### MORE COMPLICATIONS

Member of Audit Bureau of Circulations

The European situation becomes more complicated larly. every day. Russia has a trade pact with Germany and another with Great Britain, just signed and yet Russia is bringing pressure to bear on Finland after forcing Esthonia, Latvia and Lithuania to come into her clutches and Sweden is also preparing, if necessary, to help Finland against Russia.

We continue our war against Germany because Germany was the power that started it all and gave Russia the opportunity of which she has taken full advantage. It looks now as if Russia will sit back in hope that Great Britain, France and Germany will wear themselves out and will then step in and control the whole continent. Once France and Great Britain are controlled, it will be easy enough to take Italy and Spain.

We do not think that Great Britain and France will be so weakened by the war as to become an easy prey for the Soviets but it is within the realms of possibility. With Europe given over to Bolshevism the United States would not be safe. So this war becomes an American problem just as much as a British and French problem.

What seems certain just now is that we are not likely to be fighting against Soviet Russia at least for a while and possibly not at all. Russia would scarcely make a trade pact with Great Britain if she planned to war against her in the near future. In the meantime our conflict seems to be confined to Germany. This will be a great relief to many people.

### MUST EXPECT TROUBLE

We must expect trouble from Germany very soon. It is quite possible that country will try to force a way through the defended Maginot line but, if she does, it will be very expensive fighting. It seems as if the French and British were reluctant to try to force the Siegfried line because of the tremendous losses it would entail. The attackers are pretty sure to be the chief losers unless the ground is prepared by artillery in such a way that all defences are destroyed.

### WOMEN REGISTERING

This week women who wish to help in war work of any kind if needed will be given an opportunity to register in order to show their willingness to do something. Some women can drive cars, help with Red Cross work, do nursing or any occupation that will help the men in the present struggle. This is not a government movement but a national women's gesture which should prove very helpful.


