PIRATES MET MORE THAN THEIR MATCH LAST NIGHT

MOST EXCITING INDOOR BASEBALL GAME EVER PLAYED IN PRINCE RUPERT ENDED AFTER ELEVEN INNINGS IN SCORE OF 46-40 FOR CRESCENTS.

Like British jack tars of the old days the boys of the Crescent ball team last night harried the stronghold of the bold bad Pirate crew and robbed them of their spoils. Never was there such a conflict. It was more like a battle than a ball game. So close was the scoring that at the ninth inning the figures stood 37-37, with the odds apparently against the Crescents. PROVINCIAL PARLIAMENT ENDS

Dissolution Immediately Follows Prorogation and Date of Election is Fixed and Officially Announced

POLLING THIS DATE NEXT MONTH

All the Members With Exception of Socialist Leader Hawthornwaite Express Confidence of Being Again Returned—The Two-Man Government Representatives to Stump Whole Province, Probably Including Prince Rupert

(Special to Daily News.) Victoria, Feb. 28.—The third session of the twelfth parliament came to an end yesterday afternoon and with it the dissolution of the legislature, with the announcement that nominations will be on March 12th and polling on March 28th. Sixty-two bills were passed during this last session. All the members made brief speeches expressing their intention of being back next session, if possible. All with the exception of Mr. Hawthornwaite. The Socialist leader doubts as to whether he can run again, though he said that he had many requests to do so. He stated that he had no personal desire to remain in politics, as his private business required all attention. Premier McBride made a statement in the House that during recess the government would consider the recommendations of the taxation commission. For a certainty, he declared, the tax on revenue would be abolished next session. Premier McBride and Attorney General Bowser will tour the province and the election campaign for the Conservatives is planned to be a vigorous one.

BRITAIN'S BIG STRIKE

Interference of Cabinet So Far Unsuccessful. (Special to Daily News.) London, Feb. 28.—No settlement of the labor dispute between the coal miners and the operators is in sight. Conferences between the parties concerned and the cabinet have so far been unsuccessful, but further meetings between them take place this afternoon, on which many hopes are strung.

'OLD FLOATING DESTRUCTION'

Trip Taking Temptation in the Title Bestowed on the G. T. P. Steamer Henriette with Her Powder Cargo Brought North.

The Henriette, the Grand Trunk Pacific steamer known along the waterfront as "old floating destruction," departed the other morning for Tunstall Bay to take on a cargo of 150 tons of dynamite for the use of the railroad company in its tunnel work along the Skeena River, says the Vancouver Sun.

Since the commencement of the railroad work in British Columbia by the G. T. P., the Henriette has carried approximately 600 tons of giant powder and dynamite to the Skeena River. Yesterday she was unloading her destructive cargo at the powder wharf across the harbor.

CAPTAIN BARNEY JOHNSON INFORMS NAVAL DEPARTMENT

AT REQUEST OF AUTHORITIES HE HAS CONTRIBUTED AN ARTICLE ON SEYMOUR NARROWS WHERE THE TRICKS OF THE TIDE MAKE NAVIGATION TICKLISH.

Captain Barney Johnson of the G. T. P. steamer Prince Rupert has written an article on Seymour Narrows at the request of the Canadian Department of the Naval Service. The work is in the hands of Dr. W. Bell Dawson, who is in charge at Ottawa, and will be published within a short time.

In reference to his work Captain Johnson said to The Daily News this morning that the information he has given the department in this work relates to the very peculiar tidal conditions prevailing at Seymour Narrows. These remarkable tide rips and swirls have been responsible, within Captain Johnson's own memory, for at least twelve or fifteen strandings and wrecks.

It is necessary to know Seymour Narrows as one seeks to know the moods of a wayward woman before it is possible to bring a ship safely through them. To attempt to steer straight ahead at any stage of the tide is simply to court almost immediate contact with reefs on one side or another of the channel. The tide swirls and currents, which alter every few minutes, depend on the variations of the tremendous rise and fall of tides all along this coast—variations of from plus 23 feet to as low as minus decimal 6 of a foot below the normal taken. Great or small, the variation affects the tide race in Seymour Narrows, and woe betide the skipper who omits to make his calculations correctly upon the conditions ahead.

HER HUNDRED THOUSAND IN

G. T. P. S. S. Prince Rupert by the Time She Returns to Vancouver Will Have Traversed 100,000 Miles of B. C. Coast.

This morning the Prince Rupert made her last northbound trip for some weeks. On her return to the south she goes into dock for her overhaul and will emerge equipped with oil burners like the Prince George, which comes on the run next week. This will greatly enhance her speed, it is believed, though the Rupert has lost scarcely any time on her trips while at sea. Any late arrivals she has made have been due to delay in coaling at Nanaimo. When she is an oil burner there will be no more of this delay.

