships have called here with freight, but it has been transhipped freight, or freight from Canadian ports, the biggest cargoes being rails. From the Orient direct came a big cargo of cement, but the two boats announced are the first direct from Europe.

#### Principal Hunter Hints at Coming Corporal Punishment for Bad Boys—School Library Prospers—Miss Manning Resigns.

At a meeting of the school board yesterday afternoon the resignation of Miss Manning was accepted, to take effect on April 1st. Principal Hunter stated that the other ladies of the staff had expressed their willingness to make an effort to maintain the work of the school for a time without the assistance of another young lady teacher to replace Miss Manning, but the board decided that this would be placing a considerable burden upon them and arranged to advertise for another teacher.

Good progress has been made by the efforts of the lady teachers and pupils toward founding a school library. The dramatic society contributed \$100 and the senior girls nearly \$20 toward the fund. A list of books has been prepared and has to be sent to Victoria for approval. The books will then be purchased, probably by tender through local firms, and the board will assist in the formation of a library by furnishing bookshelves.

Principal Hunter mentioned that the growing boys were showing a tendency toward unruly behavior which might before long necessitate a renewal of recourse to corporal punishment. The board approved his judgment in the matter. Various accounts were passed, and the matter of a flag pole for the school was broached but not settled.

Gang of Men Busy This Morning Clearing the Path of the G. T. P. Hotel to Its New Site—Forerunners of a Throng.

Some twelve or so of grubbers and axemen were engaged this morning in clearing the ground between the old city hall and the G. T. P. Inn in order to smooth the path of the large building to its new location.

The probability is that the site selected for the hotel will be the area occupied by Pat Burns' market. This site will be sufficiently far out of the way in the meantime for the purpose of the G. T. P. Co.

### 'CHELOHSIN' IS SOME CRAFT

New Steamer, to Run Mid-Week Alternately with Old Camosun, Arrives This Morning and Proves Luxurious and Speedy.

Instead of in the darkness last night, as had been expected, the new steamer Chelohsin, to alternate with the old reliable Camosun, got in this morning in bright sunshine so that everybody could have a look at her. The Chelohsin is a very compact and seaworthy passenger boat and speedy as well. She develops nearly 15 knots an hour and on her trip north in spite of delays at Vancouver and Nanaimo covered the whole of the Venture's calls, getting in in good time.

Luxuriously equipped throughout for the best class passenger traffic, the Chelohsin bids fair to be a favorite. Her stateroom accommodation includes modern rooms with baths and toilet fixtures of the best. Her saloons and corridors are richly furnished and there is plenty of deck space for promenading. The Chelohsin is a worthy addition to Rupert's fleet.

### SMALL BLAZE LAST NIGHT

Fulton Bakery Fire Visited—Considerable Internal Damage—Several Tons of Flour Ruined—Brigade Smartly on the Job.

Smart work was done by the fire brigade in extinguishing a small outbreak of fire which took place last night in the Fulton Bakery on Fulton street. Although the brigade got on the job in a few seconds after the call came in, the flames had a grip on the interior of the premises when they arrived and considerable damage was done to stock. A quantity of flour, about three tons in all, was destroyed by fire and water, but the blaze was effectually prevented from spreading and was speedily quelled. Damage amounting to \$150 was covered by insurance. An overheated oven started the fire.

## DECISION TO GO AHEAD WITH UP TO DATE WING FOR HOSPITAL

Board of Directors Yesterday Decides to Call for Competitive Plans—Mayor and City's Position Regarding \$10,000 Grant—Whole Sum May Not be Available

At a special meeting of the hospital board yesterday afternoon it was decided that a new wing shall be proceeded with and that the initial stages—the getting of blue prints of the present building's plans and the calling for competitive plans for the extension—shall be gone on with. As a committee to look after the business were appointed the president, J. A. Kirkpatrick; P. I. Palmer and O. H. Nelson.

