VICTORIA, March 20: (CP)--"The facts are, leaving aside al aspects the development of Prince Rupert and Northern Columbia has been and is today a considerable factor in the opment of the port of Vancouver," said Premier T. D. Pattullo ommenting upon a statement by W. M. Neal, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, that the creation of the port of Prince Pupert was a major extravagance of the Pacific Coast. "We are going to settle the railway situation in Canada by working ourlives into a frenzy and tearing up rails," continued Mr. Pattullo. The railways are here to serve Canada. Until recently all that has then done in railway activities ever since Confederation, including the Canadian Pacific Railway, has been on the assumption of an increase in population. What the railways need and what Canada needs is more people. With more people there will be more business."

ister Chamberlain at last realized that it is useless to try to bargain with Hitler and that the only thing he understands is the mailed fist. Great Britain and France have been making tremendous efforts to improve their position. They have been spending tremendous amounts of money and are undoubtedly getting results. Germany has been strengthening its position economically by the taking over of Czechoslovakia and will continue to do so unless stopped. If this goes on we shall all be under the Nazi thumb pretty soon.

NON-RECOGNITION

It is quite evident that Hitler is laughing to himself when he hears that the British and the Franch refuse to recognize his peaceful conquest of Czechoslovakia. Nonrecognition means little for eventually, if no steps are taken to prevent it, the recognition will be accorded. Strength is the only thing that counts in Europe today. If Britain can show that she is in a position to drive Germany out, there will be no war, but, if Germany thinks she can win, this will be as good a time as any to precipitate a conflict. Everything has been moving in that direction for some time past.