The Rupert by the time she gets back to Vancouver will have all but completed her 100,000th mile of British Columbia coast run. This is her 72nd trip since she started in right away on regular runs after coming around the Horn.

PRINCE RUPERT'S GOVERNMENT WHARF.

On the fifteenth of February Mr. Brewster gave notice in the legislature that on the following Monday he would ask the Hon. Minister of Public Works the question: "Did the government build a public wharf at the City of Prince Rupert?" The minister's reply to this has not reached us. It would doubtless be in the negative, and to be consistent the hon. gentleman would reply that the government had under construction at the city named a vote-catcher, and refer Mr. Brewster to former reports of his department containing statements, issued just before election time, that "the government wharf at Prince Rupert will be completed immediately."

Mr. Brewster is a good friend of Prince Rupert; probably the only friend Prince Rupert has in the House. But what we asked him to ask was the direct question: "When will the government wharf be completed?" so that we could once again have the Conservative party on the hip in regard to ante-election pie-crust promises. Probably Mr. Brewster reserved this question for his speech on the subject, which we hope to get a report of later. But the answer of the hon. minister we have pretty fairly predicated.

SPECIMEN OF M'BRIDE'S RAILWAY POLICY.

Mr. Brewster asked the Hon. the Minister of Public Works the following questions and on the 15th February received the replies appended from the Hon. Price Ellison:

1. Are the lands granted by the province to the British Columbia Southern Railway Company in South-east Kootenay assessed for the purposes of taxation? A. Yes.
2. If so, how long have these lands been so assessed? A. Since 1908.
3. What is the amount of taxation assessed against these lands for each year during the period for which they have been assessed? A. 1908, \$64,228; 1909, \$64,228; 1910, \$61,802; 1911, \$61,655.
4. What amount of money has been paid by the railway company in each year on account of such taxation? A. None.
5. What amounts of money are still due from the said railway company in respect to such taxation? A. The amounts given in answer to question 3 are unpaid, and bear interest at 6 per cent. from the respective dates of delinquency.

VALUABLE GRAHAM ISLAND CHARTER.

The incorporation charter of the Graham Island Coal and Timber Syndicate fills two pages in the notices of extra-provincial companies in the British Columbia Gazette, and gives powers of the widest scope. It not only permits the company to mine for coal, oil and minerals, but also to build ships, be bankers and distillers, raise chickens, run hotels, grow spring lamb and mint sauce and search for precious stones "in any part of the world." It was very kind of the McBride government to grant the valuable concession contained in the last clause. It demonstrates the omni-terrestrial powers of the grantors and may prevent the English capitalists seeking for precious stones from being too disappointed with Graham Island.

IN OTHER WORDS—GOLD-BRICKED.

Now that their existence is no longer necessary to serve the ends of the Conservative party, the British-Born associations are being allowed to pass quietly away, says the Guelph Mercury. We were assured at the time that this organization was purely for non-political purposes, though even the Conservatives themselves could scarcely have believed it. Those who were gullible enough to enlist for other than political purposes are entitled to the same brand of sympathy that is extended to the investor who buys good farming land on the side of a mountain.

COST OF LIVING IN OLD COUNTRY

Board of Trade Labor Report Shows Cost of Food Increasing—Interesting Labor Statistics Regarding British Conditions.

A record amount of labor unrest, a slight rise in wages, a considerable decrease in hours, a minimum of unemployment and maintenance of high cost of living are the principal features of the review of industry during 1911, published by the board of trade.

The percentage of unemployed for 1911—4.3—was the lowest recorded since 1901, when it amounted to 3.7.

A slight upward movement in wages, which began in 1910, was maintained on the whole during 1911, although it did not at any time become marked.

The net effect of all changes reported to the board of trade during the year was an increase of £20,927 a week in the wages of 825,204 working people.

Taking the period of sixteen years from 1896 to 1911, the aggregate of net increases of wages exceeds that of net decreases by £368,424 a week, equal to £19,142,448 a year.

Changes in the weekly hours of labor taking effect in 1911 affected 105,537 working people. Of this number 4,337 persons had their hours increased by 13,905 a week, and 101,200 had reductions amounting to 574,140 hours a week.

WILL FLY OVER ATLANTIC

Paul Gans to Attempt It from Canary Islands.

Paris, Feb. 23.—Paul F. Gans, who proposes to cross the Atlantic in his dirigible balloon, the Suchard, left today for Tenerife, in the Canary Islands, to complete final preparations. Gans expects to start from Tenerife in a week or two and will attempt to follow a course across the ocean that will enable him to effect a landing somewhere in the West Indies, probably on the Island of Barbadoes.

UNIQUE FEAT OF ENGINEERS

C. N. R. Construction at Rainy
Lake is Fine Piece of Railway
Development Work—Marred by
Bad Accident.

A unique piece of engineering,
being the construction of a rock
fill for a distance of three miles
through Rainy Lake, was the
work upon which twelve unfortu-
nate men were employed who
were recently blown into eternity
by a premature shot of gigantic
size.