Mayor Newton was present at the meeting and President D. G. Stewart took the opportunity of asking him directly whether in view of certain disquieting rumors around the streets he thought the city could fulfill its pledge to grant \$10,000 to the hospital fund.

that the City Solicitor had advised him that the city was empowered to levy a tax rate of one mill "for sanitary purposes" and that under this all the hospital could hope for would be the amount left over after the needs of the city for sanitation had been attended to. The cost of a new rock crusher ordered by the Council in his absence, said the Mayor, would have to be met. That was \$5,000.

## WHAT IS HANGING OVER US UNTIL WEDNESDAY NIGHT?

The city is all agog over the special meeting of the council yesterday and the Mayor, by putting his ear to the ground, might collect a number of interesting street rumors. "Bad news will keep" is an old maxim, but if bottled up it is liable to ferment and kick up a stink. Everybody is speculating on what the Mayor thinks if his public duty to keep secret from us, and the longer they speculate the gloomier must their thoughts be. That the bank has shut down on us; that the city's credit is busted, is already a foregone conclusion. But if that were all the Mayor would doubtless have frankly said it, and have taken counsel with the aldermen how this temporary financial embarrassment could be remedied. Gloomier and gloomier become the forebodings and the general belief that the worst is yet to come.

All because the Mayor, in his supreme wisdom, deems it politic to smash a few of the leading planks of the platform upon which he secured public confidence and to shut out the public from his confidence. Why he should have gone to Victoria at the public expense and then refuse to tell the public why he went and what he did there is a matter nobody can puzzle out. The hydro-electric scheme is the biggest subject, financially and otherwise, the city has on hand at present. Was that the object of his trip to the seat of provincial government? If so, how does he reconcile his silence with Plank No. 2 of his platform, which reads: "The carrying out of the hydro-electric undertaking by the whole council, in the presence of press representatives."

Why he should have refused to Alderman Montgomery the information that gentleman had a perfect right to ask splinters another plank which reads: "Every citizen to receive an absolutely square deal," and Mr. Montgomery did not invalidate his rights as a citizen by becoming an alderman. "Open methods and free discussion at the council board" is another plank the mayor is reducing to pulpwood by his silence.

But none of the foregoing is intended as a criticism of the action of the Mayor in maintaining this awful silence. It is simply stated as being the first duty of a newspaper to tell the news and the public impression this news creates. We have no desire to add another cloud of gloom, especially on so bright and glorious a day as this. We would wish to dissipate it as much as possible, and will make the endeavor.

It is probably a small trouble after all. In fact, the Mayor has not kept his secret well, not as well as he thinks he has. For he let it slip yesterday afternoon in his explanation to the hospital board why the city could not come through with the \$10,000 for the extension of the hospital. He said in a burst of confidence such as he has not been guilty of in the city council: "The bank is kicking like blazes against these individual debentures. They say: 'For goodness sake get a sum of money raised, and keep it in one fund.' That is the trouble."

So there is probably little or nothing to worry about. It may turn out that the Mayor has discovered another mare's nest, and that is about all.

## WITH REVOLUTIONS EVERY OTHER DAY.

**High Interest Rates.**  
Earl Grey has become chairman of the British Bank of North-western Commerce. The capital is \$10,000,000, of which \$5,500,000 is subscribed. The bank is established in co-operation with leading banking institutions in Denmark, Norway, Sweden and Russia. One expected result of Earl Grey's connection with the concern is the flow of investors' money into Canada from these countries attracted by the high rates of Canadian interest.

**Transcontinental Railway.**  
Speaking at the annual banquet of the Brantford Board of Trade, Major Leonard, of the National Transcontinental Railway Commission, said the road was being built in the most durable manner known. With reference to the construction work in progress on the Winnipeg-Moncton section, Major Leonard announced that a further expenditure of \$112,000,000 would be unavoidable. With few exceptions all of the 1,804 miles were under construction and there were between 400 and 500 miles of track still to be laid.

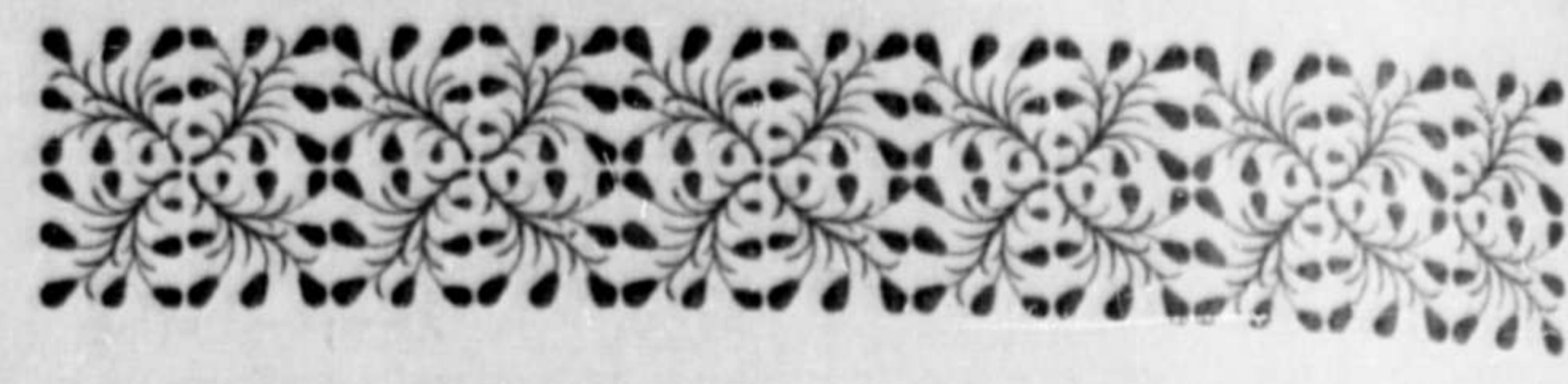

## TALK THROUGH MILES OF ROCK

Sensational Discovery Made by English Inventor—Instrument Value \$48 Will Work Miracle of Telephony.

An English inventor, Grindell Mathews, with the aid of a \$48 instrument known as the aeropphone, has just succeeded in projecting the sound of his voice through material which the biggest steel projectile on earth would fail to penetrate. United States Consul General John L. Griffiths of London in a consular report says that Mr. Mathews was placed in the strong room of a big London commercial house and locked in with nine inches of armor steel, nine inches of fire brick and six feet of concrete between him and the outer world. By means of his small portable apparatus he carried on a conversation with an operator in another room on the farther side of the building. So distinct and faithful was the transmission that the experts in attendance were actually able to hear the tick of his watch, notwithstanding the almost impenetrable mass between the two instruments. The inventor contemplates a further test through five miles of solid rock. In speaking about the aeropphone, he said that vibrations produced in the air by his apparatus do not take the form of Hertzian waves, as in the Marconi system of wireless telegraphy. In fact, they are not waves at all, in as much as the disturbances are of such high frequency that there is no appreciable break between them and their action is rather continuous than fitful and separate, as in the case of Hertzian waves. It is estimated that a complete set of instruments by means of which it will be possible to carry on a conversation through walls, mountains or any other objects within a radius of five miles will cost \$48.

of all men was opposed to hole and corner methods, but said that still they were sometimes necessary. He stood to his guns firmly. He would give out the matter at Wednesday's private meeting. This meeting Alderman Montgomery rather thought he would not attend as a protest against star chamber methods. However, he expressed readiness to be guided by the opinion of the Council as a whole, though he flatly refused to be dictated to by the Mayo ralone.

Mayor Newton went on to say that the powers with whom the city was dealing had requested private proceedings and added that if Alderman Montgomery thought he could chivy him into any other method than Alderman Montgomery was much mistaken. At once Alderman Montgomery took exception to this personal attack, and rose to the point of order that the Mayor should address himself to the Council as a whole and not to any one member. The Mayor thought that Alderman Montgomery had merited the departure in this case.

"I had a right to this information," broke in the Alderman, and with equal emphasis the Mayor asserted his own right to take his stand regarding the keeping of any matters private.

It was resolved to hold the star chamber meeting on Wednesday at 7 p. m. in the new fire hall.