The C. N. R. at present is cross-
ing the lake on a trestle bridge,
but realizing the necessity of a
permanent roadbed, a contract
was let to Johnstone & Carey for
the construction of a roadbed
from a point four or five miles
east of Fort Frances clear across
the lake, utilizing the numerous
islands as anchorage. The con-
tractors have been working prac-
tically the whole of 1911 on this
stupendous engineering feat, and
the work has been pushed for
nearly two miles.

This is the first work of the
kind done in Canada, and some
of the dumping contrivances are
absolutely unique in the history
of engineering.

By utilizing a floating bridge,
consisting of three pontoons, and
a set of rails with no bottom, the
work has been rapidly pushed.

SLOT MACHINE FRANKS MAIL

Look Out for London Letters Now
Post Office on Penny-in-the-
Slot Principle.

If you receive by this and fu-
ture mails a letter from London
minus its stamp do not imagine
that the sender has necessarily
forgotten to pay postage. A care-
ful examination of the envelope
will probably reveal a red circle,
within which may be seen at the
bottom a small crown and above
the legend: "London, E. C., 1d
postage paid," which means that
the sender has taken advantage
of the automatic franking ma-
chine placed the other week in
the general post office for the
purpose of doing away with the
bother of using stamps. Any one
wishing to "stamp" a letter places
the envelope in the machine, puts
a penny (two cents) in a slot,
and the machine impresses in
place of a stamp the aforesaid
circle of red and its contents.
Any letter bearing this impres-
sion will be treated as if it bore
a postage stamp of the value of
two cents, provided that it bears
also the postmark of the office of
posting. Should the trial prove
satisfactory automatic machines
will come into general use.

The government telegraph line
has reached Dundegan, on the

GOOSE BAY SMELTER WILL BE STARTED THIS SPRING

F. M. SYLVESTER, ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER OF GRANBY
COMPANY, MAKES STATEMENT THAT NEXT SPRING
SMELTER WILL BE RUNNING.

"Construction work on our
proposed smelter at Goose Bay,
Observatory Inlet, Portland Canal
district, will be started early this
spring. The plant will have an
initial capacity of 2,000 tons daily
and will make a bid for the treat-
ment of custom ores from North-
ern British Columbia and South-
eastern Alaska," said Mr. F. M.
Sylvester, assistant general man-
ager of the Granby Consolidated
Mining & Smelting Company of
Grand Forks, B. C., the other day
at Vancouver.

"The smelter will be in opera-
tion in the spring of 1913 and
will be enlarged from time to time
to meet future requirements. Meantime development work on
our Hidden Creek copper-gold
group at Goose Bay is in progress
and already vast ore reserves
have been blocked out. Surface
operations will be resumed in the
spring when we will probably
have a pay roll of four or five
hundred men, exclusive of the
men engaged in smelter con-
struction. A tramway from the
mine to the smelter site on the
shore will also be built this year.
We have not bonded any other
properties, but have a lot of data
secured by Mr. W. Yolen Wil-
liams, our consulting engineer,
who toured all the northern
camps last summer.

"The recent increase in the
price of copper has greatly stimu-
lated mining in the Boundary
district. Our mines at Phoenix
now employ a full crew and our
smelter at Grand Forks is operat-
ing at its capacity of 4,000 tons
daily. The outlook for the com-
ing summer is indeed very
bright."

Old Le Roi Still Working.

The Le Roi was purchased by

of the Le Roi is not now used, the
Le Roi hoist being operated by
air from the Centre Star com-
pressor.—Report of Provincial
Mineralogist.

REPORT ON SKEENA MINING

Provincial Mineralogist on Coal
Fields of Groundhog Basin,
Which Extend Over a Larger
Territory Than Before Known.

The preliminary report of William Fleet Robertson has the following devoted to the Skeena and Omineca mining divisions:

"The most important development of the year in the Skeena country was the determination of the fact that the coal measures of the Groundhog basin and vicinity extend over a much larger area of territory than had previously been known. A brief account of this coal region has already been given.

"Most of the localities in which silver-lead ores have been found in the Skeena country are in Omineca mining division.

"Commencing with the headwaters of the Telkwa and Morice rivers, mention might be made of diamond drilling in the coal measures of this part of the district. These operations were carried on by two companies—namely, the Prince Rupert Coal Fields, Ltd., and the Grand Trunk Pacific or one of its auxiliary organizations.

"In Dominion basin, work was done on mineral claims on which copper ore occurs, while at the head of the north fork of Telkwa river some promising silver-lead ores were reported to have been found. On and about Hudson Bay mountain there was much activity, and some promising deposits of silver-lead ore were opened here. The finding of bismuth deposits was reported from the Babine country. Then there was development work done on Rochers de Boule mountain, where some good looking copper and galena ores occur."
